Howard Grade School Takes 3-Way Contest

Howard Grade school crushed Lone Pine and Griffin Creek in a seventh and eighth grade track test on the Howard oval Friday.

Seventh grade scores were Howard 41, Griffin Creek 27, and Lone Pine 17. Howard eighth grade ran up 64 points to 16 for Lone Pine and 6 for Griffin Creek.

Leading point getters in the eighth grade were Wayne Cowan, Nick Gier, and Dave Burns, all from Howard, with 13 points each. Cowan won the shot put with a new school record of 42 feet 3 1/2 inches, set another record in winning the 150 yard dash in :17.5, and placed second in the 330. Gier tied the school mark in the 75 in :08.6, won the high jump at 5 feet and placed second in the broad jump. Burns lowered the 8th grade 660 mark to 1:40.4, won the 330 in :42.6, and took second in the shot put.

Shaw won the broad jump for Lone Pine with 14 feet 11 inches. Strop, Lone Pine, went 9-1 to win the pole vault. Scott Eaton set a new Howard record in the hop-step-jump with 35-9 1/2. Eaton now holds the 6th, 7th, and 8th grade standings in the event.

Rosenberger Leads
The Howard team of Gier, Davis, Eaton and Cowan won the 440 relay in 54.1 seconds.

For the third straight track meet Howard's 7th grader Gary Rosenberger was the leading point getter with 11. "Rosey" set a 7th grade record in the 330 of :45.9, won the 150 in :19, and placed third in the shot. He was followed by Kinney of Lone Pine who got 10 points with firsts in the shot at 36-7, and 660 in 1:49.2.

Gary Momborg, Howard, took the 75 in 10 flat. Bob Hight and Paul Rutter of Howard, knotted in the hop-step-jump at 28 feet. Hight took the broad jump at 14-11 and Sanders nabbed the high jump for Griffin Creek at 4-6.

Miller, Griffin Creek, was tops in the pole vault at 7 feet. Rosenberger, Hight, Rutter and Momborg won the relay for Howard in 1:01.

Artistic Efforts Lose Out As Studio One Closes Up

Hollywood — **By** — Two of television's quality, dramatic shows, "Studio One" and "Kraft Theater" — both highly respected by critics — nailed up "closing" notices this week, signaling the triumph of filmed-in-Hollywood drama over "artistic" live efforts.

Following in the wake of "Robert Montgomery Presents," "Fireside Theater," "Circle Theater" and "Matinee Theater," these two recent failures leave the field to "Playhouse 90" and "U.S. Steel Hour."

"Climax", another hour-long production, is on shaky ground and may not be around when the bell rings next fall.

Aircraft Firms Face Big Strike

Los Angeles — **By** — Four big aircraft companies with 16 plants across the nation today faced a crippling strike of members of the United Auto Workers and International Association of Machinists.

The rift between Lockheed, Douglas, North American and Convair and the two unions deepened Sunday with the rejection of company offers by four Southern California locals, representing nearly 50,000 workers.

Pressure of a walkout which could spread to 200,000 workers at plants throughout the nation mounted with the approach of a Wednesday midnight expiration of work contracts.

Spokesmen for the two unions served joint notice last week that walkouts could be called at any or all of the plants after that time.

Gravity of the situation was underscored by a union announcement that top leadership of the UAW and IAM would meet today in Washington, D.C., with Defense Secretary McElroy and Secretary of Labor Mitchell.

Local spokesmen said Walter Reuther, UAW president, and Al J. Hayes, IAM president, would meet with government officials to discuss the dispute.

Shooting Brings Manslaughter

Portland — **By** — A Circuit Court jury here Friday returned a verdict of guilty of manslaughter against Clarence Wall, 41, in connection with the fatal shooting of Mary Ann Mitchell, 11, on March 4. Judge Alfred T. Dobson set May 7 for sentencing.

Wall was accused of the second degree murder of the child who was killed by a bullet that crashed through the wall of her room. Wall testified that the gun he was handling in the room next door discharged accidentally.

Silky To Attempt To Redeem Himself In Preakness Run

Louisville, Ky. — **By** — Silky Sullivan was shipped to Pimlico today to redeem himself in the Preakness Stakes. But the turf world still wanted to know: What happened to him in the Kentucky Derby?

Calumet Farm's Tim Tam, the Derby winner, also moved on to Baltimore for the second of the Triple Crown classics. Lincoln Road, Nouredin, Jewel's Reward, Martins Rullah, Chance It Tony, A Dragon Killer, and Ebony Pearl also are expected to be on hand for the Preakness along with Backbone, Nala, Board Man, and Grey Monarch, who did not run in the Kentucky Derby.

There was no positive answer to the Silky Sullivan riddle — not from Silky's trainer Reggie Cornell, not from his personal veterinarian, Dr. Jock Joco, not from Jockey Willie Shoemaker after the colt finished 12th in the 84th Derby. He beat only a horse which never had won a race and a 122-1 shot who was eased up before he had gone a mile.

Blame on Track
The consensus placed the blame on the bad condition of the track. None of the Derby horses liked the running strip, not even Tim Tam, who gave Jockey Calumet Farm its seventh victory in America's premier horse race.

Silky Sullivan was a good 20 lengths behind at the finish. "My horse ran bad and I don't know why," said Cornell. "Why he even let Martins Rullah beat him and I know he can beat him. It wasn't the muggy day. He was puffing so little when he came back he never could blow out a match. There is no need to beef about the track but he didn't like it."

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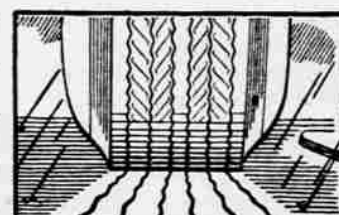
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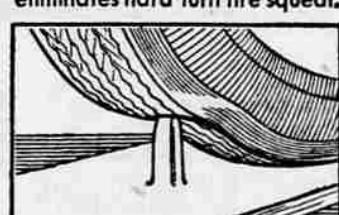
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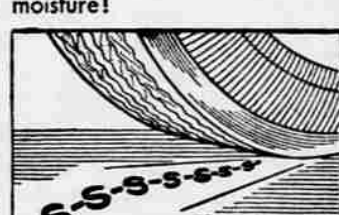
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
