Information Asked On 'Mouse' Rocket

Washington — Rep. John E. Moss (D-Calif.), has demanded that the Air Force give a "full explanation" of why it tried to keep secret the fact that it sent a mouse aloft in a rocket April 23.

Moss, chairman of the House Information subcommittee, noted that the Air Force withheld news of the rocket-borne mouse for five days after its flight in the nose cone of a combination Thor-Vanguard rocket.

The rocket, fired from Cape Canaveral, Fla., was intended to travel more than 5,800 miles but fell short of its target. The nose cone was never recovered.

Main purpose of the test was to check on the ability of the nose cone — the type that would be used on continent-spanning intercontinental ballistic missiles — to withstand the intense heat of re-entering the atmosphere after a flight into space.

A secondary purpose, involving the mouse, was to obtain further data about the ability of an animal to survive such a flight.
