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bettered his own former West Coast relays record, which was 59 feet, 3 1/4 inch. However, the toss was well below his own world mark of 63 feet, two inches. Bill Neider of the U.S. Army, who also has passed the 60 foot barrier, had a preliminary toss of 60 feet, 1 1/4 inch.

With 1,625 athletes compet-

ing under leaden skies, the competition was forced into many preliminaries. There were 29 men who started in the four preliminaries in the 100-yard dash. Best qualifying time was a 9.5 by Ray Norton of San Jose State college. However, a tailwind of 4.6, barely over the minimum, nullified the effort.

Other heat winners were Willie White, California; Dee Givens, Oklahoma; and Mike Agostini, Fresno State.

High hurdle heat winners were Ancel Robinson, Fresno State, in 14.8, and Chuck Cobb, Stanford, 14.8.

The crowd, held down somewhat by sprinkles of rain, was about 13,500. This afternoon's activities were witnessed by 8,500.

Despite perfect track conditions, the times were mediocre for this meet, advertised as the place where world records are broken.

Ancel Robinson of Fresno State won the high hurdles finals in 14.2.

The 5,000 meter run was won by USC's intercollegiate champion, little Max Truex. Max threaded his way through 25 other starters in the event to win by 20 yards. But his time was a slow 14:33.9 compared with the world mark of 13:36.8, or Max's own national record of 14:14.5, set here last year.

The 100 yard dash final was won by Norton in the good time of 9.4, one-tenth of a second off the world mark.

Record Neared In WC Meeting
Fresno, Calif. — Willie Jackson, a tall, slender Los Angeles Harbor Junior college freshman, made the second longest official broad jump in America this year Saturday when he was measured at 25 feet, 9 1/4 inches, as the West Coast Relays got underway.

Jackson, who jumped 24 feet, 8 1/2 inches as a high school senior last year, set a relay record with his leap. Only Greg Bell, the Olympic champion, has had a better official leap this year.

McLoughlin Victor In Freshman Meet

McLoughlin Junior High school's potent track aggregation, spurred by Bob Rix and Mike Hood, triumphed in the Southern Oregon District Freshmen Track meet here Friday during an afternoon marked by numerous fine performances.

Rix smashed Medford junior high records in winning the 1,320 and 660-yard runs and Hood won the high hurdles, the high jump and 330-yard run as Medford compiled 159 points and gained first in seven of the 18 events.

Grants Pass was runner-up with 123 5-6 and three individual firsts. Crater was victor in six events and was a third overall with 81 1-3. Klamath Falls had 44 points, Hedrick 39 5-6 and Ashland 19. Hedrick and Klamath each took one event.

Rix's 3:27.8 in three-fourths mile and 1:28 in the 660 were better than his previous fastest times of 3:34.2 and 1:30.7. Hood had a fine leap of 5 feet 9 1/4 inches in the high jump, an inch under his school standard and his 38.1 in the 330 was just a 10th of a second under a three-year-old mark.

Other Medford marks were established by Danny Sieg, Hedrick Junior high, with 19-3 1/2 in the broad jump and the McLoughlin 440-yard relay combine of Terry Earl, Hood, Bill Charley and Phil Humphreys. The Bulldogs were second to Grants Pass in the relay in almost a dead heat at 46.6. Former local marks were 19-2 1/2 and 47.

Burton Wins Three
Max Burton, Crater, joined Hood in the triple win column, taking the pole vault with 10-9, the javelin with a fine 160-2 and the low hurdle second heat. His vault, like some of the other bests Friday, may be a meet record but no list of the top marks of past contests was available.

Ray Meek, Grants Pass, won both first heats in the 75 and 150-yard sprints and Denny Edwards, Crater, took the second heats, for double
