

Investigation Scheduled For Eastern Butchers Unions

Washington — The Senate Rackets committee will open an investigation next week into the activities of two brothers and the New York butcher unions they lead.

The committee ended its inquiry into the labor and financial affairs of the Food Fair stores of Philadelphia Friday and will return to work next Wednesday to start the New York inquiry.

Espionage Aided Sputniks Security Group Charges

Washington — The Senate Internal Security subcommittee said Saturday that secrets stolen from the United States helped Russia launch its Sputniks and score other scientific gains.

The subcommittee offered no specific facts to support the assertion.

In a report of Soviet espionage in the United States, the subcommittee said, "the appearance of the Soviet Sputnik in the sky in October more sharply highlighted the value of Soviet espionage than any recent happening."

Subcommittee Chairman James O. Eastland (D-Miss.), commenting on the report in a statement released with it, said "whatever talents Soviet scientists may possess of their own, it is clear from evidence

collected during the year that an important factor in the speedy rise of Communist scientific eminence is the theft of military secrets from the United States."

"They got these secrets free, without the drudgery of slow research which would have kept them from moving on to new things," he said.

In its conclusions, the subcommittee warned that "Soviet espionage is presently continuing in the United States" and "remains a major activity" upon which the Russians depend in their quest for a time advantage over the United States as a step toward ultimate world conquest."

Starkweather to Take Stand Soon In Trial Over Double Shooting

Lincoln, Neb. — Defense attorneys for Charles Starkweather said Saturday they plan to put the confessed slayer of 11 on the witness stand at his trial even though they don't know what he will say.

"We don't have the least idea what he's going to say," said attorney William Mat-schullat. "All we care is that he say something."

The trial recessed for the week end Friday after testimony from 15 prosecution witnesses who told how Robert Jensen, 17, the victim for whose death Starkweather is on trial, was found shot to death with his high school sweetheart, Carol King.

The defense does not deny that Starkweather shot Jensen, but contends the red-haired former garbage hauler was legally insane and suffering from "delusions" during his January killing spree.

His attorneys said Starkweather's claim that Jensen and the other 10 victims were shot in self defense shows he is insane. Four of the victims were women and one was a 2-year-old girl.

The state attempted to show by testimony of Dr. E. D. Zeman, a pathologist, that Jensen was shot six times from behind the ear, two through it and one in front of it.

Starkweather, who remained quiet and impassive through most of the jury selection and first day of testimony Friday, flailed out at a

Pool Filling Up At Brownlee Dam

Brownlee, Idaho — Water that will produce more power for the Pacific Northwest starting in the fall began filling the reservoir behind massive Brownlee dam in the Snake river Friday.

The pooling operations began when two concrete bulk-head gates, each weighing 265 tons, dropped into place to block the upstream end of the diversion tunnel which served to divert the waters while the 360,000-kilowatt hydro-electric project of Idaho Power company was under construction.

The Snake's water immediately began forming the lake that will stretch 75½ miles upstream behind Brownlee's rock-fill embankment.

Brownlee, first of Idaho Power's three new dams in the Hells Canyon reach of the Snake, will start producing electricity with the first of its four initial generating units between Aug. 15 and Sept. 1. All four units will be "on the line" by December.

'Grapplin' Chaplain' Pride of Center

Ft. Knox, Ky. — The Armed Training Center here is proud of its "grapplin' chaplain," 1st Lt. Halcott M. Turner.

The 26-year-old Presbyterian minister won the national Olympic free-style championship in the 174-pound division at Waynesburg College, representing the New York Athletic club.

Turner, a graduate of the University of Virginia and Union Theological Seminary, had hoped to postpone his entry into the army until after a scheduled goodwill exhibition tour with the national AAU team to Japan.

Instead, the army inducted him immediately and gave him leave of absence to make the 45-day tour, which started June 29.

Upon his return he will be assigned to a training regiment as its chaplain.
