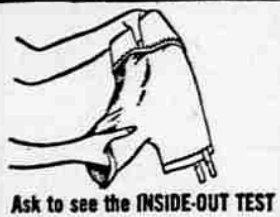
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Sunshine Girls Present Program At Lodge Session

New Hors D'Oeuvre

New York — Looking for something new in the hors d'oeuvre tray? Try bow-knot celery sticks. Slice carrot and celery sticks thinly, chill, and spear halfway through the center of large stuffed olives.

If a suede brush does not remove spots on felt hats and suede shoes, try rubbing the spots gently with an emery board or fine grained sandpaper.

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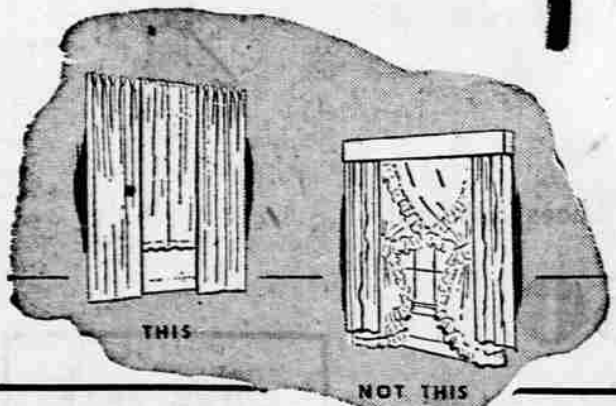
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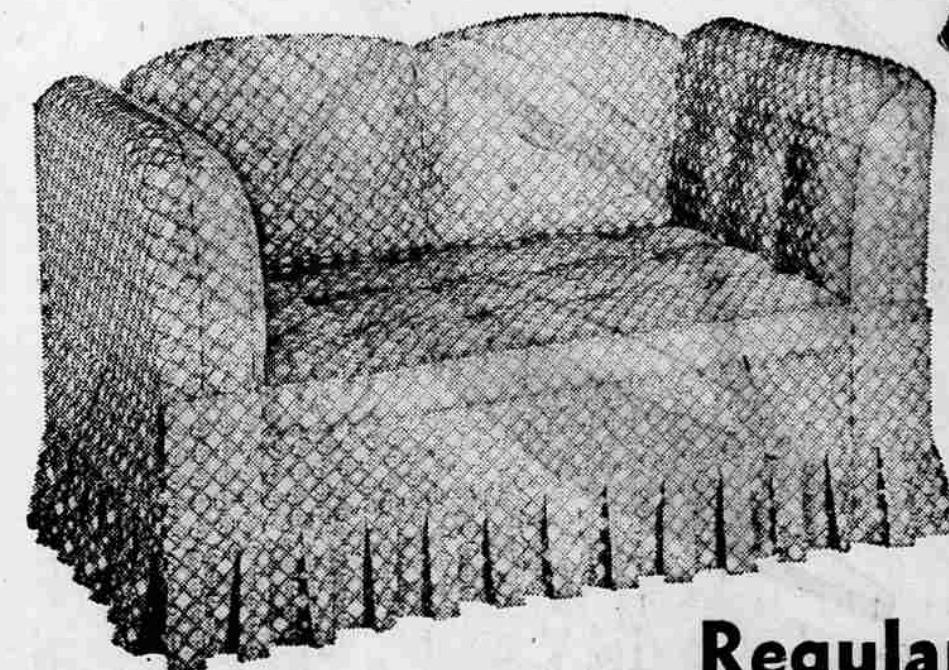
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
