

Orioles Edge White Sox; Yanks Open League Lead

Jack Harshman, who was the question mark of the Baltimore pitching staff in pre-season calculations, became the American League's first five-game winner of the year Saturday when he hurled the Orioles to a 5-2 triumph over the Boston Red Sox.

Harshman's five victories equal the entire team total wins of the team which traded him away — the Chicago White Sox.

Harshman, who had a serious back ailment which almost caused the deal to be cancelled, yielded only five hits and struck out five batters, including Ted Williams twice. Erratic control helped get him into trouble in the sixth, seventh and eighth innings but he twice was bailed out by Baltimore double plays.

The Milwaukee Braves equalled the National league's longest winning streak of the season Saturday when they defeated the Cincinnati Redlegs, 5-3, for their sixth straight triumph.

Bob Rush, obtained during the winter from the Chicago Cubs, received credit for his second win on the wings of homers by Joe Adcock and Del Crandall in the seventh inning. The blows handed Harvey Haddix his second loss.

Haddix carried a 3-2 lead

into the bottom of the seventh but Adcock led off the frame with a homer that tied the score. Two outs later Del Rice singled and Crandall, batting for Rush, homered into the left field bleachers. Smokey Burgess homered for the Redlegs.

The second-place San Francisco Giants pushed over a run in the ninth to beat the Los Angeles Dodgers, 3-2. The Pittsburgh Pirates crushed the St. Louis Cardinals edged out the Chicago Cubs, 3-1, in other National league games.

Detroit — Herman Wehmeier, a veteran of 11 full seasons in the National league, joined the Detroit Tigers last night after being obtained Friday on waivers from the St. Louis Cardinals.

Mickey McDermott was optioned to Miami of the International league on a 24-hour recall basis to make room for Wehmeier. McDermott had to give his permission before the switch was made because he's spent 10 years in the majors.

Neither Wehmeier nor McDermott have been impressive this season. Wehmeier pitched six innings for the Cards and was a loser. McDermott was hit hard in his infrequent appearances.

Wehmeier spent seven full seasons with Cincinnati but his best year was 1957 when he won 10 and lost 7 for the Cards. McDermott, an erratic southpaw, once had an 18-0 record with the Boston Red Sox.
