Britain Said Not Feeling Recession — **Portland** — (U-P) — A Labor member of the British Parliament says effects of the United States recession have not yet been felt in Britain.

Arthur M. Skeffington, who arrived here Sunday for a speech tonight to the English-Speaking Union's Portland branch, said there was more unemployment in Britain now than at any time since the war. But he said the overall unemployment problem was still not serious except in some areas, such as parts of Wales and Scotland.

He said Britain's trade situation had been improving because the price of imports had dropped about 10 per cent while the price of exports had been maintained.

Two low-priced automobile makers of small cars accounted for 12 per cent of all trading on the market and made the best price advances.

The general list was irregular with the major sections declining moderately on average with volume lighter than recently.

American Motors with huge turnover ran up 1 1/2 points to a new high for the year at 14 1/2 at its best. That was a gain of 10 per cent on the day and the stock at its high was up 86 per cent from the year's low.

Studebaker-Packard which is planning to enter the low-priced, economy car field with a big gas saving car was second in volume. It gained a point to a new high at 5 1/4 at its best.
