Editor's note: The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, a newspaper editor, a woman's editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual report. The Family Council does not give advice; it merely reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Martha S.—I don't want to name the baby after my parents.

Mrs. F. G.—She doesn't care about our family's feelings.

Martha S.—I have been married two years and am to become a mother in a few months. Both my parents died while I was still a child and I was brought up by one of my aunts.

My problem is the naming of my baby. Under ordinary circumstances, I would name a girl for my mother and a boy for my father. But my mother-in-law is a very superstitious woman. She has begged me not to name a child after my parents because they had such short lives. She wants me to name him or her after long-lived members of her own family and my husband goes along with her on this.

My mother-in-law has been so good to me—like a real mother—and I want to please her, as well as my husband. I feel if my parents were alive they would understand and forgive me. I told both my mother's and father's families what I plan to do and they are in an uproar.

Mrs. F. G.—Naturally our family is furious. How can Martha be so callous toward her mother's memory that she is willing to forget her when she names her child?

This mother-in-law of Martha's is a stupid, uneducated, superstitious woman. Why should she get her own way just because she has the nerve to make such a request? I have brought Martha up like my own child, but she doesn't have enough respect for me to listen to me in such an important matter.

We all suspect Martha has been influenced by this woman's superstitions. She is too

intelligent a girl to accept such beliefs. Yet she seems ready to bend herself any way at all to please her mother-in-law and her husband. She seems to have no thought for the feelings of our family, after all we have done for her. If she gives in to this thing she will regret it all her life. She must have some feeling for her parents.

The Council.—Martha seems to have thought out her position quite clearly. It is possible that she has been somewhat affected by her mother-in-law's superstition, but even if this is the case, she has a right to be guided by whatever feelings she has developed in this matter.

Martha feels her own parents would understand her attitude if they knew the problem and both her mother's and father's families ought to try to give her the same understanding she would get from her parents. They are being unfair in putting this unpleasant pressure on a mother-to-be. They are blighting her happiness by putting an unnecessary burden of guilt on her.

The naming of a baby really concerns only the mother and father, and if Martha and her husband have reached a satisfactory agreement, nobody has the right to interfere or to question the basis of their decision.

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Pflimlin Seen in Trouble in France

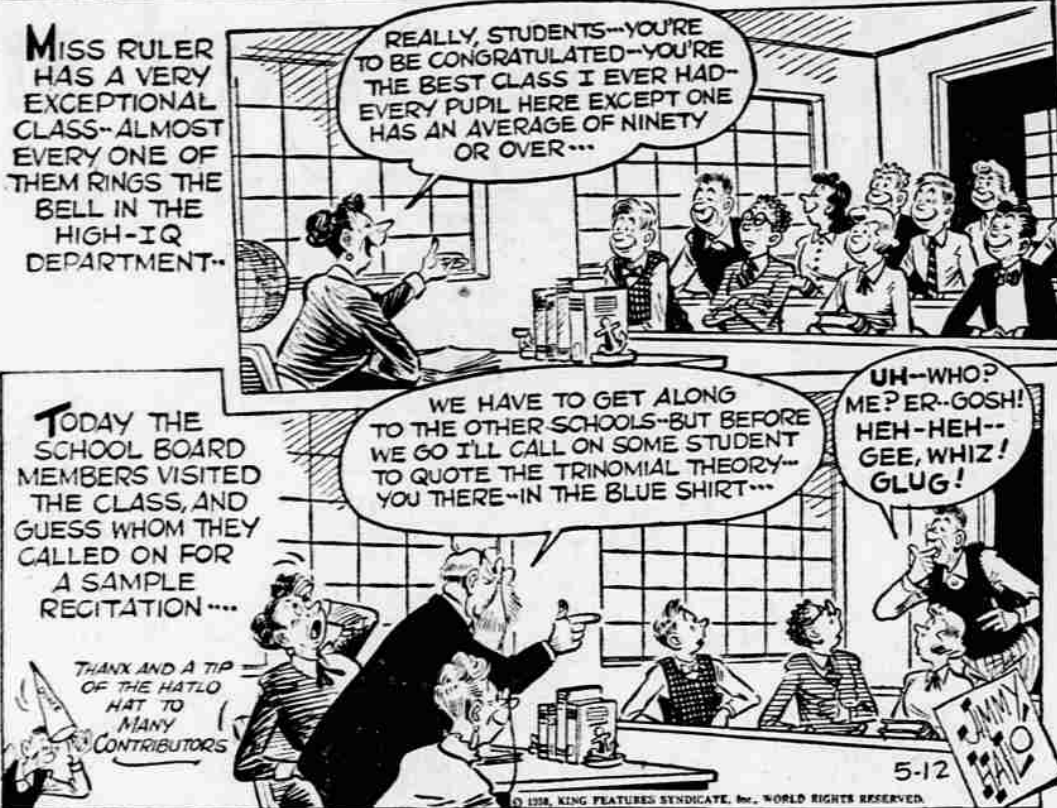

American-Style Belgrade Supermarket Throws Housewives' Budgets for Loop

Belgrade, Yugoslavia — Yugoslav housewives are suffering a capitalist complaint today.

The city's new supermarket is knocking their budgets for a loop.

A young wife who works in a government office said, "I rarely spend more than I allot to food when I shop on the regular market. But this is the third time I've come to the supermarket and every single time I've gone over my budget. All that attractive food, the fruit, those chocolates and biscuits... they tempted me every time."

The American-model market opened its door on April 28, and promptly closed them again so it could handle the flood of customers. The days after the grand opening, women still were lining up in half-a-dozen queues, each 200 to 300 strong, waiting patiently for their turn to enter the neon-lit paradise.

Peasants Think It Wonderful
The supermarket, believed the first in Communist East Europe, was so popular, authorities kept it open throughout the four-day "May Day" holidays.

The old peasants from the villages have dubbed it, "the American Market," because it is so wonderful.

They know the market was the star attraction of the U. S. exhibit at last September's Zagreb fair. They know self-service is an American idea, and that the market was set up here by U. S. experts. But nothing has been able to persuade them that the colorful displays of food, and the market itself, now belongs to "Vracar," the state-controlled import-export organization.

Gets Name
To the peasants, it's "The American Market," and likely to keep that name.

It has become the sensation of Belgrade.

Even after closing time, families stroll down "Tito street" to the center of town and look through the store windows to see the pyramids of canned foods, the shelves of liquors and the mounds of fruits and cheeses.

Prices are higher than in the open markets or regular shops, but the customers recognize that the quality of the merchandise has also been held high.

Can't Stay Away
Despite the prices and the family budget, the Belgrade housewives haven't been able to stay away from the 30-by-90 foot store.

"Whenever I go into this

place, I spend twice as much as I intended. And naturally, I get into family arguments because they think I'm wasting money on luxuries," said one shopper, the mother of two working daughters.

The management admits that temptation remains for those who run out of house-keeping money. Several shop-lifters already have been picked up.

Embargo Lift Talk Denied by U. S.

Washington — Diplomatic officials said they understand the United States would lift its embargo against arms shipments to the Indonesian Central Government as soon as the country's civil war ends.

A state department spokesman disclosed Friday that U. S. and Indonesian representatives discussed the matter earlier this week. But he said the United States made "no commitments."

The spokesman also disclosed that this country, acting in the role "of a post office," relayed to Formosan authorities a complaint by Indonesian President Sukarno that Chinese Nationalists were supplying planes, arms and ammunition to the Indonesian rebels.

State Department Press Officer Lincoln White said the United States also delivered the Chinese reply to Jakarta. He refused to elaborate. But other sources said Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist government "categorically" denied the Indonesian charges.

Rebel's Appeal For Volunteers

Singapore — The Indonesian rebels have appealed for "freedom-loving" volunteers from Asia to join them in their fight against "Soviet colonialism."

Insurgent Lt. Col. Ventje Sumual, broadcasting from his stronghold at Menado on Celebes Island, also urged loyalist airmen who believe in freedom to desert to the rebels.

He pointed out that 13 Indonesian diplomats have given up posts in seven foreign countries to join the rebel cause.

Sumual's list of diplomatic defectors included Col. Joop Warouw, former military attaché in Peiping, but made no mention of Col. Alex Kawilarang, who until recently held the same post in Washington.

Starkweather May Take Stand Soon

Lincoln, Neb. — Charles Starkweather is expected to take the stand Thursday or Friday in his trial for the murder of Robert Jensen, 17.

The state breeze through more than half of its 28 witnesses in two days of testimony, and County Attorney Elmer Scheele indicated the prosecution could wind up its case by Wednesday.

Then the defense will begin its attempt to prove that Starkweather, 19, was legally insane when he embarked on an orgy late in January and killed 10 people, including Jensen.

Indo Rebels Hope Attacks on Shipping Forces Action by UN

Singapore — Indonesian rebels hope their attacks on foreign shipping may force the United Nations to act in the Indonesian civil war, according to an informed source.

The source said the attacks had a primary purpose of blunting any buildup of Jakarta forces close enough to attack Mendao, and a secondary purpose, as seen in the attacks on foreign shipping, of extending the economic warfare against Jakarta's shaky foreign exchange position.

But many observers here have wondered why the rebels, who identify their anti-Communist leanings with those of the West, would seemingly try to alienate maritime nations of the West by bombing and sinking their ships.

U. N. Intervention Urged
Rebel Prime Minister Sjafruddin has on several occasions urged United Nations intervention. Certainly, if bombing of foreign shipping continues, the United Nations or some other agency is likely to

be forced to pay direct interest.

Indonesians on both sides of the present conflict recall the important role played by the United Nations in their showdown with the Dutch in the late 1940s.

Correspondents covering revolutionary government developments in Padang and later Bukittinggi found strong feeling among some rebel leaders that a United Nations-imposed "status quo" would in the final analysis help the rebel cause. It would allow them to carry on non-shooting economic warfare—the kind of a war they originally hoped to fight.

Until recent developments in eastern Indonesia, rebel leaders have shown opposition to taking steps that would do long-range damage to Indonesian economics. This was seen in their avoidance of taking what seemed the logical and likely step of damaging Caltex, Stanvac and Shell installations on Sumatra after they passed into full Jakarta control.

Oil Plants Escape Damage
At one time, Sjafruddin warned that unless Caltex started putting Indonesian revenues into escrow accounts, denying Jakarta the exchange, "We will take steps to shut down production."

But it was known that

rebel government warning that foreign ships would not be safe in Indonesian waters unless they carried clearances from the rebel government.

If followed, this could give impetus to rebel efforts for long sought examples of "de facto" recognition.
