

Billy Graham Sees Much Unhappiness From Broken Homes

San Francisco — (U)—Evangelist Billy Graham believes there must be a lot of unhappiness in the United States and especially in San Francisco.

The reason, he told an audience of 16,300 Sunday, is that one of every three and one-half marriages "went on the rocks" in this country last year.

"And in San Francisco last year, one out of every two marriages ended in divorce," he said. "And it shows there is more unhappiness here than in any other city in the country."

Foundation of Society
Graham told a Mother's Day audience that the home is the foundation of society. He emphasized to young people that marriage is the most serious step a person will take other than his conversion to Christ.

Too many people, he said, marry for reasons of insecurity, economic insecurity, sexual curiosity, social prestige or just plain spite.

He listed what he thought were the principal duties of wives, but warning husbands: "Don't enjoy this too much, I'll get to you later."

He said a wife should:—Pay reverence to her husband, for God made him the head of the home.

—Submit to her husband in all things.

—Love her husband and their children.

—Keep the home.

He told husbands: **Wife's Job Hardest**

"Love your wives. Show your love, for hers is the hardest job. Don't be a tightwad or a roughneck. You are to provide for your wives, be courteous to your wives and cleave to them."

Moreover a husband should be "responsible as a father." "Set your children a good example, for children imitate more than they listen."

After his sermon, 575 persons made "decisions for Christ," bringing to 8,180 the number of conversions in 14 sermons.

The 15th sermon in Graham's six-week crusade will be held Tuesday night.

Gluckmann Finishes Round-World Trip On United Airliner

San Francisco — (U)—A "very embarrassed" Peter Gluckmann arrived home from his round-the-world trip Sunday — but on a commercial airliner.

Gluckmann, San Francisco's "flying watchmaker," flew his single-engine plane 25,000 miles over oceans, deserts and polar ice caps during the past six weeks. However, he was grounded by bad weather in Reno, Nev., just 250 miles from his final destination.

Triumphant Arrival Planned
The roving adventurer had planned to finish his trip with a triumphant arrival at the Vacaville airport near Sacramento, where a group of 30 friends and reporters had gathered to welcome him.

But after flying over South America, across the South Atlantic, up the coast of Africa to Europe, and over the polar route to New York, Gluckmann had to push his Beechcraft Bonanza through rain, snow and wind in Nevada.

After being grounded in Reno, Gluckmann attempted to hitch a ride on an airliner to Sacramento so he could still meet with his assembled admirers.

However, United Airlines could not find a seat on a Sacramento flight, so he had to take a San Francisco flight instead.

"This is very embarrassing," Gluckmann commented as he tried to slip past reporters at the airport.

A Few Accomplishments
But, despite his embarrassment, Gluckmann still had a few accomplishments to be proud of. He was the first man to:

—Fly solo in a light plane across the South Atlantic from Brazil to French West Africa.

—Fly solo 2,000 miles over African desert from Dakar to Casablanca.

—Fly solo in a light plane over the polar route from Iceland to Goose Bay, Labrador.

Gluckmann, who has made four trans-ocean flights including one to Hawaii, was already thinking of another.

"I haven't been to the Orient yet," he remarked. "Maybe next year I'll try the Pacific."

Truck-Bus Collision Kills One, Hurts 43

Fayetteville, Tenn. — (U)—A truck collided Sunday with a bus carrying 38 children and five adults on a week end outing, killing a chaperone and injuring all the other bus passengers.

The truck driver, Marvin Burns, 31, also was injured. Police said it would charge Burns with manslaughter upon his release from a hospital.

In the Day's News

In Peru's capital city Thursday, a student mob stoned U. S. Vice-President Nixon and spat at him and told him to GO HOME when he sought to pay a visit to San Marcos university—the oldest university in the Western Hemisphere.

Why? According to this morning's dispatches, there are two versions of the incident:

1. It was communist-inspired and communist-led.

2. The riot indicates a deep anti-American feeling due to high U. S. tariffs and import quotas that limit South American trade with the United States.

IN either event, we can take it for granted that the communists had a finger in it. Wherever in the world there is discontent or ill feeling (especially ill feeling toward the U.S.A.) the communists rush in to pour oil on the flames.

WHATEVER the root of the trouble in Peru may be, we'd better give it close and intelligent attention. We must keep this fact clearly in mind:

Throughout the rest of the world, we look upon communist infiltration with uneasiness and seek by diplomatic means to hamper and thwart it. But if there is a communist invasion in the Western Hemisphere we will GO TO WAR ABOUT IT.

We're pledged to that by the Monroe Doctrine.

We're impelled to it by our own safety.

WE'VE poured a lot of American dollars in the form of aid into the rest of the world. We have poured comparatively little foreign aid into Latin America.

American aid in Asia, in the Middle East and in Africa is at least open to question.

The Western Hemisphere is OUR business. If we're in hot water south of the Rio Grande we'd better find out how to get out of it.

Ohio Mother Wins Mrs. America Title

Fort Lauderdale, Fla. — (U)—A hazel-eyed mother of three from Ohio Saturday won the 1958 Mrs. America crown.

The title went to Mrs. Helen Giesse of Cleveland, O., at the end of a week of intensive competition in homemaking among representatives of the 48 states and District of Columbia.

Mrs. Giesse is the mother of two boys and a girl, ranging from 8 years to 9 months old, and the wife of a Cleveland account executive, William Giesse, who watches his wife win the coveted 20th annual homemaking award and a carload of prizes in crowded Memorial Auditorium.

The runner up was Mrs. Idaho, Mrs. Irene Runkle of Nampa, Idaho. Third place went to Mrs. Minnesota, Mrs. Betty Bach of Columbia Heights, Minn.

Three other finalists were Mrs. Ginger Carlson of Pittsburgh, Pa.; Mrs. Mary Alice Hill of Muskogee, Okla., and Mrs. Elizabeth Stroupe of Mount Holly, N.C.

Missing Plane Found At Hillsboro Airport

Hillsboro — (U)—A small private plane which was feared missing was found safely landed at the airport here Sunday night.

The pilot, Oregon State college student Bill Hutchinson, Corvallis, had taken off from Salem Sunday afternoon following a flight from Albany. He had three hours fuel supply and did not file a flight plan. A check of airports began after no word was received from the pilot and time had run out for his fuel supply to be exhausted.

Four Persons Die as Fire Destroys Home

Painesville, Ohio — (U)—Four persons died today in a fire that swept through a home near this northeastern Ohio community. Five other persons fled to safety after the house caught fire.

Carl McCartney Jr., 24; Ocher Ray Laws; Lawns' son Robert, 5, and his daughter Diane, one, died in the fire.

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Indonesia Attack Statement Claimed 'Obvious Fabrication' By Dulles

Jakarta — (U)—United States Ambassador Howard P. Jones has received a cable from Secretary of State John Foster Dulles describing as "obvious fabrication" quotes attributed to him about a possible Indonesian attack on Dutch-held New Guinea.

The Dulles story was carried by the United Press, as well as by other news media, and originated from this week's meeting of the NATO nations in Copenhagen.

Murder Indictment Sought Against Doctor

New York — (U)—The Kings County District Attorney's office plans to seek a first degree murder indictment this week against Dr. Rodrigo L. Sarmiento, 38, it was announced Sunday.

Sarmiento is accused of the knife-slashing April 26 of his American sweetheart, blonde nurse instructor Margaret Kabak, 33, after she broke off their romance on learning he had a wife and four children in the Philippines.

Export-Import Bank Head Victim of Thief

Bogota, Colombia — (U)—Export-Import Bank President Samuel Waugh lost his wallet to a pick-pocket during ceremonies honoring visiting Vice President Richard M. Nixon Sunday.

The loot included \$100 in travelers checks and a \$1 bill.

The dispatch said Dulles had warned during a closed meeting of the NATO council that an Indonesian attack on Western New Guinea would have "most serious consequences" for Southeast Asia and the whole Western world. The dispatch was attributed to a high conference source who attended the meeting.

Jones said Saturday that Dulles did not blame the United Press for the story, but rather blamed the source.

Jones said Dulles cabled him that he "did not make a remark of any kind regarding a possible Indonesian attack on New Guinea."

The Indonesian Antara news agency said that Jones had delivered to Indonesian foreign Minister Subandrio Dulles' denial and that the foreign minister "welcomed" the message.

Subandrio said Friday that by reading a passage of the report he got the impression that there was a third party "who intentionally gave its opinion aiming at estranging Indonesia from the United States."

Antara said it believed Subandrio referred to Dutch Foreign Minister Joseph Luns who was in Copenhagen during the NATO meeting.
