Cattlemen Call For Sales Tax At Retail Level

Ontario—The Oregon Cattlemen's association Tuesday called for a sales tax at the retail level with food, feed and seed and fertilizer, drugs and medicine excluded.

Members said such a tax should be limited by a constitutional amendment that would provide a lowering or reduction on property tax and a lowering of the rate schedule for income tax, all within the six per cent limitation.

The association said the buying power of cattlemen was low and that property and income taxes were at all time highs.

The association in other resolutions called for stricter game regulations asking revocation of licenses for any hunter convicted of intentionally destroying or injuring private property through shooting of livestock or other damage.

The group also asked for a law to prohibit carrying of cartridges in any part of a gun in a motor vehicle while on any public road.

It recommended a stampage severance tax be assessed to build up an emergency fire fighting fund similar to one operated in western Oregon.

Larry Hilaire, Portland restaurant owner, predicted in a speech that slaughtering and processing plant in many areas will be closed. He said closure would be because of packers finding it more profitable to concentrate their processing in fewer cities.

Hungary Orders Deportation of Vice Element

Vienna—The Hungarian Communist regime has ordered the deportation of "hooligans" and prostitutes from the Hungarian capital as the first step in a new anti-vice drive.

Reports from Budapest say the deportation orders were given on the initiative of the Hungarian Ministries of Interiors and Health "in order to purge the capital from criminal and inferior elements."

At the same time, Hungarian criminal courts were instructed to inflict heavy fines on currency speculators, hooligans, and prostitutes.

"If they cannot pay the fine immediately, they must serve a prison term," the order said.

Hungarian Communist authorities so far have had little success in stamping out vice, despite a ban on prostitution decreed immediately after Communists seized power in 1947. The law banning prostitution has never been strictly enforced.

Although the regime made several attempts "to win back prostitutes to socialist life," latest estimates said that at least 3,000 streetwalkers were still roaming in Budapest. Apart from occasional fines for violation of the law, they have remained unmolested.

The new purge action followed a Hungarian newspaper's campaign against "rowdies" who attack policemen, disturb the law and order in the streets and commit acts of violence.

Market Slips Lower On Small Auto Talk

New York — Wall Street toyed around again today with the small automobile talk but lost out on its rumors with the result the stock market slipped lower.

The street generated a rumor early in the day that Chrysler would announce at midday its entry into the small, low-priced car field. The stock of Chrysler ran up to 47 1/2 for a gain of nearly two points. Chrysler subsequently squelched the rumors with the statement it was watching the small car market but apparently doing nothing about it. The stock fell off sharply.

Studebaker-Packard, which has publicly stated it will enter the small car field, had tremendous turnover. The issue ran up to a new high at 6 1/4 up nearly a point and then backed away on profit taking.
