Registered voters tomorrow will nominate Republican and Democratic candidates for congressman and state and local offices. Judges for the state Supreme Court, circuit court and district court will be nominated on a non-partisan ballot.

Polls will be open between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. for the 106 precincts in Jackson county. A list of precincts, the polling place and address of the location appears on page 15 to-day.

Developments in GOP Governor's Race Reported

Telephone Poll Results Are Told

Two last minute developments in the Republican gubernatorial nomination race, one local and state-wide, were reported here today.

State Sen. Philip B. Lowry, Medford, reported that a telephone poll of 12 of the 15 Republican members of the state senate, completed today, revealed that 10 of the 12 plan to vote for their colleague, State Sen. Warren Gill, Lebanon.

Lowry said that he and Senators Don Husband, Eugene, Carl Francis, Dayton, and Anthony Yturry, Ontario, conducted the poll. He said the results were: Ten of the 15 Republican senators said they favor Gill, one favored another candidate, one still has not made up his mind, and one could not be reached for comment. The two GOP senators in Marion county were not contacted, since that is the home county of Secretary of State Mark Hatfield, another GOP candidate.

Yesterday noon, a gathering of Republicans invited by Mrs. Frank Bash, chairman of the Hatfield for Governor committee here, heard Frank J. Van Dyke, Medford attorney and former speaker of the house of representatives, speak on behalf of Hatfield and in opposition to Gill's candidacy.

Van Dyke said Gill's sales tax program "would not only be impossible to accomplish, but impractical in its application."

Van Dyke stated there are many kinds of sales tax, and that while he himself believes in one, as do other GOP candidates for governor, the one proposed by Senator Gill is undesirable.

He also pointed out that it is the legislature's responsibility, not the governor's, to determine a tax program, and said it would be a mistake for Republicans to nominate a man whose campaign has been based on a legislative function.

A question and answer period followed Van Dyke's talk, during which a number of Gill supporters challenged some of the speaker's conclusions.

I think that what we are suffering from is the consequence of indecision.

We are failing to make the most of our vast resources, experience and skills in the face of a still troublesome Russia. The leaders of the free world cannot just sit and wait for things to happen. They must act.

TV Franchise On Council's Agenda

The much-discussed proposed television franchise for a pay-system of Portland television will appear on the Medford city council agenda tonight. The council will meet at 7:30 o'clock tonight.

Trimble Television, Inc.'s effort to secure such a franchise was delayed at the May 1 council meeting when KBES-TV representatives told the council of its "right" to bring such television into the valley and asked for a similar franchise. Both firms are requesting non-exclusive franchises.

Other items on the council agenda include plans and specifications for several paving and sanitary sewer projects and discussion to determine the method of assessing sanitary sewer systems in the Kenwood-Grandview, Berrydale and Laurelhurst districts.

The council also will consider granting a license to the Civil Aeronautics administration for construction of a light approach lane system at the airport. Authorization for condemnation of land needed for the light approach lane also will be considered.

things that I believe must be done to restore the initiative of the free world in the interests of peace and freedom:

Here, in the United States I do not think we ought to delay doing everything necessary to get our economy forging ahead again so that we will not suffer a more serious set-back and risk, at the same time, affecting our allies and friends by our recession.

I would urge our friends and allies to be wary of any tendency to be over-impressed by the Russians to the extent of entertaining notions of appeasing them. Our friends should remember that unity of purpose and cooperation have served all of us well in the past.

Further Steps

We should consider further steps to bring about closer economic and financial cooperation and trade relations with our allies.

I would recommend that, as quickly as possible, we take our allies into full confidence with respect to all nuclear developments, sharing with them the benefits of this vast source of energy and defense.

I had favored this action during my terms as President, but the MacMahon Act, setting up the Atomic Energy Commission, reserved for the United States all atomic secrets. I hope that now, as the result of our experience and the new conditions in the world today, the Congress will pass the necessary legislation to enable our Government to extend full nuclear partnership to our allies.

We must not forget that it was the British who carried out the first practical stages that eventually led to the production of the A-bomb when they turned over to us all their secrets, as well as the experts.

Informed of Understanding

Both Churchill and Attlee, as Prime Ministers, informed me of the existence of an understanding between President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill that immediately after the war we would share with the British all atomic information. I told both Prime Ministers that I had no knowledge of such an understanding and that I could find no record of such an understanding in any of the records of the President's office. I also told them that I could understand the fairness of such an arrangement and was sympathetic with its purpose but that my hands were tied by the MacMahon Act.

Nixon Welcomed

Thousands Greet Vice President On Return Home

'Great Dignity' Praised By Ike

Washington — President Eisenhower personally welcomed Vice President Richard M. Nixon home from his stormy South America tour today with a salute to his courage and assurances that this country's affection for its Latin American neighbors is as "close as ever."

The vice president and Mrs. Nixon, stoned and spat upon in Venezuela just two days ago, came home to a welcome unprecedented for such an occasion.

A great cheer went up from the thousands at Washington National Airport as Nixon and his wife stepped from the big plane which flew them from the violence of South America to a hero's welcome.

Eisenhower was the first to greet the Nixons as they stepped from the plane.

"All America welcomes him home," the President said, touching off a burst of flag-waving applause.

"Through this entire trip," the President said of Nixon, "He has conducted himself effectively, with great dignity and has performed to the satisfaction not only of us but to our sister countries the duties he was sent to perform."

Faced Real Danger

"There have been some unpleasant incidents," the President said in reference to the anti-American outbursts in Venezuela, Peru and Columbia.

"Some came to the point of danger, real danger, and risk of harm and even of worse, not only to the vice president but Mrs. Nixon."

Nixon in response to the President told the crowd that he and his wife "have always been very proud to represent the United States," in their trips abroad, "but I don't think either of us have ever been as moved as today."

Carlos Morris Says Ad Is Misleading

Carlos Morris, candidate for the Republican nomination for county coroner, today said that a statement appearing in an advertisement in the Mail Tribune yesterday was inaccurate and misleading.

The ad, ordered and paid for by the Perl for Coroner committee, indicated that during Morris' incumbency in the office, there had been no freedom of choice in selecting a funeral director on the part of the families of deceased individuals coming under jurisdiction of the coroner's office.

Morris declared that in no instance has family freedom of choice been denied. He demanded a retraction be made by the Perl for Coroner committee.

The Mail Tribune, believing Morris' statement to be correct, regrets the publication of an ad which it believes to be misleading.

Man-Made Moon Claimed To Weigh 2,925.53 Pounds

Size Indicates Power of Rocket

Moscow — The Soviet Union sent its third Sputnik into orbit today. The new satellite weighed almost a ton and a half, twice the size of any previous man made moon, indirectly indicating the tremendous power of the Soviet intercontinental rocket.

The exact weight of the new satellite was given as 1,327 kilograms — 2,925.53 pounds. It was more than double the size of the now-defunct Sputnik II, the largest satellite until today, which weighed 1,118 pounds and carried the space dog Laika. It was more than 100 times larger than the biggest U. S. satellite, Explorer III, which weighs 31 pounds.

Sputnik III apparently carries no living animal, but contains a considerable amount of important apparatus for scientific checks.

The new satellite is a cone-shaped tube 11 feet 8 5/8 inches long, and five feet 8 1/4 inches in diameter at its base.

The fourth stage of the launching rocket is following the satellite in a close orbit.

The Soviet announcement said Sputnik III represented a new stage in the scientific investigation of the upper layers of the atmosphere and in the study of cosmic space.

Prof. Cyril Stanukovich, a noted Soviet astrophysicist, said launching of this Sputnik is expected to reveal data that will facilitate space flight to the moon "within the nearest possible future."

Patient Evacuation Course Conducted in Medford for Hospital, Nursing Home Staff Members

About 75 staff members of hospitals and nursing homes in southern Oregon took an intensified course in fire fighting techniques and patient evacuation in Medford yesterday.

The all-day session included a film, instruction on handling patients and "live" fire rescue demonstrations staged

on patient evacuation and fire fighting techniques held in Medford yesterday. The classes were held in the morning and at the Medford Armory in the afternoon.

The southwestern district of the Oregon hospital association includes Klamath Falls, Roseburg, Cottage Grove, Grants Pass, Medford and Ashland which were all represented at yesterday's session.

The training program was held at the YMCA in the morning, where instructions were given in the use of fire extinguishers and emergency evacuation of patients. After lunch Lt. McGrath, with the help of members of the Medford fire department, set up

on patients beds and in containers placed about the make-believe room.

At the sound of an alarm the nurses put out fires on patients beds with a blanket, removed the patient from the "room" and returned to extinguish small fires with hand

extinguishers, then all four

manned a fire hose to put out a large fire.

According to McGrath, drill in a "set" system of patient evacuation is necessary to avoid confusion, and he advises all hospitals and nursing homes to train personnel in the sequence demonstrated at the class. Once a system is developed, evacuation can be

carried out in an orderly manner, he said.

The Medford fire department furnished three men and a pumper on a standby basis during the day. The session was attended by Medford Fire Chief Gordon Barker, Fire Chief Harold Fifer, Grants Pass, and Fire Chief Charles

Davis, Ashland, as well as Deputy State Fire Marshal Bill Roble and Medford Fire Marshal Truman Nelson.

The course was sponsored jointly by the Oregon Association of hospitals, Civil Defense and the Oregon state fire marshal, and was one of four scheduled in Oregon this

week. The first was held at Portland Monday, the second at Eugene Tuesday and another one will be held at Baker Friday, according to Lt. McGrath.

Glen Keyes, business manager at Sacred Heart hospital, was in charge of the local program.
