

Mounties Defy Tradition, Remain on Top in Circuit

An unusual thing happened in the Pacific Coast league Thursday night: Vancouver remained in first place for the second straight day, defying what has become a 1958 tradition of each club taking a crack at the top spot with the persistence of a Gatling Gun barrel.

The Mounties dumped Sacramento, 7-1, to make it three straight over the Solons and hold onto their one-game lead. Phoenix took over second place with the Giants' second come-from-behind win over Portland, 10-8.

In other games, Spokane edged Salt Lake City, 4-3, and San Diego shaded Seattle, 3-2.

Vancouver broke the contest with Sacramento wide open in the sixth inning, scoring four runs on two home runs and a trio of singles. The Mounties added two more tallies in the next inning on a walk, stolen base, single and triple.

The Solons scored their only run in the eighth when Jim Greengrass scored Carlos Paula from third with a sacrifice fly. Paul had opened the inning with a triple, the Solon's first hit off Gordin Sundin, who has now allowed only one run in his last 18 innings on the mound.

Sal Taomina slammed a two-run homer with two out in the last of the ninth at Phoenix to give the Giants

their third straight over Portland. A total of nine pitchers saw action in the nip-and-tuck struggle in which the lead changed hands six times.

The score had been tied at 8-8 before Taomina's game-winning blow. Joe Margoneri, the Giants' fifth hurler for the night, set down the visitors in order in the top of the ninth to gain the victory.

Pads Lead Series
At San Diego, Jack Waters stroked a ninth-inning single to push across the winning run for the Padres. The victory gave the Pads a 2-1 series lead.

Larry Raines led off the final inning with a single, stole second and went to third when Solon catcher Dutch Dotterer threw the ball into center field. Al Jones then drew an intentional walk before Waters ended it with his single. Bill Werle was credited with the victory, his third against one defeat.

Spokane also scored a last-inning victory. A squeeze play bunt in the bottom of the ninth sent in Hisei Patrick from third to give the Indians their second straight win over Salt Lake, sending a large crowd of 6,648 fans home happy.

The home club had tied the game at 3-3 with a single run in the eighth before the game-winning bunt. Patrick was credited with the victory.

Committee Begins Move To Cut Down on Number Of Olympic Participants

Tokyo.—The International Olympic committee started a move today to make the Olympic Games tougher for individual athletes to enter.

Avery Brundage, chairman of the IOC, announced after Thursday's session that a cut-back was in the works which already had affected gymnastics, and possibly would involve track, field and swimming.

The number of persons entering gymnastics was cut from eight to five per team. Brundage said that the International Amateur Swimming federation was studying a proposal for cutting down its number of entrants also while the International Amateur Athletic federation was considering doing the same thing in track.

the five entrants in gymnastics would score.

The IAAF's decision on track and field would be made in Stockholm this summer, Brundage said.

"When interest in the Olympic Games is constantly growing, we must place a limit somewhere on the number of entries," Brundage said. "Building on Olympic village, for instance, to house 10,000 athletes would be prohibitive."

The track and field proposal calls for a nation entering only one man in each event, plus two more if they met certain standards. The same swimming events would be held with a possible addition of a 400-meter relay for men and women.

The 33-car field for the 42nd annual "500," with a jackpot of more than \$300,000 at stake, will be weeded out in two week ends of time trials, beginning Saturday.

At least, most seasoned observers predicted the records by the 1956 pole-sitter and race winner, Pat Flaherty, of 146.055 and 145.596 miles an hour for one and four laps, respectively, will go by the boards barring adverse weather conditions.

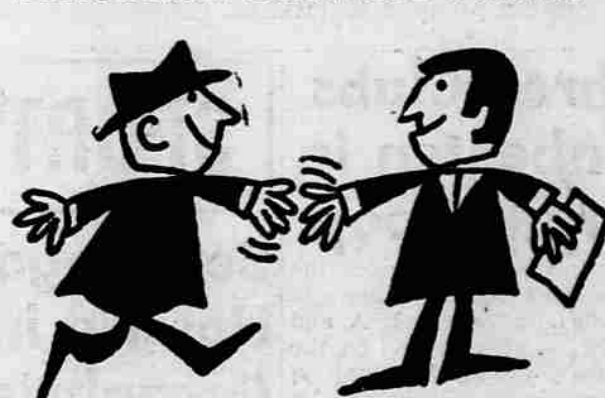
