

Wildlife Allied To Soil, Water Conservation

(Editor's note: This is another in a series of articles being published in connection with Conservation Week, which is being observed this week.)

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Wildlife conservation is allied completely with the conservation of soil and water. All of our natural resources are interrelated and need to be considered on an overall basis. Wildlife is dependent upon water and the products of the soil for its existence and well being.

Conservation, in its most widely accepted interpretation, means "wise use." This means the orderly and systematic use of nature's bounty as a harvestable crop. Wildlife stands among the many resources that are classified as "renewable" in the same sense that trees are a renewable crop.

Closely Akin

However, wildlife is more closely akin to the annual crops such as grains and other foods because it is renewed with each season so long as food, cover, and water are present and breeding stock is maintained at an adequate level.

With proper protection of adult birds and animals during the nesting and mating seasons, proper consideration of their needs, an annual harvest of the surplus can be anticipated. This then, is the concept of wise use, and man is the steward of the natural resources of the land on which he lives. Man must bear in mind that he is only a transient upon the earth and a custodian, not an owner, of its resources.

Used wisely and treated with consideration, nature can and will provide for the welfare of the generations yet to come.

The purpose of the event was to enable students enrolled in vocational agriculture to identify different soil factors such as surface, subsoil depth, texture structure and fertility and to make recommendations for a given soil's capabilities and use.

The contest was set up and supervised by Art King, conservation specialist from Oregon State college.

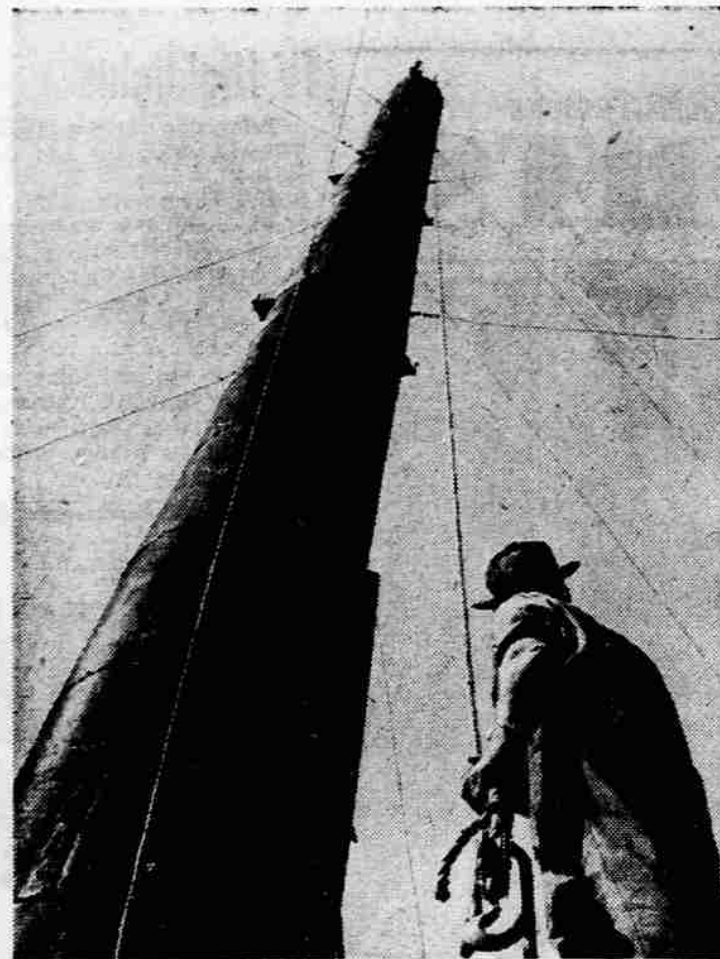
Two numbers will be played by the school band, "Walk Hand in Hand With Me," and "Graduation Day." The band will also play music for the processional and recessional.

Drivers Licenses Suspended Listed

Salem—The department of motor vehicles has released names of 329 drivers whose licenses were ordered suspended during the period beginning May 7 and ending May 9.

Length of suspension varies, depending on charges involved, recommendation of court, discretionary action by the department or requirements of Oregon law. The department said some of the licenses involving financial responsibility and court recommendations may have been re-instated after suspension was ordered.

The department warned drivers that the penalty for driving while suspended is a jail sentence of no less than two days and up to six months, and there may be imposed a fine up to \$500. Under licensing procedures, this will also result in an additional year of suspension.

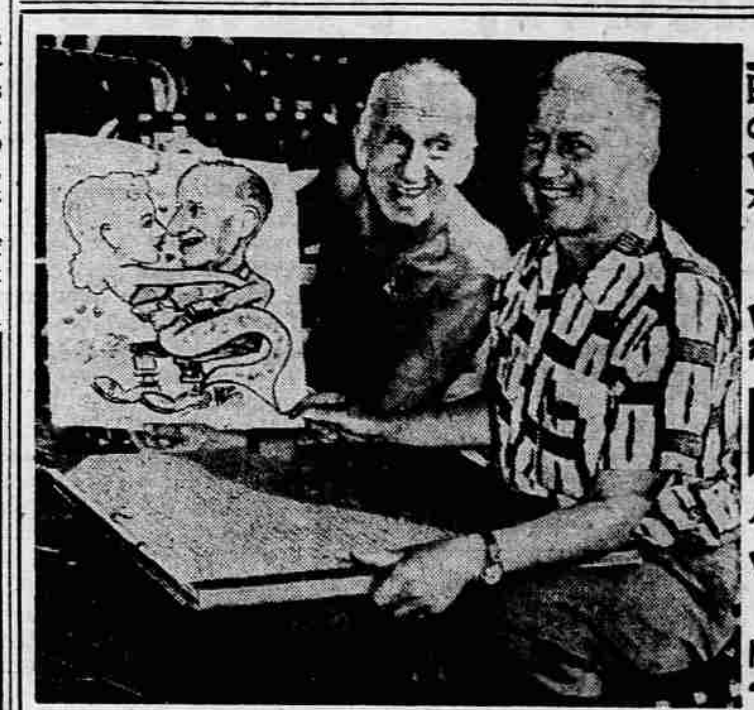

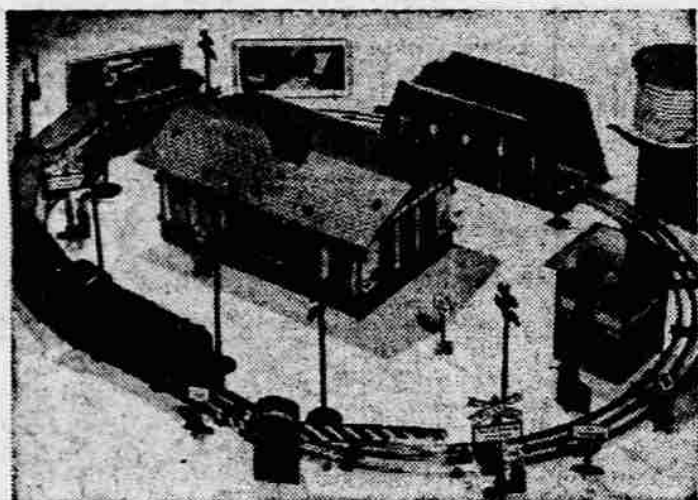
