Walnut Trees Need To Be Pollinated

As a result of cold weather none of the walnut trees in the valley still have catkins, that part of the tree which pollinates the blooms, according to Clifford B. Cordy, county horticulturist.

To insure a walnut crop, tree owners should contact a pollen producer immediately and have them airmail the needed pollen, he explained. Since walnut tree pollen is naturally air borne, Cordy said the pollen may be applied by airplane.

He said that this should be done within the next several days or the blooms will be too old to be pollinated. The agent reminded growers that walnut trees should also be sprayed for blight at this time if blight has been a problem in the past.
