Law Seen Necessary To Borrow Money For Jobless Fund

Salem — Enactment of a law will be necessary to permit the State Unemployment Compensation Commission to borrow \$14 million from the federal government to bolster Oregon's sagging unemployment compensation fund, according to Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton.

The opinion was requested by State Treasurer Sig Unander who questioned his authority as custodian of the fund to pay out the federal monies.

Gov. Robert D. Holmes, who has requested the loan when the unemployment fund fell below its \$31,500,000 floor, replied immediately that he still thought the loan was "sound economy."

Friendly Suit Likely
The governor said he had asked for the loan after consulting with his legal advisor.

The governor further suggested that a "friendly suit" probably would be initiated by an employer to test Thornton's opinion.

In his opinion, Thornton stated that the only powers that a state official or agency possesses are those such as are expressly granted by law or necessarily implied from them.

He said there was no such language in the Oregon unemployment compensation law to enable either the governor or the commission to apply for the loan.

Employer Rates Affected
Thornton said Michigan, Ohio and Alaska had enacted laws to permit such loans.

The opinion left the matter of rates paid by employers into the fund temporarily in doubt. The loan saved many of them from increases to the maximum 2.8 per cent payment.

E. Nordyke, assistant attorney general for the commission, said he had not advised the governor in the matter but had told the commission that its request complied with federal law and was constitutional.

Nordyke said he told the commission his opinion would be subject to later ruling by Thornton.

16 State Employees Get Suggestion Pay

Salem — Sixteen Oregon state employees who submitted suggestions to save the state money have been awarded \$700.

Airline Denies Control Charges

Denver — Continental Airlines President Robert Six categorically has denied a charge by California Eastern Aviation, Inc., that Continental is controlled illegally by Chase Manhattan Bank of New York City.

"This appears to be a move of desperation on the part of a disappointed applicant in the Dallas-West case," Six said in a prepared statement, "obviously designed to confuse and cloud the issue in the case."

Six pointed out California Eastern was not recommended for the routes for which Continental had won designation.

The West Coast carrier charged in a petition filed with the Civil Aeronautics Board that Continental was in default on an \$18 million loan from Chase "with the result that Continental now operates only at the sufferance of Chase."

Six said the figures were "completely misleading and the statements were not true."

Ticket To Own Son

Portland — Traffic Patrolman John Yadon said Thursday he issued jaywalking citations to three youths Wednesday night. One of them was his 14-year-old son.

"I warned my boy many times before about jaywalking," Yadon said. "He had it coming to him."

Fisherman Trades Shirt for Fish

Memphis, Tenn. — Larry Williams is the type of fisherman who will give the shirt off his back for a mess of fish.

The bass at nearby Pickwick Lake were striking, but only on plugs with a fringed rubber skirt or wiggling pork-rind trailer. Williams could find not a single lure of this type in his tackle box.

So he cut a thin strip of cloth from his shirttail, tied it to a plug and offered it to the bass. It was taken. His success continued, but the cloth grew frayed quickly and he had to cut another strip.

When he arrived home, Williams was shirtless—but he had a box full of bass.

Idaho University Dormitory Burns

Moscow, Idaho — Fire swept through the Campus Club men's dormitory at the University of Idaho Wednesday night, but all of the 109 students living in the structure escaped.

The building, erected in 1934 as a temporary unit, was a total loss. Damage estimates ran as high as \$200,000.

The club, which was shaped like a big "U," was across the street from Gault hall which was set ablaze by an arsonist in 1956 and which took the lives of three students.

Building Permit For Portland Hotel Issued

Portland — The city of Portland has issued a \$4 million building permit for construction of the nine-story Portland Sheraton hotel.

Work already is under way on footings for the new luxury-type hostelry which will rise on an east side site adjacent to the multi-million dollar Lloyd shopping center.

Salem — A record total of 14,382 convictions for traffic violations was reported by the Department of Motor Vehicles for April.

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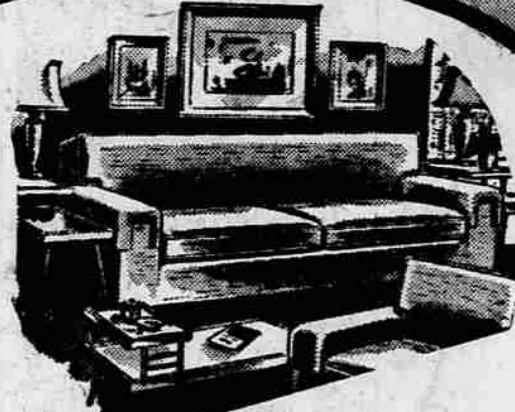


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
