

Mantle Saves Day for Yanks With Catch in Ninth Inning

A spectacular ninth-inning catch by Mickey Mantle cut short a Washington Senators' threat and preserved a 6-5 victory for the New York Yankees Saturday.

The victory, credited to starter Bobby Shantz, stretched the Yanks' lead to six

games in the American league "race." Ryne Duren, who relieved Shantz in the eighth, gave up a single in the ninth to Albie Pearson and then walked Clint Courtney with two out. Julio Becquer batted for Eddie Yost and slammed a long drive that looked good for ex-

tra bases. Mantle, however, tore after the ball and barely gloved it for the final out. Pitcher Ray Moore hit a home run and combined with Gerry Staley to pitch a four-hitter that gave the White Sox a 3-2 decision over the Indians.

Moore was credited with his first victory of the year al-

though he had to retire in the seventh after injuring his shoulder. The White Sox scored what proved to be the deciding runs in the fourth home runs by Ron Jackson and Moore. It was the White Sox' seventh victory in their last 10 games.

Don Buddin's three-run homer in the eighth inning powered the Red Sox to a 7-4 triumph over the Orioles in the opener of a day-night doubleheader.

Buddin's homer highlighted a four-run rally that hung the first defeat of the season on Jack Harshman after five straight victories.

Jackie Jensen hit his seventh homer for Boston. Detroit was at Kansas City in a night game.

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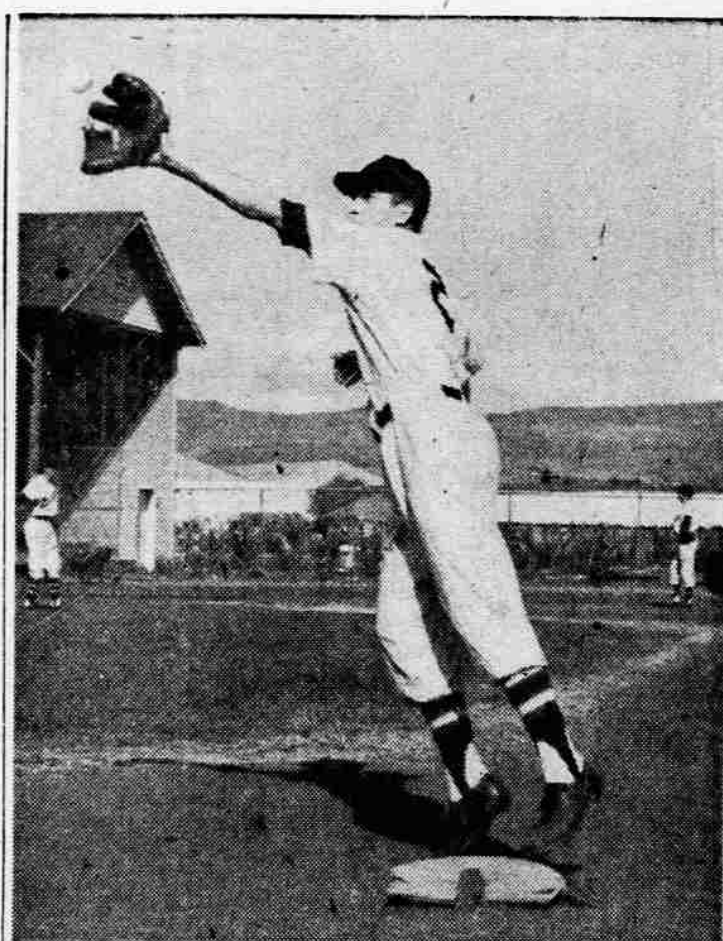

Once again Jockey Ismael Valenzuela, riding for the first time in the second jewel of turfdom's triple crown, let Tim Tam settle down into his best stride before asking the son of Tom Fool to run his heart out.

Silky Sullivan, a bust in the Kentucky Derby when he finished 12th, was little better today. In typical fashion the colt from California dropped about 40 lengths behind the field in the first quarter of a mile. He started his "big run" from the rear when he reached the turn leading to the stretch.

Old Silky passed horses but he only passed the tired tailenders and was for back in eighth position when Tim Tam scampered across the finish line, the sixth Preakness winner for famed Calumet Farm.

Medford high's Black Tornado remained strong in contention for loop and district honor and Ashland was out of the chase after "white-wash" in Southern Oregon conference baseball.

Four games on Friday matched loop rivals and in each ruckus the loser was shut out. The Tornado blanked Ashland 5 to 0 in its doubleheader which had bearing on the standings and also waltzed off with the kings' second engagement 8 to 0.

Klamath Falls captured its league scrape with Crater 9 to 0 on no-hit tossing by Blake Griggs and the Comets of Central Point made a split of it by grabbing the non-conference second mix 7 to 0.

Friday results put Medford just one game behind circuit-pacing Grants Pass. Final conflicts of the regular loop campaign are set for next Friday with Medford at Klamath Falls and Grants Pass at Ashland. Triumphs by Medford and Ashland in these encounters would knot the Tornado and GP Cavemen for the conference banner and force a play-off to determine which would represent District 6 A-1 in the state eliminations.

Heaves Three-Hitter
Grants Pass saw non-league activity Friday night defeating Glendale 10 to 7.

Dennis Barr limited Ashland to three hits and Calvin and Lowell Dean and Ron Peery provided the bulk of the hitting power for Medford Friday in the first game victory over the Grizzlies. Barr issued no bases on balls and struck out six batters. Thanks to errorless fielding, the only Ashland runners who reached the base paths were those who hit safely. Grizzlies were retired in one-two-three order in five innings.

The two Deans and Peery each had two hits in three times up. Calvin drove in three of the Tornado runs. He and Dick Durante slapped doubles and Lowell a triple.

Tom Laurance chucked a one-hitter for Medford over the five innings of the second game although he walked six batters, including three to fill the bases in the fourth inning. He fanned two.
