

Crusaders 2nd in State B Meet; Michael Sets Discuss Standard

St. Mary's High school of Medford, District 3B champ, but unheralded outside of southern Oregon, finished second behind the potent Enterprise aggregation Saturday in the Oregon Class B track meet at Springfield.

Carl Michael of the Crusaders established a new standard of 152 feet even in the discuss.

Enterprise rolled up 76 points to outdistance the rest of the field. St. Mary's recorded 34. Cove was third with 30, all scored by Jim Puckett, sensation sprinter, who established new marks in the

100 and 220-yard dashes and won the broad jump.

Thirty-nine schools, in all, were represented in the B extravaganza and others among the top finishers were Wallowa 26 3/5, Merrill 26, Powers 24, Union 23, and Corbett 20 3/5.

St. Mary's took second in the relay. Terry Cooper of the Crusaders was third in the javelin and Dick Hayes third in the quarter-mile and Dick Evans was fourth in the mile. Jerry Kerr of the Medford school was running third 30 yards from the finish. He looked around to determine

how to pass another runner and tripped on the track curbing.

Michael's discuss toss was more than seven feet better than the former standard of 144 feet 5 1/2 inches set by Roger Power of Enterprise in 1954.

Dowell Ties

Marion Dowell collected six points for Jacksonville, tying for second place in the high jump with two other competitors.

Puckett ran the 100 in :09.6, which is also better than the state school best of :09.8. His 220 time was :22.2 and he set

the record of :22.1 in the Friday prelims. Puckett's winning broad jump was 21-3 1/2.

Other new B marks were set by Frank Marsh, Wallowa, with :20.6 in low hurdles, and Robert Thrust, Camas Valley, with 12 feet even in the pole vault. Additional winners and their marks were:

Ernest Barnes Honored At University of Arizona

When University of Arizona at Tucson held its 44th annual University Week activities on May 9 and 10 Ernest L. Barnes, retired Medford insurance claims adjuster, was the honored guest.

Barnes, member of the Class of 1913, at Arizona, and a track star in his own right, originated University Week in 1912. Last week end's activities were dedicated to him.

"I don't really remember how I got the idea," Barnes told Abe Chanin, Arizona Daily Star writer. "I was founder and editor of the university newspaper . . . and I was writing sports for the . . . Star."

"I just figured we didn't have enough sports in the state. There were only four or five high schools in the Arizona Territory in '11. I talked to anyone who would listen and the next year I got the okay to go ahead and bring the high school kids in to baseball and track. They also had some singing, sewing and spelling contests. But I wasn't interested in that."

SOC Raider Diamondmen Wrap Up Conference Mantle

Ashland—Southern Oregon college wrapped up the Oregon Collegiate conference title in big style yesterday afternoon when they downed Eastern Oregon 10-1 and 16-1 in a doubleheader after a 9-5 victory Friday.

The men of SOC ended with an OCC record of 11-1 with their only loss being to Portland State by one run.

SOC had no trouble in winning. Raider pitchers in the doubleheader limited the Wolves of EOC to only five hits. Jim Eggers won the first game, yielding three hits

while striking out six and walking only two. Jack Brown capped the second on a two-hitter striking out six and walking five.

Dave D'Ilvo won the Friday game. In the process he gave up nine hits and struck out six without walking a batter in nine innings.

Good Power

The Raiders showed their usual good power in knocking out four home runs in the three games in addition to getting six other extra base hits without EOC getting any. Friday's game was high-

lighted by Chuck Nevi's timely homer for SOC which broke up a 5-5 tie in the sixth inning. The Raiders kept right on going in the frame and scored three more runs to wrap up the victory.

In the first game Saturday the Raiders jumped off to a 3-1 lead on three singles to Willie Jones, Jim McAbee and Larry Maurer with two runs being driven in by Maurer. Phil Sword's sacrifice fly accounted for the third run.

SOC got one more in the fourth and three each in the fifth and sixth. Eldon Francis sparked the fifth stanza, when he stole home after going in to run for Sword.

Not wasting any time Southern Oregon pushed across five runs in the first inning of the finale which started with three straight walks.

Ron Maurer the fourth hitter got on by an error. Two runs scored, followed by Leroy King's single for two more markers. Gordie Thoreson got the fifth on a sacrifice fly to center.

McAbee, Francis Steal

McAbee scored a lone run in the second but it was like he owned the Wolves pitcher. McAbee walked to start things and stole second and third and finally home during the pitcher's full windup.

Ray Weinhold came up with a home run in the third for SOC which accounted for two runs and Eldon Francis knocked another in the fourth which rolled all the way to the track in deep left field.

In the sixth inning Francis stole home for the second time after walking and moving to third on a single.

From here the Raiders may play a series with the University of Portland for the district NAIA championship in about 10 days in Portland. The date has not been set yet and won't be known until next week.

Oregon Tech Winner Over SOS Thinclads

Ashland — Six field and six meet records in addition to one home college record fell in the dual track meet which saw Oregon Tech down the Red Raiders of Southern Oregon by a count of 74-57 here last Friday afternoon.

Eldon Francis in winning the javelin with a toss of 196 feet 9 inches, broke the field, meet, and SO college record of 193-4 which he set earlier in the year against OTL.

Jerry Fasten of Oregon Tech shattered four records

when he won the discuss and shot put with distance of 138-10 and 46-2 to eclipse the old mark of 137-5 and 45-6.

Bob Brown set the new standard for field and meet in the 100 yard dash with a timing of :09.9 while Dick Hoevar wrote marks in the high and low hurdles with times of :15.4 in the highs and :23.1.

Doyle Lemley with a first in the high jump, Jack Johnson in the 880, Millard Marsh in the broad jump, and Gary Clayton in the pole vault picked up the only other first places for the Raiders.

Southern Oregon came near scaring Oregon Tech when it led 51-48 with four events to go. OTT won these.

Next week end the Oregon Collegiate conference meet will be held here in Ashland. Oregon Tech will be a slight favorite over Portland State to retain the title won last year.

In addition to the athletic events of the first University Week, oratory, algebra and music were added. This year the high school representatives coming to the campus were entered in baseball, track, tennis, golf, gymnastics and smallbore rifle rivalry.

Barnes, who spent his early life in South America and the West Indies, completed grammar school education at Prescott. He entered University of Arizona in 1909.
