## Incumbents Win In Justice Race

Portland—Both incumbent Supreme Court justices up for election won in Friday's primary.

Justice George Rossman, a long-time veteran on the high court, outdistanced Jason Lee, his younger opponent. Nearly complete returns gave Rossman 282,064 to 202,091 for the Salem attorney.

Justice Gordon Sloan of Astoria, an appointee of Gov. Robert Holmes who had the backing of the Oregon State Bar, polled a majority of votes in the three-way race for the other position.

With most precincts reporting, Sloan had 245,221 to 143,796 for State Senate President Boyd Overhulse of Madras and 64,127 for Samuel Bowe, Grants Pass attorney.

## Portland Downs Manager Plan

Portland—An urban renewal measure on Portland city ballots appeared to have been approved on the basis of late and final returns.

The proposition would call for a five-year \$40,000 special levy to match Federal funds for clearance of a blighted area south of the Civic auditorium and construction there of new office buildings, apartments, light industries and parking places.

Urban renewal had the enthusiastic backing of labor groups who saw in it a chance for thousands of new jobs. Federal approval of the Portland urban renewal plan was announced shortly before the primary election and its promise of more than 11 million dollars in Federal funds spurred interest in the issue.

## Voters Say No To City Transit

Portland—Voters here Friday were outspoken in their overwhelming rejection of a plan for municipal ownership of the mass transit system.

The measure on the ballot would have created a mass transit authority and envisioned a tax levy to support the system now privately owned by a San Francisco firm. Voters apparently felt that the transit system should be supported by users rather than by all taxpayers.

City Commissioner William Bowes said he was sorry to see the measure fail and predicted it was "inevitable" that the proposition would be on the ballot again.

## Incumbent Official Leads In Pendleton

Pendleton—Incumbent County Commissioner Roscoe Kelley led a field of six candidates for his position in incomplete returns from Friday's primary.

## Victory of Salem Mayor In Senate Race Big Upset

Portland—One of the biggest upsets of races for nomination to the Oregon State Senate was the victory of Salem Mayor Robert White and State Rep. Eddie Ahrens, Turner, over incumbent Sid Schiesinger on the Republican ticket.

With returns complete, White had 11,454 votes, Ahrens, 10,990, and Schiesinger, 10,093.

In Linn county, Oliver P. Butts, Albany, beat out his rivals Jack Draper, Albany, and Harry R. Wiley, Lebanon, on the Democratic ticket. Republican Milvin Goode, Albany, won his party's nomination.

Nearly complete returns from Clackamas county showed Zenas A. Olson, West Linn, and Mrs. Gladys H. Young, Oswego, had edged out Willard G. Brady.

**Sweetland In**  
Both Richard E. Groener, Milwaukie, and Monroe Sweetland, also Milwaukie, were assured of nomination on the Democratic ticket in Clackamas county.

William A. Greenfield Jr. and Alice Corbett won the Democratic nomination for State Senator from Multnomah county in a field of six candidates including Rep. Don Willner, Portland.

A. A. Horsfeldt and Harriet P. Krause, both Portland, won over John Morgan for the Republican senatorial nomination from Multnomah county.

In a Umatilla county battle, Loyd M. Key, Milton-Freewater, appeared to have edged out Dan C. Bartlett, Hermiston, for the Democratic nomination to the state senate.

State Sen. Leander Quiring, Hermiston, was unopposed for the Republican nomination from Umatilla county.

Unopposed and assured of nomination were such veteran legislators as Edwin E. Cone, Eugene; Donald R. Hubbard, Eugene; Walter Leth, Salem; Dan Thiel, Astoria; Bill Holmstrom, Gearheart; and George Layman, Newberg.

Some races for the House of Representatives saw Democrats Tom Monahan, Juanita Orr and Beulah J. Hand nominated in Clackamas county along with Republicans Robert P. Dickinson, Leonard Mullian and Ralph Cherrick.

A Republican race for state representative in the West Sub-district of Multnomah county saw Reps. Shirley Field and Sam Wilderman and Pat Lonergan victors.

**Mrs. Young Victor**  
Republicans Don B. Card, Richard W. De Neffe and Mrs. Frederic W. Young won out in the South City Subdistrict.

In the East Central City Subdistrict Gust Anderson, William J. Gallagher, John D. Goss and Fred Meek were all winners.

An East County Subdistrict Republican race saw Marsh F. Dunkin, Elizabeth Giles and David W. Young nominated.

Democrats Keith Burns, John R. Churchill and Jeanette Davis won nominations

in the West Subdistrict of Multnomah county.

Democratic Victors in the South City Subdistrict were Harold B. Christopher and incumbents Norman R. Howard and Grace O. Peck.

In the East Central City Subdistrict Democrats George K. Callas, Harry W. Guerin, Allen Hoffard and Howard R. Lee were nominated.

Incumbent Ray Dooley won on the Democratic ticket in the North City Subdistrict

Davis will succeed retiring Judge Carl E. Wimberly.

## Exposition Shift Plan Turned Down

Portland—An attempt to move Portland's Exposition-Recreation center from its present construction site was defeated in voting in the primary election.

A movement headed by used car dealer Joe Dobbins had succeeded in getting the site change issue on the ballot but it was snuffed under by voters who were informed that more than two million dollars had already been spent on the present Broadway bridge site.

Construction of the center was expected to move ahead at full speed following the expression of voter opinion on the site. A contract was ready to be let on rough grading at the tract that has already been cleared of homes, churches and business structures.

## Langley Trailing In Multnomah

Portland—William Langley, who was removed as Multnomah county district attorney after his misdemeanor conviction of failing to prosecute a gambling operator, was trailing Charles E. Raymond Saturday in the Democratic race for nomination of district attorney of Multnomah county.

Attorneys Don Walker and Larry Landgraver were in a close race for the GOP nod.

## City Manager Plan Voted In Klamath
