Backstairs: 'Stresses Idea Exchange'

Washington — President Eisenhower believes the "people-to-people" program is a major tool in his quest for lasting peace.

The program is based on exchange and contacts of private individuals — scientists, educators, students, and just plain citizens — on a nation-to-nation basis. Its purpose is to promote better understanding among different nationalities. It doesn't grab big headlines like foreign aid, reciprocal trade and other major foreign policy programs. Neither has the President made it the main theme of a major foreign policy speech.

But Eisenhower seldom passes up an opportunity to plug for the program when talking off-the-cuff to groups representing more than one nation.

In a recent talk in the White House rose garden to members of the Arthropod association of the English-Speaking world, the President summarized his strong convictions about the people-to-people program.

"I am convinced, from the top of my head to the bottom of my feet, that there is no enemy among people when those people get to know each other . . . the more we can spread the doctrine of people being guided by normal human aspirations, common objectives in life, common values that they treasure among themselves, by that much more we will advance the human race . . . above all things in the way it can live in peace . . ."

The President has been a principal in many public ceremonies in the past 15 years. But he still depends on his aides to keep him straight on where to stand, where to sit, and other such details.

Shortly before a recent ceremony got underway, the

President stepped over to his defense aides and said: "I just wanted to come over and see if I needed any instructions."

A group of ballet dancers presented a private performance for the President at the White House recently. The star, at least to him, was his granddaughter, Barbara Ann Eisenhower, who will be nine May 30.

Maj. John Eisenhower and his family, who live in nearby Alexandria, Va., stayed at the White House for part of the

The President has ruled out the possibility of taking Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery on a tour of another Civil War battlefield during the British leader's visit at the White House this week.

A year ago, they stirred up a considerable rumpus south of the Mason-Dixon line by criticizing the way Confederate Gen. Robert E. Lee fought the battle of Gettysburg. During a tour of the battlefield, Eisenhower agreed with Montgomery that both Lee and Gen. George C. Meade of the Union forces should have been sacked.
