The Family Council Integration Said Successful At Little Rock

The Family Council does not give advice; it merely reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Maurice T.—How can I win back her love?

Marilyn T.—He's like a stranger to me.

Maurice T.—My wife and I are 30 years old and have been married ten years. We have three children.

Perhaps we were married too young or something, but anyway things have not worked out very happily for us. The record of our married life is filled with illnesses, debts and struggle and we have had no time for pleasure.

I realize I am very much to blame for leaving my wife to bear the brunt of the burden. I wanted very much to get a college education and I went to school at night, leaving her alone nearly every evening. Now I have the degree, but I don't know what good it's doing me. I seem to have lost my wife's love and don't know how to win it back.

Marilyn T.—I don't know what's come over Maurice, but all of a sudden, after all these years, he has become aware he has a wife. He can't understand why I don't show him affection.

All I can see is it's kind of late in our married life for him to suddenly start being interested in affection. He is almost a stranger to me, he has had so little to do with me and the kids in all these years.

I used to beg him to stay home one evening when the kids were ill, but he would have none of us. He had to go to school. I think his school was just an escape from all our problems. I was tied hand and foot while he was enjoying himself.

The Council.—The rift between Maurice and his wife is certainly a very old and deep one and much effort is needed to repair it.

From both statements we do not see that this couple

had very unusual problems. A young couple with three children must face illness and struggle—and usually debts as well. Yet most manage to find some happiness.

Most wives feel great joy and pride at their husband's achievements. It is possible Maurice did use his studies for a bit of escape, but we think he deserves some credit for choosing this particular form. Many men settle for drink, nagging or a variety of sordid entertainments.

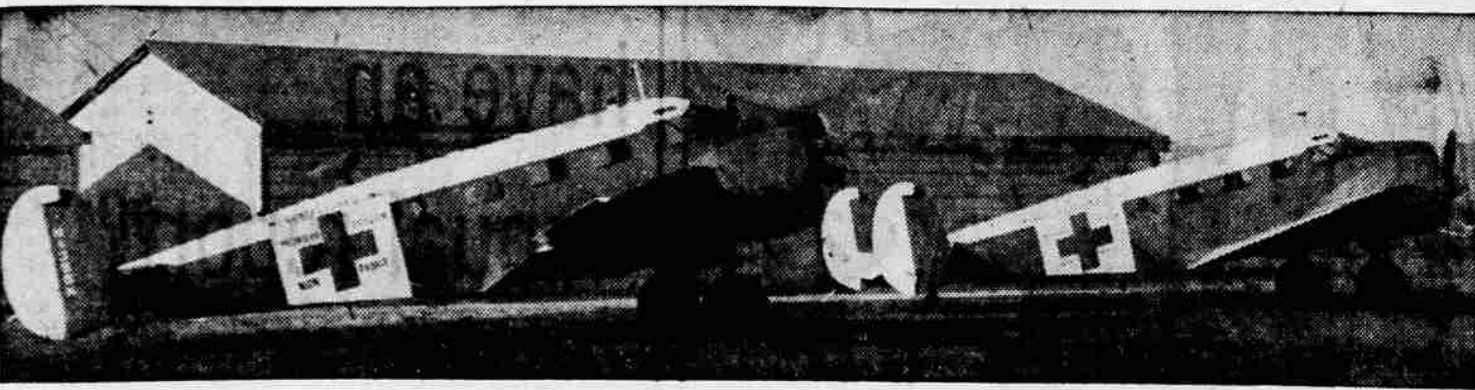
Why did Marilyn feel no pleasure in her husband's efforts to improve both his lot and that of his family? Possibly, Maurice did not confide in her, explaining his hopes, ambitions and objectives. This was his fault. But it was also Marilyn's fault for not trying to understand. Perhaps her bitter, hostile attitude made it hard for him to explain and turned him farther away from her and into his studies for fulfillment.

This college degree will probably benefit the family by enlarging Maurice's career horizons. Even if it does not do this, the family will benefit by Maurice's enriched background. Marilyn seems to have overlooked the fact that she too may be able to find some relief from worry and tedium through an interest in the larger world.

Maurice appears to have a great capacity to grow and a powerful desire to enlarge and fulfill his life. He has much to offer a wife who is not determined to suffer and bear a mountain-sized chip on her shoulder.

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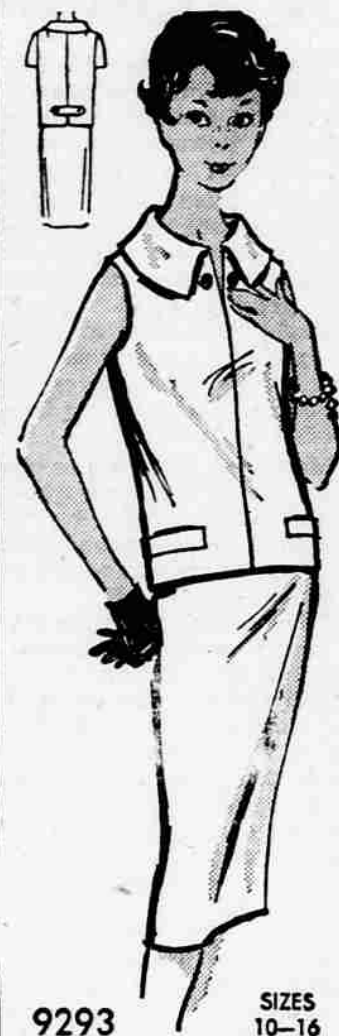
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Medford Student Wins Oregon State Honor

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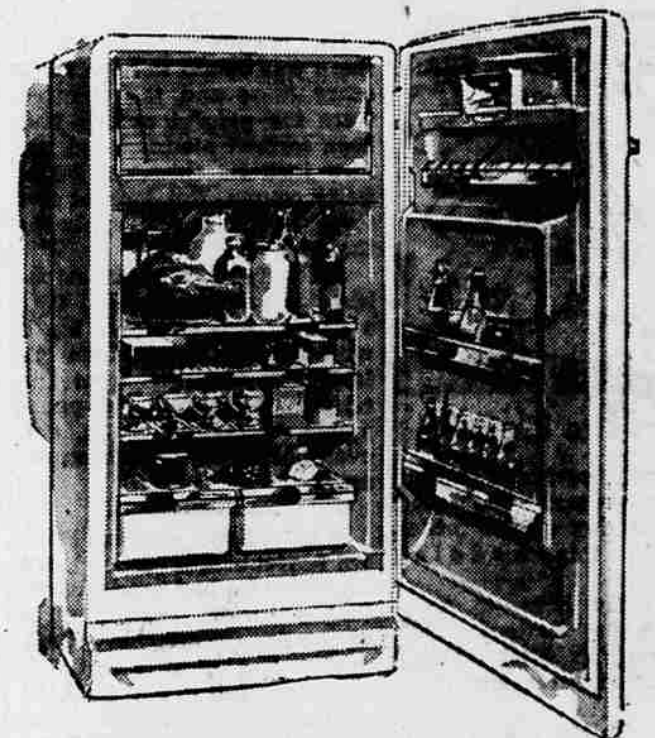


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
