

Grants Pass District 6 A-1 Cinder Champ; Medford Second in Tussle

Grants Pass—Grants Pass High school's rampaging Cavemen will travel to Corvallis next week end packed with depth in their effort to claim the Oregon Class A-1 title hardware in track and field.

The Cavemen, stacking up 198 counters yesterday to bust Medford High's five-year hold on the District 6 championships, nabbed both first and second places in six con-

tests, winner's ribbons in four other events, and a second place in another. Since victors and runners-up qualified for the state meet berths, Grants Pass gained 17 of the district's 28 berths for the annual Oregon prep cinder carnival at Oregon State college, May 30 and 31.

In the overwhelming victory by the Climate city scintillated, javelin flier Glenn Winningham and pole valuter

Mike Sparlin cracked district records, and sprintman Marvin Terry and hurdler Jim Marymott were double winners.

Medford Second

Medford ran second in yesterday's meet with 120½ tallies, the only other school to exceed 100 points. The Tornado took three firsts and collected eight spots in the state engagement.

Other scores were Klamath

Falls 50, Crater 32½ and Ashland 30, and each of those three qualified one state meet entrant.

State Champion Winningham threw the spear 205 feet 7¼ inches for the Cavemen to shatter the 192-5¾ mark set by Medford's Ed Bingham in 1953. Sparlin pushed the vault height to 12-6, erasing the 12-4½ record put in the book last year by two other Cavemen, Phil Paquin and Stan Lewman.

Grants Pass one-two punch was in the two hurdle events, the two dashes, the mile and the half-mile.

Marymott zipped over the high barriers in :14.9 and over the lows in :20.5 and teammate Chuck Rembert was next to the tape in each race. Terry took the 100-yard dash in :10.3 and the 220 in :22.6. He was followed across the line on both occasions by Jim Klett.

Armstrong Darkhorse

Ken Simmons ran the mile in 4:36. Steve Anderson, GP, beat Medford's Mark Norton for second spot. Walt Morrison's 880-yard triumph for the Cavemen was in 2:02.7. Longshot Cavemen who took second ribbon was Jim Armstrong. Both he and Don Isensee, Klamath Falls, outran Bruce Hill, Medford, one of the half-mile favorites.

Other GP firsts were by Fred Thomas with 5:10½ in the high jump and in the relay with Jim Peebles. Terry Marymott and Klett combining for 1:32.4. Mike Rose qualified for state for GP with a second in the discuss.

Mike Murray won the shot put for Medford with 54-2 and Jim Funston of the Tornado was runner-up with 51-3. Mike Russell and Ron Reich provided Medford with another one-two in the 440-yard run. Russell won with :51.1 and Reich overcame the bid of GP freshman Ray Meek for second in :51.8. Medford's George Koch leaped 21-1½ to take the broad jump.

Stubblefield Wins Discuss

Second places for the Tornado included Henry Courtney with 5-9½ in the high jump, John Harvey with 12 feet in the pole vault and the relay team of Reich, Dave Bergman, Leonard Griggs and Russell with 1:33.1.

Jerry Stubblefield, Ashland, repeated as district discuss champion with 148-6. Gordon Sellers, Klamath Falls, with 20-10½ in the broad jump, John Burns, Crater, with 173-9½ in the javelin, took seconds to qualify for a Corvallis jaunt.

Winningham actually broke the old javelin record twice Saturday. He had a 199-1 heave in the morning pre-lims. Sparlin tried three times to up the district vault standard to 13 feet. He nearly made it twice, bumping the bar with his arm on those attempts.

Future Rivalry

Half-milers Armstrong, Isensee and Hill will be after each other for another couple of years since all are sophomores. Hill in taking fourth yesterday ran in 2:05.4, compared to his season best of 2:01.5. Anderson in taking second in the mile was clocked in 4:38.8. Norton had a time of 4:43.8. His best has been 4:41.7.

Koch in the broad jump beat Sellers with his last jump. In the preliminaries Koch led with 20-7, but the Klamath leaper topped that in the finals before the Medford jumper hit his 21-13½.

Five men in the pole vault went 11-6 or better. Jim Eldred, Crater, had 11-9 and Skip Bennett, Medford, and Lee Holmes, GP, each 11-6.

Preliminary events in both the A-1 and A-2 state meets are next Friday with finals on Saturday.

Antonelli, Mays Spur Giant Win

Johnny Antonelli and Willie Mays, who carried the Giants to their last pennant in New York, just could be the guys who bring them their first in San Francisco.

No longer regarded as a second-division team on a hot streak, the Giants regained the National league lead Friday night, when they beat Warren Spahn and the Milwaukee Braves, 5-3. It was a "big one" because the Braves had routed the Giants Thursday night and were sending the unbeaten Spahn after his seventh straight victory.

So—Antonelli, flashing his 1954 21-victory form, hurled a three-hitter and Mays, blasting away on the hottest streak of his career, smashed a two-run ninth-inning homer to break up the pitchers' battle. The homer was Willie's second game-winner in three games and his 12th of the month—only four fewer than Ralph Kiner's N.L. record for one month.

Busts Up No-Hitter

Spahn, seeking his 231st win, pitched a no-hitter for 6 1/3 innings and led, 3-0 on a pair of homers by Ed Matthews and Del Crandall. But Mays broke the hitless spell with a single that helped produce a run in the seventh, and successive homers by rookies Bob Schmidt and Willie Kirkland tied the score in the eighth.

That set the stage for a ninth-inning hero—and that's a role Willie just can't resist these days. Danny O'Connell singled and then Mays exploded his 12th homer in 14 games over the left field fence.

Antonelli, who had only a 12-18 record last season, now has a 4-3 record and has pitched three straight strong games. Aside from Mays, Manager Bill Rigney calls him "the key man of the club."

Logging Conference Slated in Eugene

Eugene—The 21st annual conference of the Oregon Logging Conference, formerly known as the Willamette Valley Logging Conference, will be held Feb. 26-28, 1959, in Eugene.

General theme of the meeting will center around "Taxes and the Timber Industry of the State of Oregon." The usual equipment display will be held in connection with the conference.

Carl Raynor of Booth Kelly Lumber company, conference president, made the announcement in pointing out the change in the name of the organization. The change was necessary to eliminate a misconception of the area served, he said.

The Oregon conference will continue its affiliation with the Pacific Logging Congress, Raynor said. He pointed out that his group is the only organization of its kind directing its conference toward the needs and problems of the timber industry of the entire state of Oregon.

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Southern Oregon Cops Fourth Straight OCC Tennis Diadem

Ashland—Southern Oregon college romped to victory for the fourth straight time in the Oregon Collegiate conference tennis competition here in a two-day tourney that ended yesterday.

Bob Gouley of the cham-

pion Red Raiders gained honors in the singles division and the team of Bruce Merrill and Jack Jacobson took the doubles crown for SOC.

Southern Oregon totaled 13 points with Oregon College of Education second with five

and Portland State third with four. Points were awarded by the number of matches won.

Gouley had to come from behind to win the singles crown over Portland State's Don Akre. Gouley lost the first set 2-6 but came back to win the second 6-2 and 6-3.

Gouley had, earlier in the day, beaten teammate Bill Isaacs 6-3, 6-1, for the right to play Akre for the title while Akre had to win from Jacobson 6-3 and 6-4.

Merrill and Jacobson beat Zel Gernhart and Bill Ritchie of OCE for the doubles championship 6-0 and 6-1. Both teams were representing their schools at the number two teams.

Merrill and Jacobson had beaten Bill Johnson and Elton Gregory of OCE in the semifinals while Gernhart and Ritchie in three sets at Isaacs and Gouley of SOC.

The four-team tournament Red Raiders are coached by Dr. "Skip" Alva.

USC Takes 17th Win In Coast Track Meet

Berkeley, Calif.—Powder-packed Southern California won its 17th Pacific Coast conference track and field meet Saturday, but some of

the Trojans' glory was overshadowed by California's Don Bowden and Willie White.

Bowden set a conference record by winning the mile in 4:03.7, while White came out the day's only double winner as he posted victories in the 100 and 220-yard dashes.

Two other meet records, which had been set during Friday's qualifying, easily stood up today. Rink Bakke of Southern California who set a mark in the discus Friday with a heave of 186 feet, 8 inches, stayed within that mark although he tossed the platter 186 feet, 3½ inches in Saturday's competition.

Rafer Johnson of UCLA did not compete in the javelin after he qualified Friday with a meet mark of 243 feet, 10½ inches.

Bowden won the mile in what also was a record for Edwards stadium after Stanford's Norm Lloyd, who had dogged him for the first three laps, faded at the gun last. Jim Grelle of Oregon came in second, about five yards back.

California's long-strider did not defend his 880-yard crown which went to teammate Jerry Siebert in 1:51.

Four meet champions retained crowns and three of them were Trojans. Max Truex of USC won the two-mile by about 50 yards and in the time of 9:05.4. Teammate Bob Lawson retained his high hurdles championship, while Bakke remained king of the discus. Lawson won the hurdles in 14.2.

Terry Tobacco of Washington joined the Big Four by winning the 440 in 47.1 to keep the quarter mile crown.

Beaverton Nabs Title

Portland—Steve Pauly, Beaverton high school, came within two-tenths of tying the national prep high hurdles record Friday and led his team to a lop-sided victory over all opponents at the annual Metropolitan League track meet.

Pauly scored 32½ points himself. The Beaverton team amassed 154 1/6 points. David Douglas high had 54 1/6 points followed by Parkrose, 52 1/6, Milwaukie, 45 1/6, Gresham, 41, and Astoria 37. Others were Hillsboro 28 1/6, Clackamas 19 1/6 and Central Catholic 3.

Stilt Pledged To Quit Kansas

Lawrence, Kan.—Celebrated Wilt (The Stilt) Chamberlain was pledged Saturday to quit the Kansas university campus for a career in professional basketball.

The seven-footer, who will launch a 160-game barnstorming tour, was twice a unanimous All-America choice, but the fact he failed to lead Kansas to a national title was an apparent disappointment to some.

Dr. Forest (Phog) Allen, former Kansas basketball coach and instrumental in Chamberlain's enrollment, said "I sincerely trust he has not let his race down by withdrawing from school."

Allen, termed Chamberlain "the greatest college basketball player I have ever seen."

On the Kansas campus, students and officials expressed little or no surprise.

Van Cliburn Gets Standing Ovation

Washington—Lanky pianist Van Cliburn received a standing ovation and cheers from a sellout concert audience Friday night, played a Tchaikovsky concerto encore, and was entertained at a Russian Embassy reception.

The 23-year-old Texan played the same concert that won him the international Tchaikovsky piano contest in Moscow last month. His powerful technique proved a favorite with the celebrity-studded crowd at Constitution hall.

Earlier, Cliburn and his parents visited the White House for President Eisenhower's congratulations on his Moscow triumph.

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Douglas Trojans Take A-2 District Track Toga; EP's Christian Breaks Records

Ashland—Douglas High school of Winston-Dillard romped off with the team championship in the District 6 A-2 track and field meet at Southern Oregon college Friday and state champions, Cliff Thomson, Douglas, and Wayne Christian, Eagle Point, qualified to defend their crowns next Friday and Saturday in the Oregon prep meet at Corvallis.

Douglas, with the largest group of participants, captured four first places and five seconds to gain nine berths in the state A-2 tussle. The Trojans ran up 123½ points, 53½ more than the 70 which gave Eagle Point, 1957 district and state champions, second place.

Myrtle Creek took third with 68 and Phoenix, this year's southern subdistrict

victor, fourth with 45½. Other scores were Henley 41, Sutherlin 25, Illinois Valley 24, Glendale 10, Riddle 9, Oakland 8, Brookings 4, and Rogue River 3.

The Vikings of Myrtle Creek claimed five state meet spots, Eagle point four, Henley three, Sutherlin and Eagle Point each two, and Riddle, Illinois Valley and Oakland one each.

Christian led individual qualifiers record-busting first place marks of 148 feet ¾ inch in the discuss and 52-5 in the shot put and with a second place in the javelin. Winners and runners-up in district events go to the state encounter. The Eagle helped give his school the state A-2 mantle last year with firsts in the discuss and javelin. So far this year he hasn't equalled his 193-9 of the 1957 district meet. Terry Counts, Douglas, took the spear toss Friday with 185-3½. Christian has 177 plus.

Thomson continued his three-year district supremacy in the distances with 4:41.5 in the mile and 2:02.4 in the 880-yard run. He was easy winner in both races.

Swingle Sets Mark

Other new records were by Charles Swingle with :53.5 in the quarter-mile, Jim Murray, Myrtle Creek, with :23 flat in the 220 yard dash, and the Myrtle Creek team of Frank Shirlcliffe, Brad Goff, Bob Paine and Murray with 1:36 in the 880 relay.

Douglas qualifiers for state in addition to Thomson and Counts were Russ Prock with first in the high hurdles and second in the broad jump and low hurdles; John Erbe with second in the high hurdles; Bob Carlson with second in the discuss, and Jerry Griese with second in the pole vault.

Myrtle Creek will have all four district berths in the dashes, along with entering its relay crew. Paine was second to Murray in the 220, but beat his teammate to the tape in the 100-yard sprint.

Turner Wins Broad Jump

Bill Turner won the broad jump to give Eagle Point its fourth state berth. Swingle, after his 440-yard victory, ran a great anchor lap to help Phoenix to second place in the relay. That means he'll have the company of teammates Terry Hamilton, Jim Waldron and Dan Lumley at Corvallis.

Burrell Gober and Alvin Born, both of Henley, earned state tourney trips for the high jump. Gober won the district event. Born and Wes Young, Glendale, tied for second but Born had the least misses. Jim Chapman, also of

Henley, took the low hurdles. Sutherlin placed Ed Grover with district seconds in both the 440 and 880.

Mike Hanby won the pole vault for Illinois Valley and Jim Seehawer, Oakland, was second in the shot put.
