



Mission Dollars To Be Topic for Methodist Women

Mrs. Floyd Lewis will present the program titled "The March of Mission Dollars" for a meeting of the Women's Society of Christian Service in First Methodist church, Tuesday, May 27 at 1:15 p.m.

Methodist women have been supporting missions since 1889 when eight women of the Methodist Episcopal church organized in Boston, Mass. A second group formed in 1878 in Nashville, Tenn. from the Methodist Episcopal church, South. A third group formed in 1879 in Pittsburgh, Pa., of women of the Methodist Protestant church. These three groups united in 1941 with a mission budget of \$3,593,120. This month will close the seventeenth year of work as the Women's Society of Christian Service with mission giving amounting to over eight million dollars, and covering work in 32 countries, including the United States.

Mrs. F. F. Burk will lead the afternoon devotion.

The business session of the Women's society will begin at 11 a.m. in the Schweitzer room with Mrs. L. G. Rank in presiding. Elections for the coming year will be completed and the officers for 1958-59 will be installed by Dr. George Roseberry.

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Day Camp Site Selected Near Logtown Cemetery

Medford Girl Scout Day camp, slated from June 16 through 19, and June 23 through June 26, will be held at a site near the pioneer Logtown cemetery. According to the day camp committee chairman, Mrs. W. H. Fischer and the camp director, Mrs. Arthur St. German, plans on being made for buses to pick up the girls starting about 8:15 a.m. at Roosevelt school for those on the east side of bear creek; about 8:15 a.m. at the corner of Eighth street near the city library, and about 8:30 a.m. at Arnold lane and Jacksonville highway. The girls in Jacksonville will also be picked up about 8:30 to be taken to Camp Logtown which is six miles west of Jacksonville. Plans for Scouts in the Jackson-Lincoln neighborhood will depend on how many girls are registered.

Some of the history of pioneer Logtown has been supplied the day camp committee by Mrs. Thomas Eslinger, of the established camp committee. Mrs. Eslinger is a descendant of John McKee, one of Logtown's original settlers, who came to Oregon in 1852 from Missouri. Logtown was a busy village of about 500 people and was named because its buildings were of logs. Located on the old Jacksonville-Crescent City pack trail, Logtown was never very big, and most of the trading was done at Jacksonville.

According to Mrs. Eslinger, her aunt, Mary McKee Higginbotham, who now lives near Central Point, has told her of how her mother, Mirum McKee would take her children into the fields to hide from the Indians when it was necessary for her father, John McKee, to go to Jacksonville for supplies. She has also spoken of one of her sisters being buried on the hill back of the house, before the Logtown cemetery was started. Twelve children were born to the McKee's at Logtown.

John McKee was the town blacksmith, repairing tools and mining implements for the white and Chinese miners. The only thing to mark the site of Logtown today, except the cemetery, is the famous "Logtown Rose." The first rosebush planted in Jackson county, and believed by some to be the first in southern Oregon, is yellow, was something of a floral wonder in

Mrs. Lowry also has a similar service in Roseburg.
