

Musician Gives Test In Medford

Mrs. Amy Arney, music teacher and critic, Portland, spent May 16 and 17 in southern Oregon conducting state examinations in voice and piano under the auspices of the Rogue Valley Music Teachers' association.

She gave both audition and syllabus examinations to pupils of local teachers who are affiliated with the state group. Mrs. Arney, who is a member of the Oregon Board of Adjudicators, is a graduate of the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music and a teacher of music at Linfield college.

The pupils taking audition examinations were required to memorize two selections of standard composers, and know key signatures and dynamics. Thirty-nine pupils participated in this phase of the test.

Students taking part in the syllabus examinations in piano were required to play from memory four selections covering the classic, romantic and contemporary composers, both major and minor scales in all keys, know primary chords and inversions, and the various forms in which their selections were composed.

Pupils were graded on accuracy, command of technique, interpretation and theory. Eight students completed the piano syllabus examination.

Salad Combo

New York — For a picnic lunch or a supper salad, try this macaroni cream slaw. Cook one 8-ounce package of elbow macaroni in 3 quarts of water with 1 tablespoon salt. Drain, rinse with cold water, and drain again. Combine the macaroni with 1 quart of finely shredded cabbage, 1 cup of sliced carrots, 2 tablespoons of sliced scallions or green onions, ½ cup each of chopped green pepper and sour cream, 2 teaspoons each of vinegar and salt, and pepper to taste. Mix lightly but thoroughly, and chill before serving. Serves 6-8.

To keep rice, spaghetti, dried beans, potatoes, or oatmeal from boiling over, add a small piece of butter to the cooking water.

Wrap with a strip of bacon, securing with picks. Arrange on a baking sheet and bake in an oven preheated to 425 degrees. Bake for 15 to 20 minutes, or until bacon is crisp. Drain on paper towels and serve immediately.

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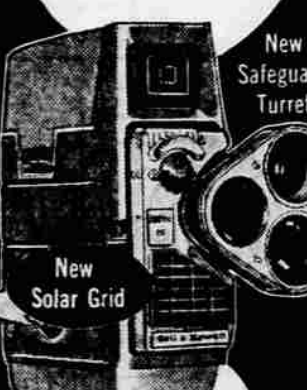
