

Backstairs: President Uses Four Planes

Washington (UPI)—President Eisenhower plans to be using four kinds of air transportation regularly by early next year.

Helicopters and a specially-equipped, light, two-passenger plane will be used for trips up to about 100 miles. It will be the piston-engine Columbine II for medium-range trips in this country. A Boeing 707 jet airliner will carry him on transcontinental and transoceanic flights.

Novak Says She Didn't Sell Car

Hollywood—(UPI)—Actress Kim Novak's studio denied through a publicity man early today that the blonde film star had sold her foreign sports car given to her by free-spending Lt. Gen. Rafael Trujillo Jr.

Asked if it were true that Miss Novak had sold the \$8,500 car given to her by the 29-year-old Dominican Republic soldier-playboy, Al Horowitz, head of publicity at Columbia, said, flatly, "that isn't so."

Horowitz' statement came after reports that Kim had sold Trujillo's gift and made a down payment with the money on a \$100,000 Bel-Air home.

"I don't know anything about that story," Horowitz said.

The publicist said the mansion Miss Novak now occupies was provided for her through Columbia.

The actress reported Saturday she had given the car back to Trujillo, now attending the U. S. Army's command and general staff school at Ft. Leavenworth, Kan.

The Dominican playboy left here last week after proclaiming his love for Kim on a television show. He indicated he would pursue the romance after finishing school in Kansas.

Vancouver Boy Dies In Silo on Farm

Vancouver, Wash.—(UPI)—Delbert Allen Walker, 8, Vancouver, died early Sunday, apparently the victim of asphyxiation in a silo on his parents' farm.

The Clark county coroner's office said gasses from freshly stored green alfalfa apparently suffocated the boy, who had gone to a barn to feed calves. A brother found Delbert's body about an hour later.

A White House aide said the helicopter flights to Gettysburg, Pa., last week marked the start of the President's regular use of whirlybirds for short trips. Indications are that the President will use helicopters frequently on fairly regular week end trips at his farm this summer.

Weather permitting, the President plans to give British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan a helicopter ride to Baltimore June 10 when they attend graduation ceremonies at Johns Hopkins university. The President probably will fly by helicopter also when he goes to Annapolis, Md., June 4 to deliver the commencement address at the U. S. Naval Academy.

An aide gave three reasons for the President's increased use of helicopters: Convenience, speed, and elimination of auto traffic hazards. The office door and, in about 25 strides, he is in a whirlybird for a takeoff from the south lawn of the White House. He lands right at his destination—his farm, a university campus, or anywhere that a small plot of open land is available.

He can get from the White House to his farm in considerably less than half the two hours required by limousine. The helicopter flight to Baltimore will be an estimated 20 minutes, as against 90 minutes driving time in a motorcade over the heavily-travelled highway.

The President's prospects for getting his wife Mamie to accompany him on a helicopter flight appear to be dim. She doesn't like to fly even in the more comfortable, plush Columbine III. And she probably will continue to use a limousine on her trips to Gettysburg, as she did last Friday.

Aides said the President was impressed by the advantage of helicopters for short trips during his vacation in Newport, R.I., last fall. It was about 35 minutes by car from the Quonset Point Naval Air Station to his vacation headquarters at the Newport naval base but it was only five minutes by helicopter. The President and his official visitors saved time by helicopter commuting.

Most of the President's whirly-bird flights will be in one of four 12-passenger Sikorsky helicopters in the White House emergency pool based only five minutes away. Two belong to the Army and two to the Marine Corps. The choppers are assigned to the

White House regularly for quick evacuation of the President, key members of his staff, and a selected group of White House newsmen in case of emergency.

The Sikorsky has a top speed of 130 miles per hour. Its cruising speed is 88 miles per hour. It usually flies at an altitude between 1,000 and 1,500 feet. The helicopters cost about \$380,000 each. Only seven other passengers are carried with the President as an added safety feature.

Investigators Probe Cause of Plane Fire

Otis Air Force Base, Mass.—(UPI)—Investigators sought today to find out why a \$2.225,000 radar reconnaissance plane exploded without warning after 100,000 miles of safe flight. Sabotage was considered a possibility.

Twelve airmen inside the RC121 Super Constellation escaped from the plane though it nearly was demolished in five minutes of explosions and fire late Sunday. The cause of the blasts were listed as "undetermined."

Morse Urges Look At French Policy

Washington—(UPI)—Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore) urged Sunday that the United States "take a long, hard look" at U. S.—French relations because of what he called "totalitarian trends" in France. He also criticized U. S. relationships with Latin American dictatorships and said this country must make a "better case against totalitarianism if it wants to win the cold war."

Morse is a member of the Senate Foreign Relations committee and chairman of its subcommittee on Latin America. He made the statements on the NBC television program, "Youth Wants to Know."

Ashland Man Said In Fair Condition

Lawrence Oviatt, 23, of 1965 East Main st., Ashland, was reported in fair condition at Sacred Heart hospital today suffering from a possible head injury. Oviatt was injured about 10 p.m. Saturday in a one-car accident at Bybee corner on the Jacksonville highway, according to state police. He was driver of the car, police said, and apparently failed to make the curve.

PINNED UNDER CAR

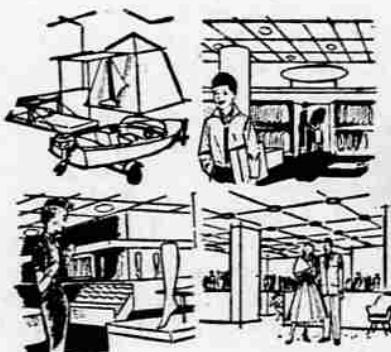

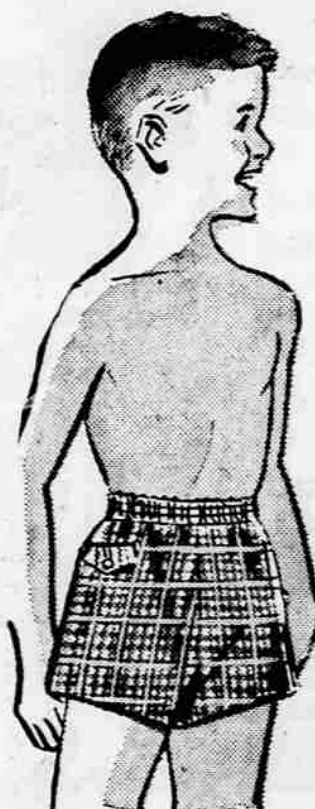

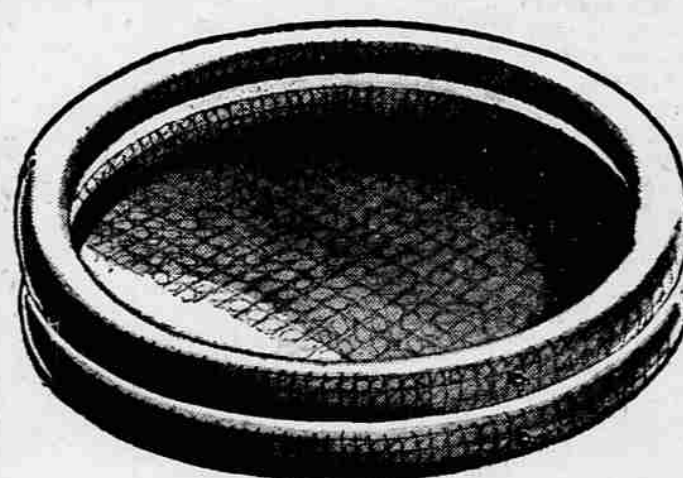
