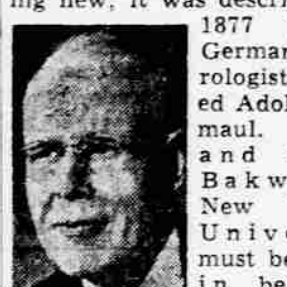
The Medical Roundup

TROUBLE LEARNING TO READ

Interestingly, "dyslexia" or difficulty in reading, is nothing new; it was described in 1877 by a

German neurologist named Adolf Kussmaul. Harry and Ruth Bakwin, of New York University, must be right in believing that many of the children who have serious trouble reading were born with some slight defect in the construction of their brain. This perhaps is what causes them to confuse letters that look alike, or to reverse the position of letters or syllables in words, or to have difficulty in combining letters into syllables or syllables into words. The Bakwins feel that Mrs. McKinnin, of Berkeley, Calif., does that the child of this type who has trouble reading should be taught with whatever method is found to work best for him.

Richard S. Eustis of Harvard says that these troubles are met with usually in boys, and boys who often are essentially bright. Some were slow to learn to talk; and then, per-

haps, they tended to lisp or stutter. On looking through the families of these boys, relatives with similar handicaps could be found—which is just what I would have expected. Some of the boys with these difficulties want to read from right to left, and some never can remember which way an S or a Z faces. Several neurologists have described peculiarities in the nervous system of boys who have had trouble with talking and writing.

Writing and speaking are such complicated processes that it would not be surprising if the brains of some individuals could not handle the work well. In my college days, when I taught classes in a gymnasium, I was impressed with the fact that a few boys had such a good control of their muscles that quickly they would learn to perform the exercises and to perform them beautifully; while other boys who were clumsy either could never learn to perform the more difficult exercises or else could never perform them gracefully. It seemed evident to me that these two groups of boys had been born with different types of nervous systems, one better organized and integrated than the other.
