

# San Francisco Rebuilds Gap To 2 1/2 Tilts in NL Campaign

The San Francisco Giants used power at home to make their fast start and now they are using pitching on the road to convince National League rivals their pennant threat is "the real thing."  
The amazing Giants achieved their strongest position in more than a decade for this stage of a season Sunday when they swept the Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-2, and 6-1, and rebuilt their lead to 2 1/2 games. The Giants now have won 9 of 13 games on their current Eastern Trip and have an overall 13-5 record on the road.  
Pitcher Ruben Gomez none the worse for the incident, went all the way to hurl a nine-incher and win his fifth decision. Then Ramon Montzant, who won only three

games all last season, also pitched a nine-incher for his fourth victory.

# Bad Blood Erupts at Pittsburgh

Pittsburgh — (UPI) — It appeared almost certain today that nothing short of official league action would cool off a sizzling "duster" duel between the Pittsburgh Pirates and pace-setting San Francisco Giants.  
The latest bad-blood incident between the two clubs occurred Sunday at Forbes Field where the Giants swept a double-header from the Pirates, 5-2 and 6-1.  
This double win, coupled with Milwaukee's split with Chicago, lifted the Giants to 2 1/2 games ahead of the second-place Braves.  
The thing that sent the season's biggest home crowd of 35,797 into near frenzy was a blow-up in the fifth inning of the opener when Pirate manager Danny Murtaugh and Giant pitcher Ruben Gomez squared off in a bat-wielding, fist-swinging melee.  
It started after Gomez, who notched his fifth win of the season and long has been accused by other players in the league of throwing dusts, hit Pirate second baseman Bill Mazeroski in the left arm during the fourth inning.  
Mazeroski had lifted his arm to protect his head.  
When Gomez came to bat an inning later wearing only a regulation cap, plate umpire Frank Dascoli ordered him back to the bench to get a protective helmet.  
**Gomez Sent Sprawling**  
Then Vernon Law, who was struck on the head by one of Gomez's pitches last fall, fired a fast ball high and on the inside that sent the batter sprawling.  
Dascoli went to the mound to warn Law and Murtaugh charged from the Pirate dugout to intercede for his pitcher. On the way, he shouted a remark to Gomez, who in turn allegedly made an "uncomplimentary gesture" in Murtaugh's direction.  
The Pirate manager turned on his heels and raced toward Gomez with fists clenched as Giant coach Herman Franks and Pirate catcher Danny Kravitz tried to restrain him. Murtaugh threw one punch, but missed and Gomez swung his bat twice but wasn't in range.  
Meanwhile, players poured off both benches and converged at home plate in one pushing, tugging and swinging mass. Not a blow connected.  
Gomez was disarmed of his bat by an unidentified Giant, but his roommate — and close friend — first baseman Orlando Cepeda — ran toward the Giant backrack to obtain another.  
Cepeda was brought down by Willie Mays' flying tackle and the ruckus was quelled after Murtaugh was thumbed out of the game.  
Murtaugh explained later that he "saw red" when Gomez gestured at him.  
"I just went after the guy," the usually quiet but trigger-tempered Irishman said. "I'm surprised to hear he swung his bat at me. At the time I was so hot, I didn't notice it."  
Giant manager Bill Rigney said he was "spinning like a top" when caught in the mass of players swirling around home plate.  
Rigney had no immediate comment but did say that Curt Raydon, who pitched the nightcap Sunday, "took a couple of shots at my boys in San Francisco."

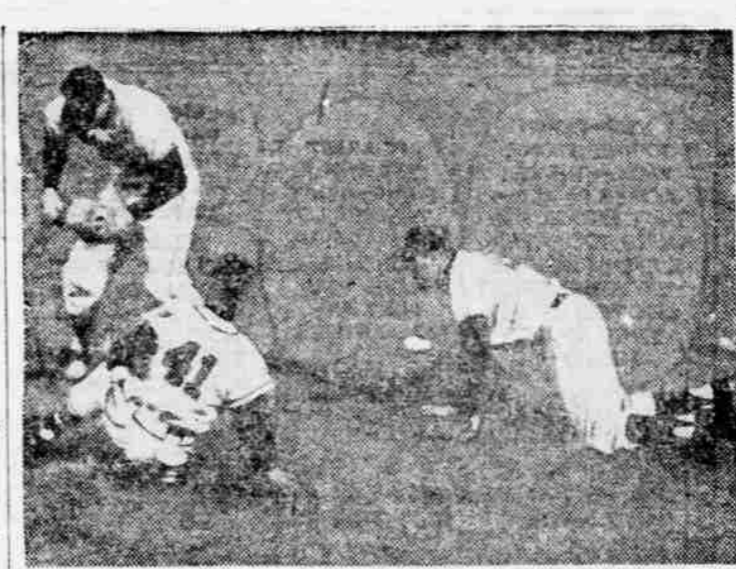
