Super Skyway Slated, CAB Official Says

New York — (U.P.I.) — A member of the Civil Aeronautics Board said today a transcontinental super skyway will be created soon as the first step toward blanket safety control of all planes in the air.

In Washington, it was learned that officials hope the 40-mile-wide skyway will be operative in July.

One tentative plan is for it to be forked at both ends, with eastern terminals at New York and Washington, and western ends at San Francisco and Los Angeles.

The CAB member, G. Joseph Minetti, said the skyway will extend from 18,000 to 35,000 feet altitude, within this air corridor no aircraft "will be permitted to fly without positive control from the ground," Minetti said.

"Each pilot flying this super skyway will be constantly monitored en route and advised of all other aircraft placed ahead of him, behind him, above, below or beside him" evening clear weather, Minetti said.

Minetti discussed the skyway in remarks prepared for ceremonies dedicating a new kind of helicopter for use by New York airways in its metropolitan area service.

The CAB member said the skyway is a needed first step. Extension of maximum safety control to all aircraft over Continental United States, he said, still five years away.

"As these super skyways criss-cross our air space the possibility of collision will diminish rapidly," Minetti said.

In these corridors all planes, including military, will be obliged to take directions from air traffic controllers on the ground.

The CAB has not yet given final approval to the initial skyway plan but it is expected to do so.

Storm Hits Portland On Heels of First

Portland — (U.P.I.) — Another thunder and lightning storm rolled through the Portland area today on the heels of a severe storm Monday evening which resulted in numerous power outages, downed trees and other damage in northwest Oregon.

Today's storm started east of Salem about 5 a.m. and moved into the Portland area about 6:30 a.m. It was continuing more than two hours later.

Sixteen persons were injured here Monday evening when lightning struck a Rose City Transit company trolley bus.

The weather bureau said it did not expect the general weather pattern to change much in the next few days. Forecasters said there was a "good chance" for warmer and drier weather over interior sections of northwest Oregon Wednesday but that the thunderstorm threat would remain.

Oils and Rails Lead Stock Market Lower

New York — (U.P.I.) — Oils and rails led the stock market lower today.

Political unrest abroad and the government's decision to forego tax cuts, combined with unfavorable corporate developments, pushed stocks lower along a broad front. Losses were limited to fractions for most of the main. Crane company, which cut its dividend, dropped 2 points. Commercial Solvents and American Ship Building lost around a point each on dividend cuts.

Shell and Standard of California lost around a point each in the oils, were most of the leaders retreated fractionally. Steels were mixed. Youngtown added a small fraction and hit a new high in this group. Union Carbide fell a point in an otherwise mixed chemical group.

Fractional declines predominated in the rails. A gain of a point in Panhandle Eastern pipe line helped utilities to improve averagewise.

Pharmaceuticals favored the upside, with Merck around a point. Alcoa and International Nickel were weak in the metals. Coppers
