Our 440 relay team, composed of Terry Earl, Mike Hood, Bill Charley and Phil Humphreys, scored a new record of .466.

Final examinations will be given on June 2 and 3, and this term will be officially terminated on Friday, June 6. Summer school classes will begin on June 16 and close July 25.

Eighth grade tennis teams from Hedrick and McLoughlin tied up a 3 to 3 match on May 20. Mac singles were won by Bob Schroeder, Bob Darby and Steve Hubler, and Hedrick players won one singles and two doubles matches.
