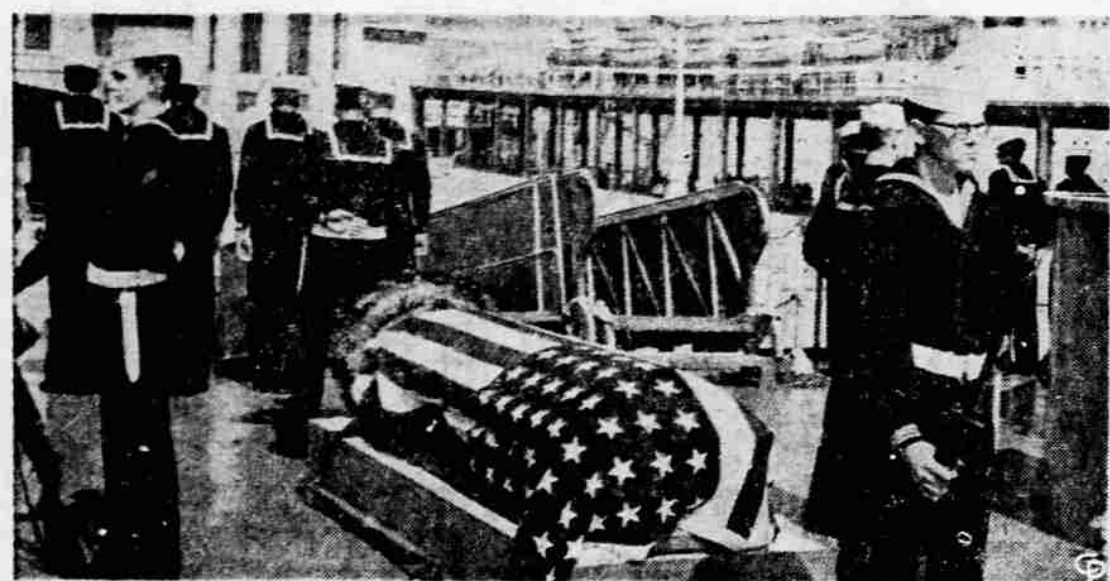

Union Men Anxious Over Court Rulings

Washington—(UPI)—Some union officials voiced apprehension Tuesday over new Supreme Court rulings giving fresh backing to state court jurisdiction in certain labor cases.

The AFL-CIO declined official comment on two 6-2 rulings by the high court Monday. The decisions served to underscore a 1954 court ruling that, despite the Taft-Hartley labor law, state courts may still play a part in dispensing punishment for unlawful union conduct.

Union officials told United Press International they feared further expansion of state court powers to rule on damage suits against unions could lead to "Balkanization" of the federal Taft-Hartley law. By this they meant the law would lose its effectiveness as a national regulator of labor matters and widely varying—even conflicting—state laws would assume precedence.

Monday's high court cases concerned complaints of workers against their unions. They sued for damages in state courts although the unions insisted the National Labor Relations board was the proper forum.

One worker, Paul S. Rus-

sell, was awarded \$10,000 in the Circuit Court of Morgan County, Ala., because a 1951 picket line of the United Automobile Workers kept him away from his job. He was employed by the Calumet & Hecla Consolidated Copper Co. in Decatur, Ala.

In his majority opinion Justice Harold H. Burton said this award in no way conflicts with anything the NLRB might have done in the same case. He explained that in cases where the court has found exclusive jurisdiction belongs to the NLRB, the justices were troubled that the NLRB might bar certain conduct as illegal while states might not, or vice versa. But he said this problem did not arise in the Russell case.

In another case the court sustained the right of Marcos Gonzales, a San Francisco machinist, to sue in California courts for reinstatement and damages after he was expelled from Local 68 of the International Association of Machinists. He was awarded \$9,300.

Chief Justice Earl Warren and Justice William O. Douglas dissented.

Skipjack Joins Hunter Subs

Groton, Conn.—(UPI)—The USS Skipjack has launched a new generation of submarines, Adm. Arleigh A. Burke said Monday, when the Navy's latest atomic sub slid down the ways.

The Skipjack will join the two record-breaking atomic subs Skate and Seawolf in the growing nuclear powered American fleet armed to "hunt down and kill enemy submarines."

At the launching of the whale-shaped Skipjack, Burke, chief of Naval operations, disclosed that the Skate and Seawolf set new endurance records by remaining submerged for more than 30 days. Burke warned that the Soviet submarine menace today was one of the greatest military threats facing this country.

But he said the Skipjack was armed with the most powerful anti submarine weapons and detection equipment. It will have "unmatched speed, endurance and underwater maneuverability," he said.
