Surgeon Arraigned On Murder Charge

New York — (UPI) — Dr. Rodrigo Sarmiento will be arraigned today on a first degree murder charge in the fatal stabbing of a 33-year-old Brooklyn nurse.

A Kings County Brooklyn grand jury Wednesday indicted the 38-year-old Filipino surgeon who surrendered to a newspaper reporter April 30, four days after Miss Margaret Kabak was found stabbed to death in her home.

Police maintain Sarmiento killed Miss Kabak because she broke off their romance on learning he had a wife and four children in the Philippines.

If convicted, he could receive the death penalty.

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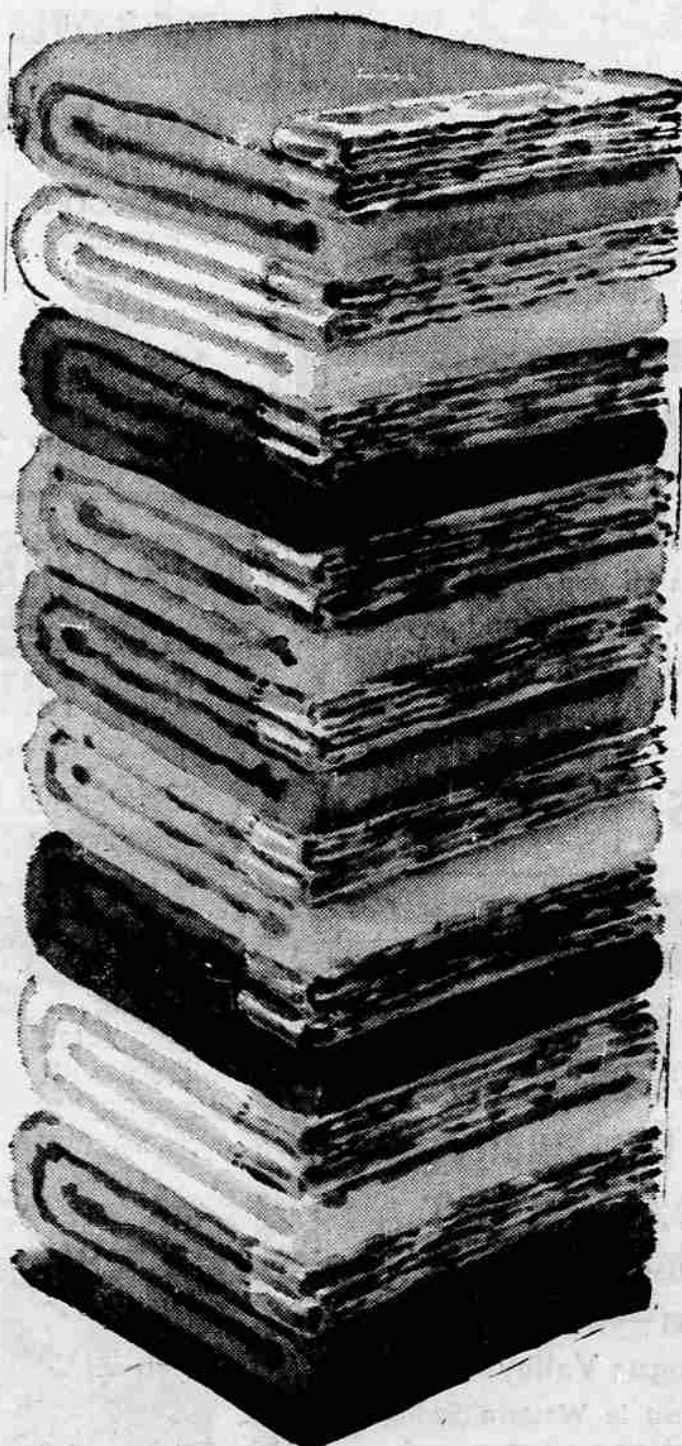


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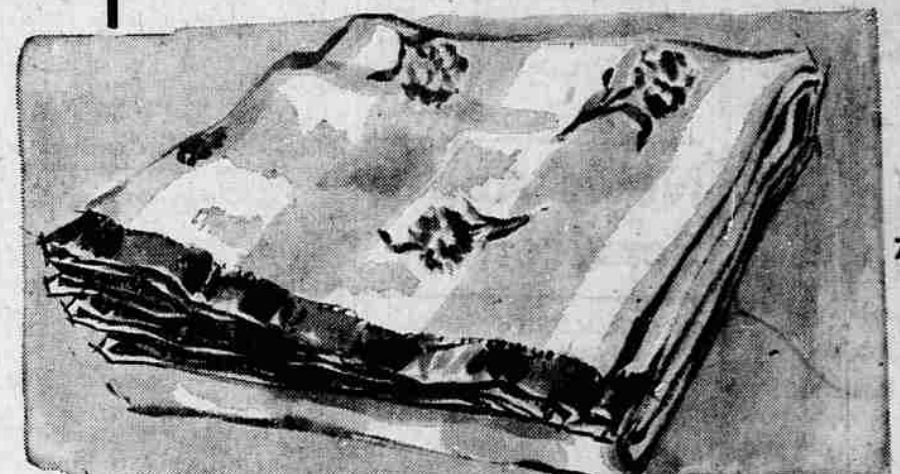
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
