## Auto Workers In Full Retreat

Detroit—(UPI)—The United Auto Workers today was in full retreat at the bargaining table, but General Motors insisted only complete union surrender can bring agreement before the contract covering 325,000 workers expires at midnight.

UAW President Walter P. Reuther entered bargaining today in the union's effort to make contract gains.

Louis G. Seaton, General Motors vice president of personnel, and Earl R. Bramblett, GM industrial relations head, said repeatedly Wednesday and in the first night-time meeting Wednesday night, that GM's offer of a two-year contract renewal is a final one.

In the past week, Reuther and the UAW have jettisoned profit sharing and other demands by the dozen. But Reuther has declared the union will "never" sign the industry offer of two-year contract renewals.

He said the union must have better unemployment benefits, pensions and job security to solve the "basic human problems of the jobless, the retired and workers displaced by the closing of plants."

The ninth grade took the Iowa Achievement tests in the mornings of May 19 and 20. Students in Medford took the same tests last year and our system's upper grades generally scored above average. The tests, part of a nationwide survey by the University of Iowa, were prepared under the direction of Dr. E. F. Lindquist, professor and statistician at the University of Iowa.

The object of the survey, which included nine tests, was to establish national norms for 1958.

Students were tested on basic social concepts, English expression, vocabulary, science and math. Last year's class had one of the highest ratings in Medford history. The seventh grade also took I.Q. tests on Monday and the eighth on Tuesday afternoon.

Hedrick held its annual open house May 22, which was highlighted by a style show and various displays. The style show was one which included various scenes highlighting different styles of clothes. Commentators were Suzy Thompson, Jerry Gastineau, Linda Samuelson and Jim Frake.

The orchestra, under the direction of John Drysdale, and the Hedrick band and dance band directed by Ron Bartlett played pieces at various intervals. Displays included shop projects, directed by Duane Richardson; art projects, Miss Catherine Fonken; math projects, Bruce Nelson; book, Mrs. Mildred Rogers and map displays, Robert Huff.

The first annual science fair was held with eight first given in various fields and many seconds and thirds awarded also. There were over 200 projects in the fair, which was directed by James Miller and Monte Kounz. Judges were chosen from the MHS faculty.

San Juan, Puerto Rico—(UPI)—Juan Ramon Jimenez, 76, Spanish-born Nobel prize-winning poet, died today of bronchial pneumonia.

Some 22,000 French forces are stationed in Tunisia under terms of the treaty granting Tunisia independence from France. Tunisia has been demanding their withdrawal.

Britain confirmed that Tunisia asked for weapons recently. The State department parried all questions on the request with a "no comment."

Informed sources confirmed, however, that the new Bourguiba request has been received. They refused to spell out exactly what he wanted.

Tunisian President Habib Bourguiba disclosed he had sent a new appeal to both the United States and Britain for arms. He said the weapons were needed because French forces in Tunisia were not under control of the crisis-ridden Paris government and might get out of hand.
