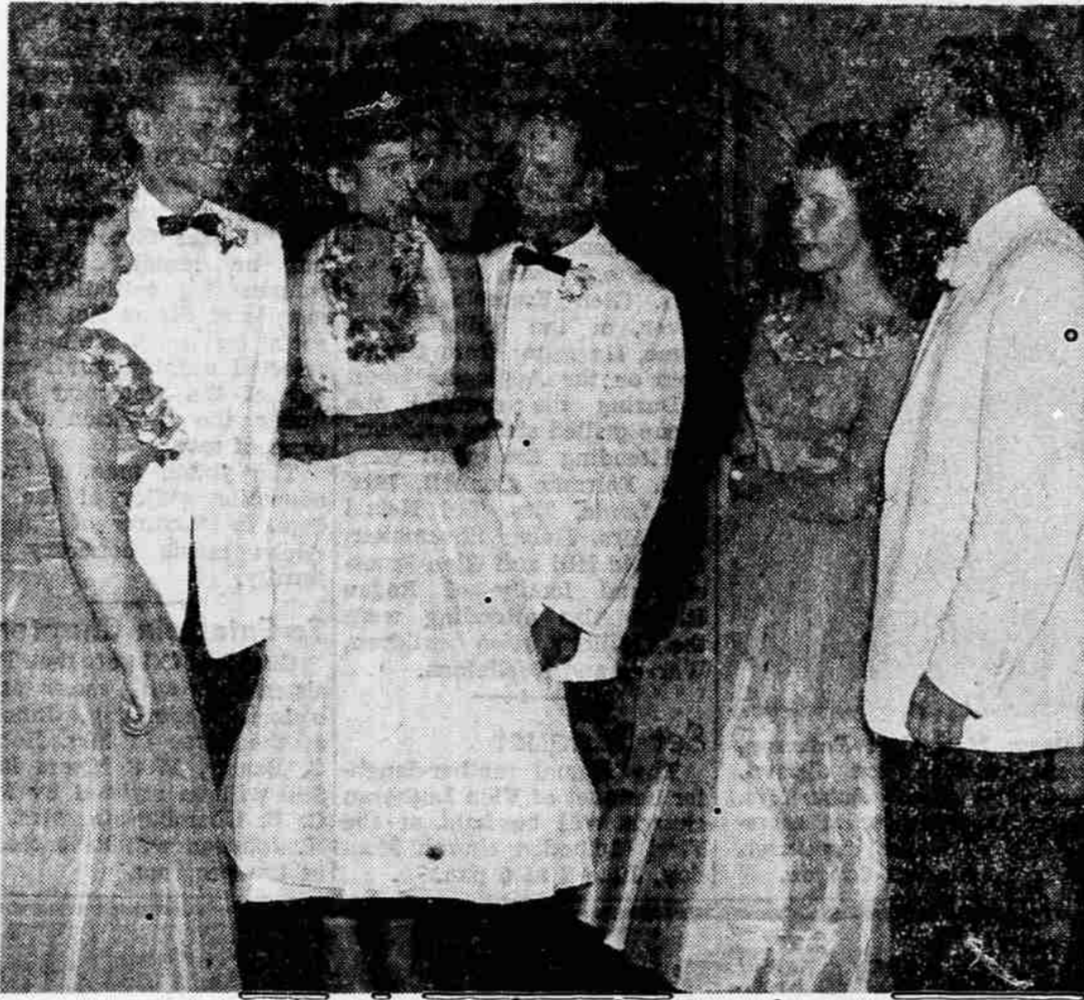

Hi-Lites IN THE History of Pharmacy

In the next few issues will attempt to explain some of the various forms of Pharmaceutical preparations . . .

1—Powders—are solid dry drugs in a finely subdivided form. "Most powders are a combination and are called compound powders."

2—Pills—Pellets in a size suitable for swallowing . . . the drug is mixed with an adhesive substance and a diluent (starch). Pills are coated to make them taste better and to preserve them . . .

3—Tablets—Disk-shaped masses made from medicinal powders . . . There are two kinds of tablets—compressed and tablet triturates. Compressed are made by machine and usually contain 1 to 10 grains of the drug. Tablet triturates are made by mixing in a mortar, with a liquid added to make a wet mass and then shaped into tablets. These usually do not contain more than one grain of the drug.

It is reported. Organizations wishing to give luncheons and dinners for fundraising purposes may use the club kitchen, that said.

Charges for groups of less than 100 persons for use of the entire recreation space when luncheons and dinners are served will be \$30. Groups that regularly hold meetings at the club will be charged \$25.
