

# Giants, Dodgers Complete East Trip With Victories

San Francisco threw open its heart and its gates to the home-coming, first place Giants today while the last-place Dodgers found a referendum and that frightful fence again awaiting them in Los Angeles.

Southpaw Johnny Antonelli ended the Giants' first eastern trip on a triumphant note Sunday when he pitched them back into the National league lead with a 7-2 victory over the Cardinals. That gave the Giants a record of 11 wins in 19 games since they left California.

The Dodgers didn't do so well of their trip, winning only eight out of 17, although they beat the Cubs, 1-0, Sunday on rookie Stan Williams' two-hit pitching in his first major league start.

Bob Friend limited the Milwaukee Braves to five hits while leading the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 3-1 decision in a game called during the eighth inning because of rain.

The Pirates helped Friend to his eighth victory when they rocked Gene Conley for three runs in the first inning on a walk, singles by Dick Groat and Ted Kluszewski and Frank Thomas' triple. The loss dropped the Braves into second place, a full game behind the Giants.

Cincinnati beat Philadelphia, 2-1, in the first of two games and then struggled to an 11-1 tie in the nightcap which was suspended in the ninth inning because of Pennsylvania's Sunday curfew law.

Yanks Maintain Lead  
Bob Purkey out-pitched Jack Sanford for his sixth win in the opener. The only run he allowed was Golly Hemus' homer in the third inning.

The New York Yankees maintained their 6 1/2 game lead in the American league by bouncing the Boston Red Sox, 10-4. Bob Turley struck out 10 batters and allowed only five hits in registering his eighth victory.

Washington scored Baltimore back into the cellar with a 5-2 decision over the Orioles.

## Elimination Bout Heads Ring Slate

New York — (UPI) — Three welterweight bouts, topped by the title fight between Vince Goines and Virgil Akins, feature this week's boxing schedule.

Akins of St. Louis and Martinez of Paterson, N.J., are slated for 15 rounds at the St. Louis arena, Friday night, in an elimination tournament final for the vacant world welterweight championship.

They will be fighting for the 147-pound crown left vacant when Carmen Basilio won the middleweight title from Sugar Ray Robinson last Sept. 23.

A total of 2,118 golfers—amateurs and professionals—were bucking long odds today as they scrambled for the remaining 144 berths in the National Open golf championship.

Those who survive the 36-hole qualifying tests at 28 scattered sites will join the starting field for the 1958 championship that begins at the Southern Hills Country club, Tulsa, Okla., June 12-15.

The largest sectional field turned out at Detroit with 175 vying for 29 places. Most of the touring professionals who competed in the Western Open during the week end were in the Detroit lineup, including Doug Sanders, Western winner; Gary Player, Arnold Palmer, Doug Ford, Tommy Bolt, Paul Harney and Mike Souchak.

Defending champion Dick Mayer topped a group of 17 players who were exempt of qualifying for this year's open. Others included former titleholders Cary Middlecoff, Jack Fleck, Ed Furgol and Ben Hogan, amateur champion Hillman Robbins Jr. and PGA champion Lionel Herbert.

**Texas Dash Star Shines In Relays**

Modesto, Calif. — (UPI) — Bobby Morrow, the world's greatest sprinter in 1936 and 1937 is back in form.

The powerful, bull-shouldered Texan representing Abilene Christian, is ready for defense of his sprint crowns in the National AAU meet in two weeks — or at any other time.

Morrow was voted the "outstanding athlete" of the 17th annual California Relays Saturday after winning the 100-yard dash and anchoring two relay teams to new world records.

Against some of the finest sprinters in the world, he won the 100-yard dash in :09.4 a full step ahead of Willie White of California, who won a photo finish from Ray Norton of San Jose State.

In the sprint relay the Abilene Christian team of Raymond Christians, Bill Woodhouse, Jim Segrist and Morrow was clocked in 39.7, knocking twentys of a second off the listed mark.

Then came the 880 relay, with Morrow in the anchor spot for his 220 stint. This time the clocks stopped at 1:22.6 — one-tenth of a second better than Texas' record of 1:22.7.

The performance stole the thunder from a solid mile run by Australia's Herb Elliott, who was clocked in 4:02.7.

## Billy Loes Suspended By Orioles

Baltimore — (UPI) — Erratic Billy Loes probably has pitched his last game for the Baltimore Orioles.

Still earning over a \$100 fine and on indefinite suspension, Loes was suspended by Orioles manager Paul Richards. Loes said today he is "going to see the commissioner."

Loes' troubles all came about during the fifth inning of Sunday's game he was pitching against Washington.

With Ken Agrements on third and Lelio Saucier on first, Camilo Pascual hit back to Loes, who tried to tag Saucier in a rundown. Agrements slid headlong into the plate and when Umpire Larry Napp called him out, Loes went wild.

He shoved Napp twice in uncontrolled anger then threw the ball against the plate and also hurled his cap and glove away around as the ball rolled to the backstop and Washington went on to win, 5-3.

The 28-year-old ex-Dodgers pitcher was immediately ejected from the game and Richards announced the fine and suspension afterward.

Asked point-blank whether Loes was through with the Orioles, Richards said: "I've put up with quite a lot from him. He is fined \$100 and suspended indefinitely. Beyond that I have nothing to say."

## World Boxing Committee Orders Patterson Defense

New York — (UPI) — Cus D'Amato, manager of heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson, today challenged the World Boxing committee's fight-or-forefeit order.

D'Amato threatened court action if the committee attempted to vacate Patterson's crown.

At its final meeting in Paris Sunday, the committee ordered Patterson to defend against a recognized challenger before Sept. 30 or forfeit the title.

The committee's four challengers are: Eddie Machen of San Francisco; Zora Folley of Chandler, Ariz.; Willie Pastorgo of Miami Beach, and Roy Harris of Cut and Shoot, Tex.

But angry D'Amato declared, "The world committee rules about six-month defense and about defending against committee challengers seem to apply only to Patterson — not to other champions."

"If there's a law for Patterson, there should be a law for all."

Moreover, D'Amato charged that the four men named as challengers were "some of the fighters who blacklisted Patterson last summer when we needed a challenger."

He promised that Patterson will defend this summer, possibly three times, "but not against fighters whose managers have tried to cut our throats — tried to connive with the International Boxing club — against us."
