

PCL Yo Yo Action Continues; Prescott Paces Phoenix Nine

The potent bat of Bobby Prescott helped lead the Phoenix Giants back on top of the Pacific Coast League scramble today with Vancouver again slipping into second spot as the teams moved their yo-yo act into the month of June.

Prescott hit a three run homer in each game Sunday to help the Giants' farmhands sweep a double header from Portland by scores of 9-3 and 8-1. The Mounties fell a full game back into second by being held to a split by Sacramento. The Solons won the afternoon half of a split twin bill, 7-6, then Vancouver pounded out a 9-1 triumph during the night session.

In other games, Seattle emerged from the cellar by taking a pair of games from San Diego, 2-0 and 4-3, on fine pitching by Art Fowler

and Bill Kennedy while Spokane and Salt Lake divided a night twin bill. The Indians won the first game, 3-1 while Salt Lake took the second tilt, 4-2.

Key Blows
Prescott's key blow came in the fourth inning of the opener and seventh of the nightcap. After the Panamanian's swat in the first game, bonus baby Joe Amalfitano followed with an inside the park homer in the same inning which helped end veteran Larry Jansen down to defeat. Gordon Jones posted the win, holding Portland to four hits.

In the second game, Andy Rogers belted another three run homer in the eighth to break a 1-1 tie in the sixth inning. Prescott's second three-run blast helped secure a five-run victory in the assurance Tommy Jones can

win the last tie breaker. The Indians won the second game, 4-2, in the 10th and only pitched to one batter, got the victory. George Bomberger also had entered in the 10th for Vancouver and was the loser.

Home Runs Without
Vancouver took the night game, 8-1, on Steve Herman's five-run homer. He had a shutout going into the ninth inning. Jim Pflueger and Tom Brown each homered for the Indians, the latter's blow coming with a man on base. Fredrickson left in the fifth inning with the loss.

Fowler cut the Padres off with three hits while hurling a 3-0 shutout for Seattle in the first game and Kennedy then headed San Diego with a four-run homer in the eighth. But Pflueger, a former Red Sox pitcher, suffered the loss in the opener to remain in search of his first victory. Jim Dyer homered in one run and Veda Pinson added another with a blop double to give Fowler the run he needed. Galt Wade then drove in all of Seattle's runs in the finale with a two run homer and two run double. Dick Bradshaw got the decision.

Larry Sherry held Salt Lake to two hits and then struck a triple to help his team in Spokane's opening game triumph. Joe Christensen's two run home run in the fifth inning assured the home victory in the nightcap. Jim Harrison got the win and Ed Palmquist the loss.

St. Andrews, Scotland — (UPI) — Bob Verwey, 17, a South African, scored a resounding upset in the first round of the British Amateur Golf championship today with a 4 to 3 victory over Air Force M/Sgt. Harold Ridgley, Havertown, Pa., a finalist last year.

Ridgley, a veteran of overseas play, was the chief hope among the unusually small American contingent of 14 starters in the championship this year.

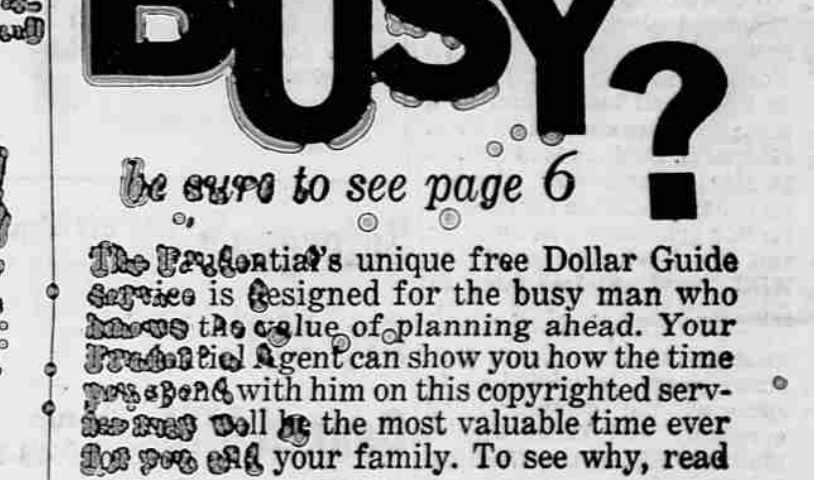
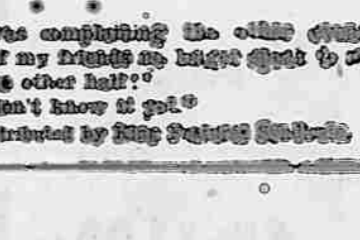
