The Medical Roundup

The Pediatrician

A very important specialty is pediatrics, or the study and care of children and their diseases. A pediatrician starts out by studying seven or eight years in college and medical school and then having an internship. Then he will work for three years or more in some great Children's Hospital.

A good pediatrician has to be an able diagnostician in order to tell what is wrong with a child who is running a high fever. He has to know, first, about most of the diseases of adults, and then he must know all the diseases that are particularly likely to attack his small patients. He has to know a great deal about all the many infections with bacteria and viruses, and what can be done to combat them.

He has to know all about colds, and indigestions and diarrheas. He has to become skillful in quickly recognizing the child who is seriously and dangerously ill. When I was writing my book on Danger Signals, or the symptoms that no one should disregard (Heine Publishing Co., Minneapolis), I dropped in on a pediatrician friend of mine, and asked him how he told the difference between the child with just a high fever, who would soon recover, and the child who was very ill and likely to succumb. He said he paid little attention to the height of the fever if the child was bright and showed some interest in his

toys; the child who worried him was the one who was toxic and apathetic—who just lay in his bed and did not pay attention to anyone. I asked, "How do you tell the difference between a stomach ache and acute appendicitis?" and he said, "If the child keeps his mother up all night, it is appendicitis." A good pediatrician is the best friend a family with several growing children can have.

When a Divorce Is Wrong Many a time I have seen a childless couple who, after years of unhappy bickering, were ready for a separation. I did not try to argue them out of it, because I could not see where it would do any one any harm. But many another time I have talked an unhappy couple out of a divorce because they had small children. As I said to the husband, "I can see why you are very resentful against your wife who has often made you unhappy, but, those two adorable little girls of yours—surely you have nothing against them; they have done you no harm. If you leave them, you will hurt them greatly." And the man said, "Yes, you are right; I'll stick it out."

There have been other cases in which I agreed with wise marriage counselors who say it is much better for the children that a violent or alcoholic or brutal or cruel father be gotten out of the home. It is too hard on the children's nervous system to have the man around, constantly abusing their mother.

Dr. Alvarez hopes his readers will understand that it would be impossible for

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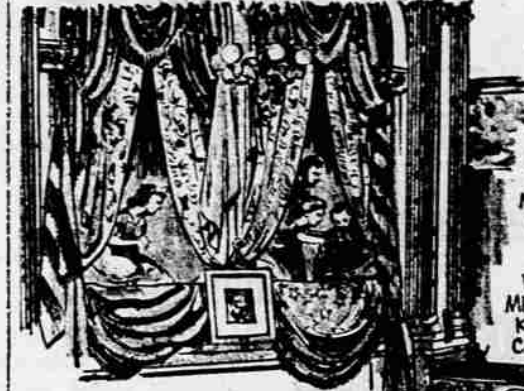
