

Wage Hike Given Committee Approval

County budget committee, according to the requests of the various heads of county departments is \$3,978,335.84. This compares to \$3,112,695.70 for the current year. The current budget total given does not include the \$32,274 voted outside the 6 percent limitation. Keating emphasized, for the juvenile detention home and the historical society.

Appearing before the budget committee this morning, Mrs. Hopkins requested salary increases as recommended by the recent state civil service commission salary study. She explained this would mean actual seven raises and four salary cuts. Several salaries were not raised, she added.

The raises, if granted, would mean \$14,500 more for the county clerk's department.

Mrs. Hopkins said that the study made by the state civil service commission bears out a study she made the previous year showing salaries given in this area for similar positions in the county offices. She added that she con-

sulted the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, California Oregon Power company and other large firms.

There has been no cost of living adjustments granted county employees for five years, with the exception of a few instances, she argued.

"Do you actually feel that this is the time for big salary raises when everybody is crying tax?" Wray asked.

Might Have Money

"We might have the money to do it this year and we may be able to do it easily this year but the bubble will break sometime," Wendt said.

Curtis said he thought the raises should be set to cover a period of time. He added that he is against any blanket raises.

The county clerk listed other major budgetary requests. They included \$1,600 for microfilming files, seven five-drawer files, \$1,011.50; Copese copying machine for copies larger than the Verifax machine, \$400; a remittance count machine, \$2,875; and \$2,276 for an extra deputy to work between the district court and accounting department.

Cardinal Stritch's Funeral Largest in History of Chicago

Chicago —(UPI)—Milling crowds and solemn liturgical pageantry today marked the requiem mass of Samuel Cardinal Stritch in the largest funeral in Chicago's history.

To the rites had come one of the largest assemblages of the Roman Catholic hierarchy in the United States, including the three surviving Cardinals and more than 110 bishops and archbishops.

Additionally, between 1,000 and 1,500 members of the clergy, priests and nuns, knelt in prayer in dimly lit Holy Name Cathedral where services for the 70-year-old prelate were held.

The pontifical requiem was celebrated by the papal delegate to the United States, the Most Rev. Amleto G. Cicognani. Among those who participated in the services were Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell, representing President Eisenhower, and numerous state and city officials.

Policemen Assigned

Police Commissioner Timothy J. O'Connor assigned 800 policemen to serve in various capacities, including 50 as an honor guard and 20 as a motorcycle escort to Mount Carmel Cemetery where the cardinal was to be entombed.

Most of the remaining police served as traffic marshals for the thousands of Chicagoans who flocked to the cathedral, gathered in massive crowds where the church is located, or lined the streets through which the cortege was to pass.

Brownlee Dam Said Monument To Selfishness

Portland —(UPI)—James T. Marr, president of the National Hells Canyon association, answered an attack by Rep. Hamer Budge (R-Idaho) by declaring today that "as long as Brownlee dam remains in the Snake River it will be a monument to the selfishness and greed of the Idaho Power company."

The House reclamation subcommittee killed a high, Hells Federal Canyon dam Monday by voting 15-13 against reporting a bill for the structure out favorably to the Interior committee.

Customers Better Off

Marr said that IPC will have to sell Brownlee power to its customers at far more than 7 mills a kilowatt hour. "Frankly," he said, "I think the customers of Idaho Power would have been a lot better off getting Brownlee power from the government at 4.6 mills per kilowatt hour, until the big dam was finished, at which time they could have had Hells Canyon power for 2.5 mills."

Budge's constituents, Marr said, "will now be purchasing power from Idaho Power company that will cost 7 mills a kilowatt hour while users in Washington and western Oregon would pay just half that amount."

Navy Seeks Cause Of Jet Explosion

Seville, Fla. —(UPI)—The Navy today tried to determine the cause of a twin-jet explosion and crash which killed the pilot and destroyed two houses. Two other crew members survived.

A team of Navy officers sifted through wreckage of the A3D Sky-Warrior which exploded mysteriously and crashed Monday.

Two crew members parachuted to safety. The plane commander who died in the crash was identified as Lt. Com. Robert W. Ramey, 34, of Lock Arbor, Fla.

The plane apparently separated in two sections after the tail section dropped near two houses which burst into flames. Ramey's body was found in the plane's cockpit.

Gold Beach Tavern Entered by Thieves

Gold Beach —(UPI)—Thieves broke into a Gold Beach tavern, Tony and Bob's Green Door, early Monday and got away with more than \$2500, according to the Curry county sheriff's office.

Silverton Farmer Dies From Injuries

Portland —(UPI)—A 43-year-old Silverton farmer, Leonard Thackery, died Monday in a Portland hospital after suffering critical injuries Saturday when he was struck by a log while clearing land with a bulldozer.

New York —(UPI)—Bernard H. Sandler, for many years one of New York's leading lawyers, died here Monday at the age of 73. He was defense counsel for three of the four informers in the Herman Rosenthal murder trial, a famous case during the days before World War I.

Stocks Drop After Reaching 1958 High

New York —(UPI)—Stocks lost some of their vitality in the late trading today after an early rise had lifted the whole market into new high ground for 1958.

Steels Monday's strong spots, dipped small amounts. There were small losers in such lines as the motors, chemicals, paper issues, electrical equipments, tobacco and drugs. International Shoe, the day's weak spot, fell more than four points when directors cut the dividend. Union Twist Drill eased for a similar reason.
