Burdick Appeals For Return of Homemade Bread

Washington—(UPI)—Thrice-wed Rep. Usher L. Burdick (R-N.D.), called on American housewives today to man their ovens in a fight against "store-bought bread."

But the 79-year-old congressman, who is trying to annul his 90-day marriage to his 30-year-old secretary, gloomily held out little hope American women would listen.

"Pretty hard to find a woman to bake bread these days," he said. "They're too busy with parties and entertainment to watch over the health of the family."

Fate Bemoaned—The big, white-haired rancher sat behind his desk in his shirt sleeves and bemoaned the fate of modern Americans who come home to face store-bought bread.

Pictures of American Indians, who baked their own bread, looked down from the office walls. A sign outside the office doors said: "A year from now what will we get in the stores is made from bleached flour and filled with chemicals to make it appear fresh."

Burdick did not discuss the culinary abilities of his estranged bride. He contends his marriage was never consummated. The pretty blonde divorcee has left his house.

Pair Arrested For Extortion

Portland—(UPI)—Alfred Eugene Kiefer, 35, registered owner of the Monarch Publishing company here, and James Q. Jenkins, 36, Kiefer's partner in the publishing business, were arrested by police intelligence division officers today and booked into the city jail on extortion charges.

Bail was set at \$5,000 each. Arresting officers were armed with warrants signed by District Judge Ray D. Shoemaker based on information and complaint of Mrs. Ada McCarthy, operator of a Portland nursing home.

Police said they have had complaints from nursing home operators in the Portland and Salem areas that spoken and implied threats of "exposés" were used to seek advertising.

Kiefer was released from the Oregon state prison last December after serving a term for check forgery. Jenkins was identified as a former associate of James B. Elkins, one of the principals in the Portland vice controversy.

MICE VS. ELEPHANTS

Karlruhe, Ger.—(UPI)—Officials blamed mice today for the deaths of two elephants in the city's zoo. Two weeks ago a five-year-old African elephant died from an unidentified sickness. Investigating veterinarians said they believed the animals died from a previously unknown disease introduced into the elephant house by mice.
