

## Central Point Garden Club Plans Annual Show June 12

Central Point flower lovers of the Rogue Valley are looking forward to "Bounties of the Earth," the twelfth annual flower show of the Central Point Garden Club. This year's theme is a portrayal of verses from Genesis 1, which opens with "In the beginning, God created the Heaven and the earth."

The show will be held Thursday, June 12 and Friday, June 13 in the Central High school gymnasium, North Pacific highway. It will be open to the public from 2 to 9 p.m. on both days. Any flower grower in the valley is invited to bring entries.

As the show is competitive, the entries will be accepted between 7 and 9 p.m. on Wednesday, June 11 and between 7 and 9 a.m. on June 12. Any late entries will be placed on exhibit in the non-competitive division.

The exhibit, planned for beauty and education, will have four divisions: horticulture, artistic classes, junior and education.

The first section of horticultural specimens will include 12 annuals; biennials and perennials are listed in Classes 13 to 27, and the various iris are in Classes 28 to 31.

One of the largest sections will be roses of all colors in Class 32 for hybrid teas; Class 33, floribundas; Class 34, grandifloras; Classes 35 and 36, miniature and polyantha. Classes 37-38 will include any variety of daylilies, and vines in Classes 39-41.

Arrangers will be seeking ribbons in the artistic classes, 15 in number. These cover a variety of materials and subjects, including flowers, fruits, vegetables, material from the tea, dried material, corsages, table settings (limited in number with advance entries to be made) and interpretations of various subjects, such as hymns.

A special division has been prepared for junior gardeners, with sections for horticulture and artistic and educational classes. In horticulture, the juniors may exhibit a plant rooted in water, one annual or perennial or three annuals. Artistic classes feature an arrangement of red flowers for Father's Day, a composition illustrating a favorite hymn, a woodland scene and an arrangement of garden flowers. In the educational classes, the juniors may exhibit a bird feeder or birdhouse; a scrapbook or poster on trees, flowers, animals, forest, birds, soil, or litter bug campaign; and a collection of leaves, rocks or soil types.

The non-competitive division will include commercial exhibits, educational displays, conservation and hobby exhibits, and arrangements representing other clubs.

Under flower show regulations, all horticulture entries must be grown by the exhibitor or have been in his possession at least three months.

All flowers and foliage used in artistic classes need not be grown by the exhibitor, but must be home grown, except materials used in class two.

Awards will be blue, red and yellow ribbons with special awards, green ribbons. Sweepstakes awards will be given to exhibitor winning greatest number of first prize points for specimens in horticulture, and for greatest number of blue ribbons in artistic classes. If no entries in a class are worthy of an award in the opinion of the judges, none will be given. Only one entry in any class by an exhibitor is permitted.

Uniform containers will be furnished for horticultural classes, but exhibitors must furnish containers for artistic classes, with name on underside. No entries may be removed from the show until 7 p.m. Friday. No state conservation material may be used entered to provide education for the public in conserving and protecting such material.

Grants Pass—Jay V. Soeder and Demetrios Jameson, Oregon college art instructors, have been selected as judges for the eleventh annual southern Oregon art exhibit, scheduled for June 27 to 29 in the Grants Pass high school library.

Mr. Soeder, who holds BFA and MFA degrees from the Art Institute of Chicago, is a native of Indiana and is an instructor at the Fort Wayne Art School and museum before joining the staff of the University of Oregon as an instructor in drawing and painting in September, 1957. He has exhibited in many local and regional showings in the midwest since 1946 and participated in one and two-man showings at the Peradella Gallery, New York City, in 1953, 1954 and 1955.

Mr. Jameson, assistant professor of art at Oregon State college, studied at the Corcoran School of Art, Washington, D. C.; received his BFA degree with honors from Washington University in St. Louis; and earned his MFA at the University of Illinois. He has exhibited extensively in the Midwest, New York, California, Colorado, Texas and the Pacific Northwest. His paintings have been selected for the permanent collections of the Denver Art museum, the Seattle Art museum, the Portland Art museum, the University of Illinois and Brigham Young University.

The show, which is sponsored by the Grants Pass branch, American Association of University Women, is open to all artists in Southern Oregon, who may submit up to five pictures in any media which have been completed in the last five years. There will also be a special division in sculpture and wood carving. The entry fee is \$1 for adults and 25 cents for artists under 19 years of age.

Entries will be received at the high school library from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., June 22 and 23. Judging will take place June 26, and the show will be open to the public free of charge June 27, 28 and 29.

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## French Fashion Houses Now Hiring Foreigners

Paris — There is plenty of leg room for young American models in the high fashion houses of Paris.

This is the consensus of France's couturiers, who admire the long legs of American models and know their sales value in peddling clothes to an international clientele.

Hardly a Paris fashion house has not hired foreign mannequins since the war.

"How could it be otherwise?" asked George Bernard, a director of the house of Jean Patou. "Parisian culture is international. It isn't sufficient to have only French mannequins when so many of the customers are English, American and French."

The Dior firm, with clients in 24 or more countries, always has maintained a few hand-picked foreign models.

**Prestige**  
Foreign models try to crack the elegant salons off the Rue de la Paix more for prestige than pay, say those in the business. They point out that the average full-time model at Dior or Chanel makes only \$100 to \$150 a month, plus approximately \$10 an hour for posing for photographers.

Her sister in New York, if she's much in demand, will earn from \$50 to \$60 an hour.

The fact that modeling is less commercialized in France than in the United States does not detract from its glamour. Matter of fact, it lends a certain aura.

"Working in a Paris salon is like being in a fairyland," said Christine Tidmarsh, a London girl who made her debut as a Dior model last month, at the same time

she said: "They have good figures and wonderful legs—particularly the Americans and Scandinavians—but they model a dress mechanically. They don't give it life the way the French do, which is the secret of showing it."
