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Norblad's Bid for Congress Reported To Cost \$12,875

Salem — (UPI) — Rep. Walter Norblad (R-Ore.) spent \$12,875 in his successful bid for the Republican nomination for Congress from the 1st district.

A report released by the state elections division showed that Norblad's opponent, Phil

Hitchcock, Oswego, spent \$10,734 on his campaign.

Thornton's Expenses

In the same district, Democratic Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton spent \$707 to win nomination while Don

Metheeny, Brooks, spent \$377. In the 2nd district Marion T. Weatherford spent \$3,898 to gain the GOP nomination while incumbent Democrat Al Ullman spent \$251.

John Johnston spent \$2,476 to win the Republican nomination in the 3rd district compared with \$250 for Richard Hill and \$361 for George Alt-

vater, Johnston's Republican opponents.

Paul E. Geddes, Roseburg Republican, spent \$429 to win the Republican nomination in the 4th congressional district while Democratic Rep. Charles O. Porter filed no expense statement.

In Supreme Court races, veteran Justice George Rossman spent \$10,063 to win a non-partisan battle with Jason

Lee, Salem, who spent \$6,250. Justice Gordon Sloan spent \$6,250 in his successful bid for the other Supreme Court seat compared with \$3,086 for Senate President Boyd Overhulse, Madras, and \$2,570 for Samuel M. Bowe, Grants Pass.

Pupils, Teachers Poisoned by Food

Marion, N.C. — (UPI) — Practically the entire student body and three teachers of an elementary school here were

fighting off the agonies of food poisoning today while authorities sought the cause of the outbreak.

Baked ham, which was on the lunch menu, was suspected as the source of the poisoning which sent 202 students and the teachers into acute pain and shock late Tuesday afternoon.

Only 25 students at Eugene Cross Elementary School seemed to have escaped the poisoning. The rest were hospitalized. However, authorities said none of the students or teachers was seriously ill.

McDowell county health officer Dr. W. F. E. Loftin said samples of the lunch menu, which, in addition to the baked ham, included slaw, green beans, baked apples, ice cream and cookies — had been sent to the state toxicological laboratory at Raleigh for examination. Loftin said he believed the ham probably caused the epidemic.

Graham Preaches On Holy Trinity

San Francisco — (UPI) — Evangelist Billy Graham preached Tuesday night on the Holy Trinity before a

Cow Palace audience of 9,000, the smallest crowd which has heard him since he started his San Francisco Bay area crusade on April 27.

The drop in attendance was credited to interest in California's primary election and a baseball game between the Giants and Milwaukee.

On the Holy Trinity, Graham said:

"Maybe you don't understand this, but neither do I. No man can comprehend the mystery of the Holy Trinity."

He also discussed the role of the Holy Spirit which he said was "within all of us and He is in constant warfare with the flesh. Our hearts are the battlegrounds. The Christian life is a life of conflict."

Jupiter, Thor Work Speeded for European Sites

Washington — (UPI) — The Defense department today moved at top speed to produce and dispatch to European launching sites this country's first long range ballistic missiles — the Jupiter and Thor.

Defense officials said a decision had been made for "full scale production" of both the 1,500-mile weapons to arm Air Force squadrons in Britain and on the European continent by the end of the year.

The United States, they said, is putting its "heaviest bet" on the 1,500-mile Intermediate Range Ballistic Missile (IRBM) to match a possible Russian lead in 3,000 mile Intercontinental Ballistic Missiles (ICBM). The Air Force's Atlas and Titan (ICBM) are at least year away from usefulness.

Serves Same Purpose

Since Western European allied nations are within easy IRBM range of the Soviet Union, the 1,500-mile American weapon serves much the same purpose as any Russian capability to launch ICBMs from Soviet bases against the United States.

By the end of this year the first Air Force Thor squadron is scheduled to become operational in England and the first Jupiter squadron in a yet-unannounced launching site on the European continent. Each squadron will be armed with 15 of the deadly nuclear weapons.

Cardinal Stritch At Rest in Chapel

Chicago — (UPI) — Samuel Cardinal Stritch was laid to rest in the bishop's chapel of Mount Carmel Tuesday, climaxing an ecclesiastical pageant that had no equal in the history of American Roman Catholicism.

Following the severe splendor of solemn pontifical requiem mass crowds gathered in streets of the city he called "home" where an estimated million persons paid their last homage.

Both sides of the street were lined for the last mile by uniformed policemen, plumed Knights of Columbus who formed an arch of sabres, and nurses whose red and blue capes waved gently in the brisk wind under the warming sun.

The cortege proceeded down a natural canopy of elm trees, then stopped before the small rise on which the chapel rests. Pallbearers carried the casket to the chapel where a final blessing was offered by the auxiliary bishop of the Chicago Archdiocese, Bishop Raymond Hillinger.

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Registration This Week for School's Music Program

Registration is being taken this week for the Medford school district's summer band and orchestra schedule. Sessions start June 10 at Medford High School.

Students from the fourth through 12th grades are eligible to participate in the program. Registration fee is \$1.

Classes will start Tuesday, June 10, for band and orchestra students and will be held in the Medford High School music wing. Schedules are available in various schools, officials said.

Classes include beginner's band and orchestra at 9:30 a.m. daily, intermediate band and orchestra at 9:45 a.m., junior high band and orchestra at 11 a.m. daily, beginning high or senior high band and orchestra at 1 p.m. Monday and Wednesday, and technic classes on Tuesday and Thursday.

Baton classes will start June 16. Classes will be assigned according to ability, officials said.

Instructors will be Irv W. Rick, band; John Drysdale, orchestra; and Sandra Lain, baton.

There will be two sessions for band and orchestra. One is between June 10 and June 20. The second session for band will be between July 7 and July 25, and the second session for orchestra will be July 21 through Aug. 8. Only one baton session is planned.

Milton-Freewater Blaze Harms Man

Walla Walla — (UPI) — An 86-year-old Milton-Freewater, Ore. man, Alec Hironimus, was in critical condition at a Walla Walla hospital today

after being found unconscious in his bed when fire broke out in a Milton-Freewater scrap iron warehouse.

The man's living quarters were on the second floor of the warehouse, firemen said. Attendants said Hironimus was not burned but suffered extreme smoke inhalation.

The fire, which took one hour and 20 minutes to control, threatened for a time the Milton-Freewater community hall, Centennial Flour mill and the Utah Cannery, all adjacent to the warehouse.

Arson Probed in Burns School Fire

Burns — (UPI) — Two officers from a State Police arson squad today were investigating a fire that destroyed the recently-completed Union High school.

The officers said the investigation may take several days.

The blaze started at about 7:30 p.m. Sunday and within two hours burned the building to the ground. The new school was to serve about 400 students from the Burns and Hines area this coming fall.
