Airline Passengers Receive Surprise

Shannon, Ireland — (UPI) — Forty-one passengers who thought they were flying to Canada woke up this morning surprised to find they were back where they had started — at Shannon airport.

While the passengers were asleep during the night, the Superconstellation Trans-Canada airliner developed trouble in one of its four engines 1-100 miles from Ireland.

Since the pilot had not yet reached the halfway point of the flight he turned the plane about and brought it back here on three engines. The passengers slept through it all.

One passenger, who declined to be identified, said "The only fright I got was when I found out I was in Ireland instead of Canada."

Scientists Plan Nuclear 'Mishap' At Idaho Falls

Los Angeles — (UPI) — Scientists with an eye on the growing importance of atomic power are planning a nuclear "accident" near Idaho Falls, Idaho, to see what happens when a reactor goes haywire.

Plans for the test were revealed Tuesday at a meeting of the American Nuclear Society of George Freund, chemical engineer of the Argonne National Laboratory, Lemont, Ill.

The scientist said a special reactor is being built at the National Reactor Station in Idaho for the "accident" which will be caused by permitting uranium rods to overheat.

No explosion

Freund said there would be no explosion and little damage to the test facility although some radio-active gas might escape from the rods.

The engineer said Argonne Laboratory wants to find out whether the liquid "fuel" will collect in a puddle or otherwise disperse.

Overheating and a runaway reactor are the two possible kinds of accidents which an atomic world must consider, according to Dr. B. P. Leonard of Convair Aircraft at Fort Worth, Tex.

Leonard said a runaway reactor is the most dangerous of the two accidents. He said a berserk atomic power source might spread a cloud of radioactivity 20 or 40 miles downwind.

At Least 40 Die In Cuban Drive To Chase Rebels

Havana — (UPI) — At least 40 persons have been killed in the all-out government drive to wipe out the rebel stronghold of Fidel Castro in eastern Cuba's Oriente Province, reports from Santiago said today.

There was no immediate indication how the losses were divided between the government troops and the rebels.

The reports said the government force of 8,000 to 10,000 men which was thrown against the rebels Sunday includes the American trained and equipped First battalion of the First Infantry regiment, a mixed tank regiment, a combat engineers battalion and the 7th Artillery regiment.

Major Combat

Center of the fighting, described as a "major combat," is the town of Buey Arriba, near Bayamo, north of the Sierra Maestra mountains, reliable sources said.

They said the government troops were supported by fighter planes, bombers, tanks and artillery.

The rebels were reported to be fighting fiercely and to have riddled two army fighters with anti-aircraft fire but the planes made it safely back to landing strips.

Private sources said some of the junior officers leading the army detachments only recently returned from the United States, where they received training in mountain warfare.

Unemployment Shows Decline

Washington — (UPI) — Unemployment declined at a greater than seasonal rate during May, government officials disclosed Tuesday night.

Unemployment dropped 78,000 in April to 5,120,000. Officials said the decrease was believed to be greater than 78,000. Official figures will be released Friday.

President Eisenhower presumably was told the good news during a White House meeting Tuesday with Raymond J. Saulnier, chairman

of the Council of Economic Advisors. The administration has contended the recession was "bottoming out."

The May figures also will show employment went up during the month. The officials said. Employment increased by 600,000 in April to 62,900,000. Many more persons probably found work in May as outdoor jobs opened up.

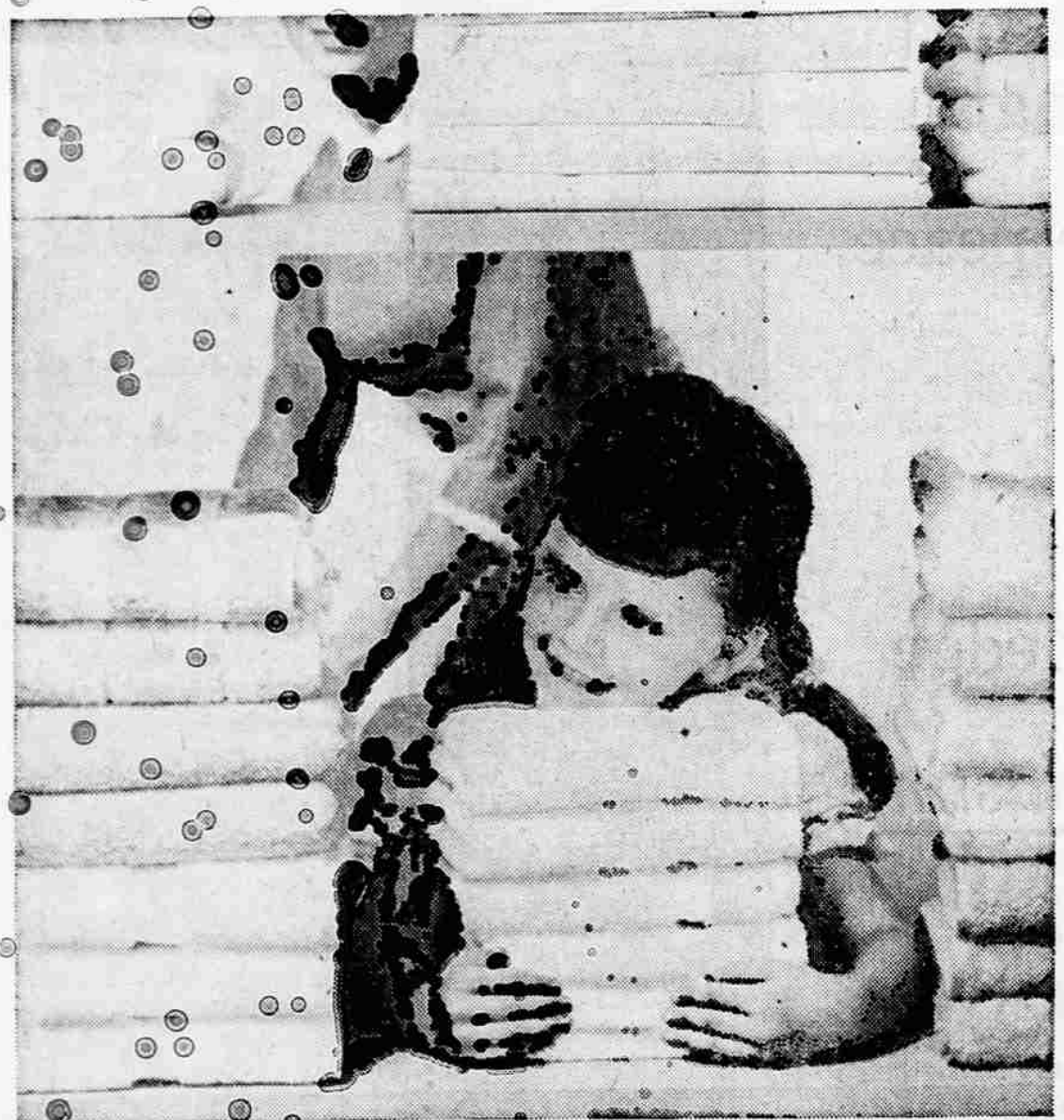
