

Milwaukee Grabs Lead in National

Braves Use Big Stick To Top SF

The homer hitting which carried them to the world championship last season still is the Milwaukee Braves' most formidable weapon.

The Braves have been having their troubles this year with world series hero Lew Burdette wobbling and 18-game winner Bob Buhl out of the lineup. But they still swing the "big stick" and that's why they're back in first place today after a 7-3 victory over the San Francisco Giants.

Hank Aaron and Wes Covington did the "bumping" on Tuesday night with two homers each and Felix Mantilla also contributed one, to offset another poor showing by Burdette. The victory went to Don McMahon, the 200-pound reliever from Brooklyn who has scored five of the Braves' last nine wins.

McMahon, however, needed help when the Giants staged a last-ditch ninth inning rally on a triple by Willie Mays and singles by Orlando Cepeda and Whitey Lockman. Ernie Johnson, who was touched for Lockman's hit, finally got out of the jam by retiring pinch-hitter Bob Schmidt and Velmy Thomas.

Braves Reach First

The victory eased the Braves into first place by a mere 10 points in a sharp contrast to the New York Yankees who opened up an 8½-game bulge by crushing the Chicago White Sox, 13-0, while the Washington Senators swept the second-place Kansas City Athletics, 5-4 and 10-3.

The St. Louis Cardinals beat the Pittsburgh Pirates, 8-4, the Cincinnati Redlegs whipped the Los Angeles Dodgers, 8-3, and the Chicago Cubs topped the Philadelphia Phillies, 12-4, in the other NL games.

In the AL, the Baltimore Orioles beat the Detroit Tigers, 2-0, and the Boston Red Sox downed the Cleveland Indians, 7-3.

Johnny Kucks yielded only two hits, both singles by Billy Goodman, to win his fourth game for the Yankees behind a 13-hit attack. Mickey Mantle got the Yankees off winging with a three-run first-inning homer and Yogi Berra and Bill Skowron also hit homers. It was the third straight shut-out for the White Sox, who haven't scored in 30 straight innings. The AL record for such futility is 48 innings.

Sievers Homers

Relief pitcher Dick Hyde "saved" both games for the Senators, who swept their second doubleheader in five days and jumped from seventh place into a tie for third. Roy Sievers' ninth homer provided the Senators with their winning margin in the opener. In the nightcap, third baseman Herb Plesses atoned for four errors with a two-run double in the midst of the Senators' eight-inning four-run rally.

Larry Jackson, aided by four double plays, won his fourth game for the Cardinals, who connected for 11 hits

including homers by Stan Musial and Joe Cunningham. Bob Shriver and Bill Mazer also homered for the Pirates who have lost seven of their last 10 games.

The Redlegs scored six runs on one hit and five walks in the third inning and spoiled the Dodgers' homecoming behind the steady pitching of Brooks Lawrence. Lawrence struck out seven and won his second game despite four Cincinnati errors. Sandy Koufax was the loser. Duke Snider homered for the Dodgers — to left center field.

Hard Ridden Wins Famed Epsom Race

Epsom, England — (UPI) — Hard Ridden, an outsider owned by Sir Victor Sassoon of England, won the 179th running of the famed Epsom Derby today.

Paddy's point, a 100 to 1 shot, finished second and Nagami took third place in a photo finish. A field of 20 thoroughbreds contested the mile and one-half race.

This was the second straight derby won by Sir Victor's horses and the third within the past six classics. Sassoon's Creppello won last year and his Pinza captured the rich prize in 1953.

The derby triumph also was the fourth for jockey Charlie Smirke. He previously won with Windsor Lad in 1934. Mahmoud in 1936 and Tylar in 1952.

Lucky lottery ticket holders around the world were interested in this race because the results formed the basis for the Irish Hospital Sweepstakes.

Wallaby II, the 4 to 1 French favorite; the American-bred and owned Bald Eagle, and the Canadian-entered Alberta Blue, ridden by Johnny Longden, all finished out of the money.

Hard Ridden, which earned his owner a purse of 26,630 pounds (\$74,844), left the post at odds of 18 to 1. Third-place Nagami was a 10 to 1 shot.

Approximately 250,000 fans, including Queen Elizabeth and other members of the royal family, watched the classic. The queen's horse, Miner's Lamp, was among those which finished out of the money.

Hard Ridden's margin of victory was five lengths. Paddy's Point, owned by F. N. Shane of Ireland, finished a length and one half ahead of Nagami, another English entry.
