Railroad Shares Meet New Demand

New York — UPI — A new demand developed today for railroad shares and the group rose to new high levels on average for the year.

Other sections of the market rallied with the rails but at a slower pace and the industrial average was down on the day. Utilities held a small gain that left them at a new high for 28 years.

Gains in the rails ranged to more than a point in the common stocks and to more than two points in the preferreds.

Kroger rose more than two to a new high. Gains of fractions to more than a point lifted Eastern Air Lines, Columbia Gas, American Home Products, and Rayonier to new highs.

Automobile issues ruled about steady all day. Steels were irregular with only a few changes outside a fractional area. Oils registered a mixed appearance.

Nothing New In Water Study

Portland — UPI — Douglas McKay, chairman of the U.S. section of the International Joint Commission, said Wednesday there was nothing new to report on U. S.-Canadian negotiations on the upper Columbia river.

McKay, former interior secretary and Oregon governor, passed through here en route to Salem from the nation's capital. He said he was awaiting a report of Army engineers on a study of the 318 report. This report, being brought up to date, was a document made by engineers are working with Canadian engineers, he said, and this group will report findings in December.

The Canadians are pressing for diversion of part of the flow of the Kootenai river into the Columbia in Canada and diversion of part of the Columbia into the Fraser river. Both diversions would affect the water supply for the U. S. Columbia river system.

Air Pollution Briefing Scheduled

Portland — UPI — Oregon lumbermen will attend a briefing session in Springfield June 12 to hear conclusions of a survey team which studied air pollution problems resulting from sawmill waste burners.

The \$15,000 study was launched last June by the engineering experiment station at Oregon State College in cooperation with the State Air Pollution Authority and the U. S. Public Health Service. An official of the Air Pollution Authority said the study proved that some burners are doing "an excellent job" of consuming waste products but that others "are serious offenders" in contributing to air pollution problems.

Trucker Missing After Accident

Springfield — UPI — Eldon C. Reynolds, about 30, a contract trucker from Salem, was missing today after his truck went over a bank and sank in the McKenzie river north of here about 11 a.m.

Reynolds was working for the Harbert Brothers Construction Company of Estacada on the Conley bank reclamation project along the McKenzie. Cecil Harbert, in charge of the project, said Reynolds had just dumped a load of rock and was backing to turn when the truck toppled over the bank into the river.

Heavy equipment nearby was used to pull the truck out of the water but Reynolds was not found and a fellow workman said he saw the missing man's hat floating down the river.

Oregon Traffic Death Rate Climbs

Salem — UPI — The motor vehicle mileage death rate in Oregon increased considerably in April, jumping to 5.9 deaths per 100 million miles of travel.

With 35 deaths in almost 591 million miles in April, the increase rose 1.5 points over the March death rate of 4.4. However, the death rate for the first four months of the year stands at 5.4 as compared with 5.9 for the same period last year.

Air Force Reserve Closures Expected

Portland — UPI — Abolishment of two Air Force reserve squadrons in the Pacific Northwest June 25 is expected, it was reported today.

Abolishment will come principally because of lack of funds, according to the Oregon Journal.

Squadrons affected will be the 8521st navigation training squadron at Portland International airport and the 8522nd navigation training squadron at Paine field near Everett, Wash., the newspaper said.

The Portland squadron has 23 reservists.

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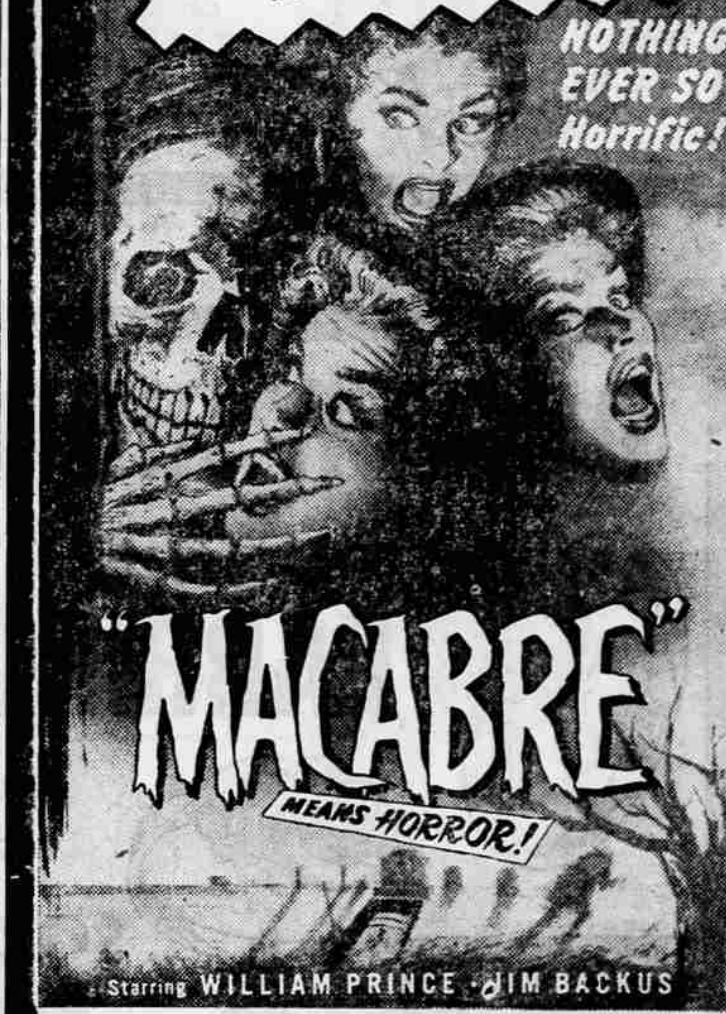
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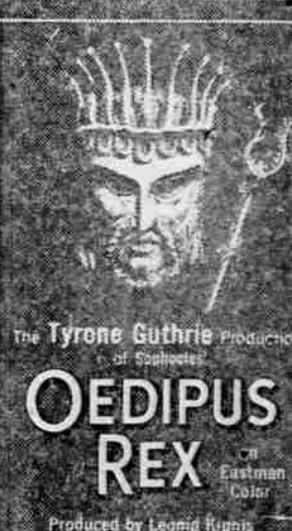
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
