Columbia Channel Project Supported

Portland—UPI—Army engineers today received testimony supporting a wider and deeper ship channel in the Columbia river.

A public hearing on proposals to deepen the present channel from 35 to 45 feet and increase the width from 500 to 650 feet was held at the Interior building.

Scheduled witnesses included Gov. Robert Holmes of Oregon, Sam Boddy, representing Gov. Albert Rosellini of Washington, followed by many others including some from eastern Washington and northern Idaho. Engineers expected about 100 statements.

The proposed deeper channel would cost an estimated \$20 million.

Algiers—Gen. Charles de Gaulle, pledging equality of voting for French and Moslems in Algeria:

Three Youth Programs Set at Oregon State

Corvallis — Nearly 2,800 Oregon youths will participate in summer training programs at Oregon State college during the week of June 15.

The 22nd annual Beaver Boys State, a one-week citizenship training program sponsored by the American Legion, will attract a record 500 high school boys.

The third annual Junior Engineers and Scientists Summer Institute (JESSI), scheduled June 15 to 28, is being expanded this year to include nearly 300 high school boys from throughout the north-west.

And, the Oregon 4-H club summer school, one of the largest programs of its kind in the nation, will bring nearly 2,000 club members and their leaders to the campus, June 16 to 22.

All of the 500 boys who attend Beaver Boys State are sponsored by local organizations, either veterans, fraternal, service, or social groups. As part of their citizenship training, elections are held to determine city, county and state officials and each boy is tending holds an office.
