Portland — (UPI) — Portland had hot, noisy and wet weather packed into a few hours. The mercury climbed to 92 degrees here Thursday afternoon, hottest so far this year. In the evening, a thunderstorm roared by. This morning it was pouring down rain. Up to two-thirds of an inch of rain fell in about 3 1/2 hours in Portland during the morning. Lumber Price Index Shows Demand Lag

Portland — (UPI) — Crow's lumber price index here today showed a continued lag in the demand for green fir dimension and boards from the pace of late April and early May. Prices also softened in utility and better studs for rail shipment and in utility grade dimension. Kiln-dried hemlock and white fir dimension continue active at strong prices. Douglas fir plywood sheathing moved to a new high for the year. Crow said, with some mills now asking \$100 to \$102 on 5/8 interior ply. Sanded grades remained slow at the \$64 base price.

PP&L Line Struck
Lightning struck a Pacific Power & Light Company 69,000-volt line at Coburg, knocking out service for about an hour Thursday afternoon between Springfield and Albany.

Lightning also knocked out the power line from the new Pelton dam at Redmond.

Gusty winds knocked tree limbs onto power lines in Oregon City where residents called the storm one of the most severe electrical disturbances they have seen. Power outages were reported there, also.

Room Set Afire

Lightning also set a switch room afire at Gresham Sand and Gravel Co. east of here resulting in about \$750 damage. Two cows were reported killed in the Willamette valley.

The five-day outlook for western Oregon called for temperatures near normal with more than normal precipitation, mostly from week end showers. Temperatures will be on the cooler side with high 65-75, the weather man said. Eastern Oregon can expect highs of 75-85 with afternoon and evening thunder-showers.

Blue Mountain Area Trees To Be Sprayed

Portland — (UPI) — The U.S. Forest Service said today that seven PBV aircraft would be part of a 14-plane group which would spray 820,000 acres of timber growth in central Blue mountain area in late June and July for protection against the spruce budworm.

It will be the first time the PBV type of plane has been used to spray Northwest forests.

Drivers Licenses Suspended List

Salem — The department of motor vehicles has released names of 246 drivers whose licenses were ordered suspended during the period beginning May 26 and ending May 30.

Length of suspension varies, depending on charges involved, recommendation of court, discretionary action by the department or requirements of Oregon law. The department said some of the licenses involving financial responsibility and court recommendations may have been reinstated after suspension was ordered.

The department warned drivers that the penalty for driving while suspended is a jail sentence of no less than two days and up to six months, and there may be imposed a fine up to \$500. Under licensing procedures, this will also result in an additional year of suspension.
