OCC Tutors Pick Three From OCE

Portland—(UPI)—Six players from Southern Oregon were named today to the 1958 Oregon Collegiate conference all-star baseball team, picked by a vote of the coaches.

Members of the champion Red Raiders who made the squad were first baseman Larry Maurer, third baseman Willie Jones, outfielder Ron Maurer, Jim Mcabe and Phil Sword, and pitcher Dave D'Olivo.

The crew includes three players from Oregon College of Education, two from Eastern Oregon college, and one from Oregon Technical institute.

Quinn Makes Rounds

Roundup of the first team were catcher Barry Adams of OCE, second baseman Dick Quinn of Eastern Oregon, shortstop Charlie Genter of Oregon Tech, utility infielder Ted Owens of OCE, utility outfielder John Willmarth of Eastern Oregon and pitcher Gordy Detzel of OCE.

There were no unanimous choices and no repeaters from 1957. EOC's Quinn completed a cycle of all-conference clubs for the school year. He previously was named on the football and basketball all-stars.

On the second team were catcher Wally Harding of Portland State; first baseman Chuck Barnhart of EOC, second baseman Earl Goldman of OCE, third baseman Terry Ziegenhagen of EOC, shortstop Chuck Nevi of SOC, outfielders Larry Bass of OCE, Ron Adams of Portland State, and Earl Chappelle of OCE, and pitchers Jack Brown of SOC and Jerry Aman of Portland State.

San Francisco—(UPI)—The San Francisco Giants, battling to shore up their pitching strength, Saturday sold southpaw Jim Constable to Cleveland and recalled right-hander Paul Giel along with outfielder Felipe Alou from their Phoenix farm club.

The Giants also optioned rookie Willie Kirkland, who was only hitting .217, to Phoenix.

"We needed another pitcher and Giel has compiled a good 3-0 record since we sent him to Phoenix earlier this season," manager Bill Rigney said. "Alou is hitting around .315 and has 13 home runs. He also has plenty of speed and we can use that too."

Rigney emphasized that "we are not giving up on Kirkland. We want him to play every day and rediscover the strike zone."

Irish Colt Romps To Upset Victory

New York—(UPI)—Cavan, a big strapping colt from Ireland, romped to an upset six-length victory in the \$114,600 Belmont stakes Saturday as Tim Tam's bid for a triple crown victory ended in an injury which may halt his racing career.

Tim Tam, seeking to give Calumet Farm a record third sweep of the Kentucky Derby, Preakness and Belmont Stakes and become the ninth horse in history to win the three classics, injured his right front foot during the race. He finished second but he was unable to menace Cavan in the stretch.

Jockey Ismal Valenzuela never even returned to the unsaddling enclosure with the brilliant son of Tom Fool, who was obviously in distress as he crossed the finish line. He had been bet down to 3 to 20.

Trainer Jimmy Jones of Calumet Farm said he feared Tim Tam had broken one of the sesamoid bones in his right front foot and ordered X-rays taken to determine the exact extent of the injury. Jones hoped it was only a bruise, for horses with sesamoid trouble seldom get back to the races and when they do they never are as good as they were before the injury.

Jockey Ismal Valenzuela reported he "heard something pop at the quarter pole." He then whipped Tim Tam with his right hand and the horse "ducked in on me." The Tex-

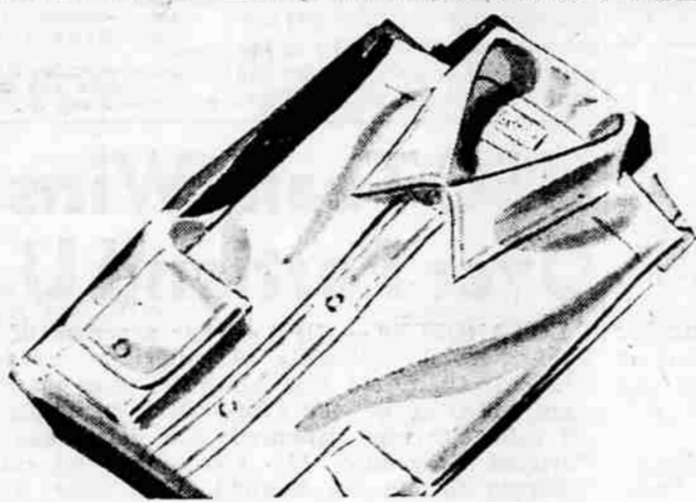

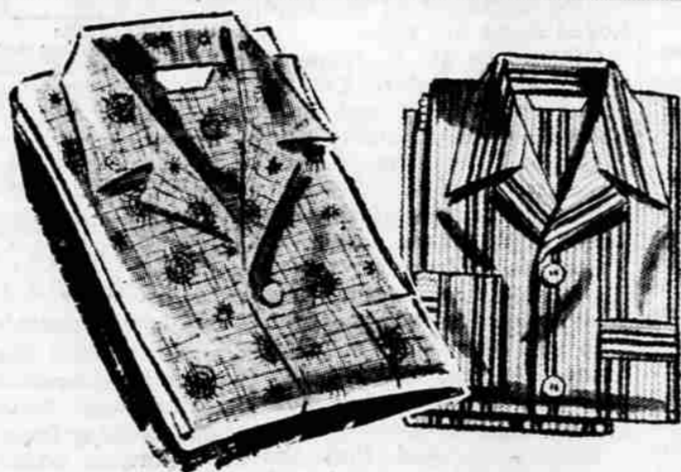
