

Industrialist Eaton Defends Effort To Secure World Peace

Cleveland, Ohio — (UPI)—Industrialist Cyrus Eaton defended his efforts toward world peace today in the face of an attack by Rep. Francis E. Walter (D-Penn.), chairman of the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

Walter charged in Washington Sunday that Eaton was trying "to usurp the powers of the state department" in recent contacts with Russia.

"Any man who loves his country would be concerned with the danger of nuclear war and would take steps to prevent it," the financier said.

Better Understanding

Eaton sponsored an international conference of scientists in Canada last April to have "distinguished scholars from all parts of the world get a better understanding of each other's philosophy and thereby reduce the danger of nuclear war."

Scientists from Russia and Communist China have attended meetings sponsored by

Eaton, of which that in April was the latest.

Eaton said the conferences were similar to the type now backed by President Eisenhower between scientists of nations with nuclear weapons.

Walter called Eaton's activities almost an attempt to "enter into negotiations with a foreign power."

Plans To Visit Russia

"I can't understand how any citizen has this right," Walter said, after Eaton disclosed plans to visit Russia with his wife within the next four months to press his campaign for "world peace."

Walter said he planned to set a date "quickly" for questioning by his committee about Eaton's earlier charges that the FBI and other government security agencies are "snooping, informing and creeping up on people."

Walter said he wants to know the basis for the charges, which he said have "widespread approval behind the iron curtain."

\$53 Million for Oregon Projects Receives Approval

Washington — (UPI)—The public works appropriation bill approved by the House Appropriations committee today included more than \$53 million for Oregon reclamation and Army Engineer projects.

Rivers, harbors and flood control projects of Army engineers for Oregon included:

Blue River reservoir planning funds, \$150,000; Van-couver: The Dalles Columbia river channel, \$7 million; Columbia river/John Day river \$16,000 planning funds; Cougar reservoir \$5,400,000; Fall Creek reservoir, \$150,000 planning funds; Green Peter reservoir \$310,000 planning funds; Hill's Creek reservoir \$13 million; Haley reservoir \$110,000 planning funds; John Day lock and dam, \$3 million; Multnomah county drainage district No. 1 \$600,000; The Dalles dam, \$13,500,000; Willamette river bank protection \$500,000.

House Approves Appropriations For Jobless Pay

Washington — (UPI)—The House today passed by voice vote a \$665,700,000 emergency appropriation to finance extended state jobless compensation payments.

The chamber sent the anti-recession measure to the Senate after only 10 minutes of debate and soon after it had received it from the Appropriations committee.

The committee said it hastened action because it did not want to "interpose possible blocks" to expediting "this program of assistance in the current serious unemployment situation."

Loaned to States

The funds would be loaned to the states to extend by as much as 90 per cent the period of payments to jobless whose eligibility for benefits had expired. The loans are optional with each state. It is not yet known how many will participate but those with heavy industrial concentrations were expected to do so.

Of the total sum approved, \$640 million is for payment of benefits, \$25,100,000 for state administrative expenses, and \$600,000 for Labor Department expenses.

If fewer states participate than expected, the money is not loaned must be returned to the Treasury.

John Thomas Davis, 68, Warrenton, was killed Saturday night when the pickup truck he was driving and a car collided on Highway 101 east of Astoria.

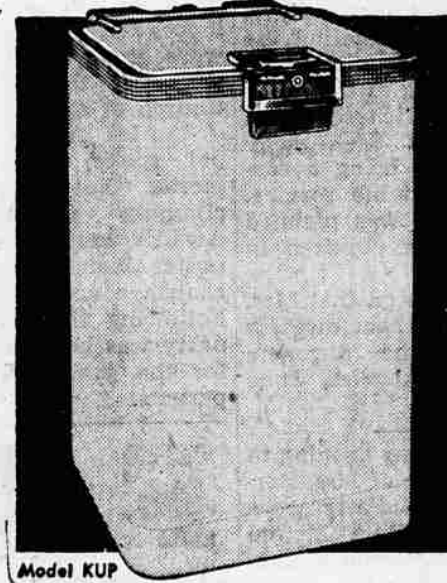

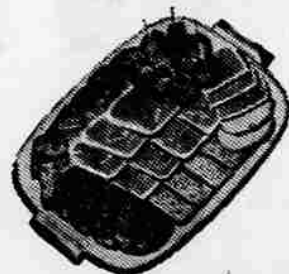

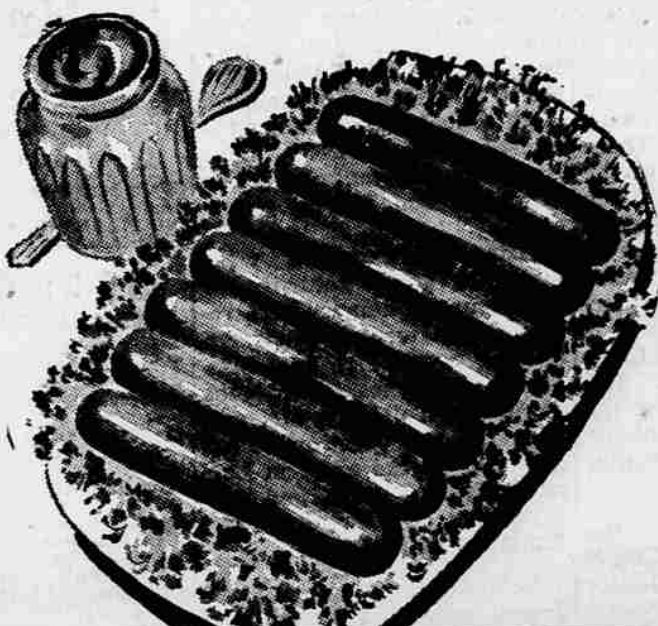
