

Mounties Knot with Beavers But Keep Edge Over Phoenix

Van couber's Mounties, although stymied by the curfew law in their home town plus the inability to win despite a six-run rally, managed to hold onto their slim lead over Phoenix in the Pacific Coast league chase.

The Mounties host Portland in a double header Monday after grinding 11 innings to an 8-8 tie with the Beavers yesterday. By then, it was 6 p.m., time to retire according to a Sunday law which also wiped out the second contest. But Vancouver remained nine percentagepoints ahead of Phoenix. The Giants split with Seattle, taking the second game, 7-3, after the Rainiers won the opener, 5-2.

Other Games
In other games, Salt Lake swept two from Sacramento, 5-4 and 3-2 while San Diego hammered Spokane, 11-2, in a single game.

Vancouver exploded for six runs in the sixth inning to ruin Bob Garber's dreams of hurling a no-hitter. Ray Barker's two-run double was the key blow of the attack.

The last-place Beavers went out ahead, 7-6, with a four run blast in the eighth but Buddy Peterson drove home two runs with a double for Vancouver in the ninth to send

the game into overtime. From there on the teams played scoreless ball while using up a total of 33 players, including 12 pitchers.

Rabe Looks Sharp
Charlie Rabe hurled a sharp nine-hitter against Phoenix to give the Rainiers their victory in the opener. A four-run spurge in the fourth inning helped the PCL veteran who was optioned back to the league Friday by Cincinnati. Then Curt Barclay, bolstered by a five-run rally during the fourth frame, turned back the Suds with a seven-hitter in the finale.

Sam Miley and Paul Pettit hit back-to-back pinch singles to give Salt Lake its 5-4 victory over Sacramento in the eighth inning of the short opener which went into overtime. Don Urquhart went all the way to win his sixth straight. Carlos Bernier made a great catch of Harry Bright's fly in the ninth inning of the nightcap to assure George Perez his third triumph of the campaign. Harding Peterson doubled home the winning run in the eighth.

San Diego crushed Seattle with a 15-hit barrage that made things easy for southpaw Bill Werle. Fred Hatfield drove in three runs, two of them with a homer while

Earl Averill collected three hits. Connie Grob was the loser.

Grant Drubs Lincoln 11-1 For State Baseball Crown

Portland—(UPI)—The state high school baseball championships were decided in Multnomah stadium Saturday by emphatic margins as Grant dumped Lincoln, 11-1 for the A-1 title; Central of Mouth-Independence blanked Myrtle Creek, 6-0, for the A-2 crown and Adrian crushed B defending champion Gaston, 12-2.

Dick Brede recorded his 11th victory against no losses as he pitched a steady six-hitter for Grant. It was the second A-1 baseball title for the Generals. In 1951, they dropped Oregon City 5-3 for the championship.

Central shut out Myrtle Creek in A-2 play behind Bill Lukens' two-hitter. Lukens, a righthander, also belted a two-run homer, the first over-the-

fence home run hit by a prep-er in the stadium.

In the first game of the triple header, Phil Hatch hurled a no-hit ball against Gaston as Adrian wrested the B crown from the Greyhounds.

The Grant and Adrian victories were abbreviated by an OSAA 10-run lead rule which automatically ends a game in the fifth or successive innings. Adrian's win came in the fifth frame and Grant's in the sixth.

Veterinarian Thinks Tim Tam Career Over on Racing Track

New York—(UPI)—Calumet Farm's Tim Tam, a victim of racing's most tragic injury and one of sport's greatest upsets, has run his last race, the veterinarian who x-rayed the colt's leg predicted Sunday.

"It's unlikely that any attempt will be made to race Tim Tam again," Dr. William N. Wright told United Press International. "He's such a good horse I personally think it would be foolish to jeopardize his potential value as a stud horse by risking further injury."

Broken Bone

Tim Tam, the hero of the Kentucky Derby and Preakness, sustained a broken bone in his right foreleg Saturday while finishing second behind Irish-bred Evan in the Belmont stakes.

Tim Tam is not suffering any great pain but is "a little uncomfortable," Dr. Wright reported. He added cold compresses are being applied to the leg to reduce the swelling. An operation might be performed later to remove the bone chip.

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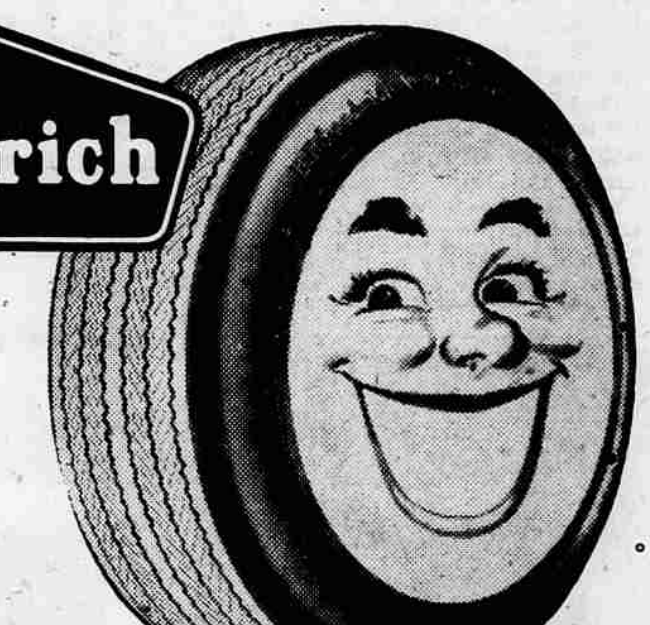
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
