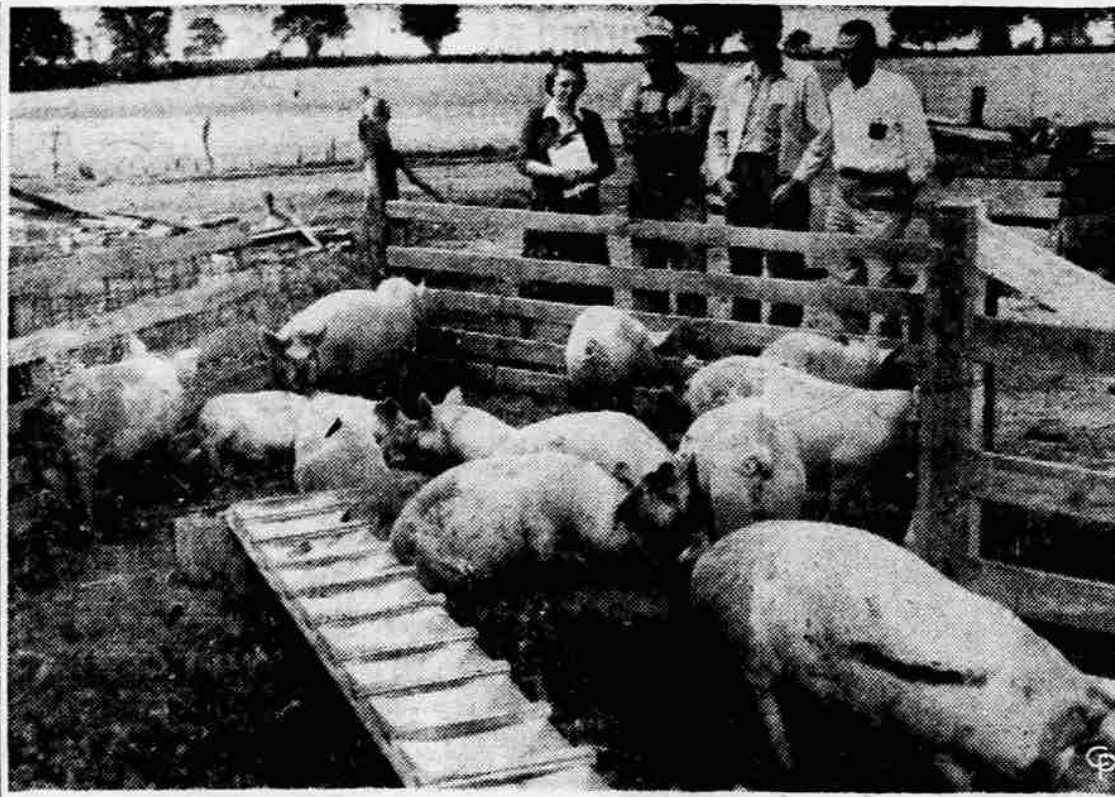


Queen Soraya, Shah May Reconciliate, Reports Indicate

New York—(UPI)—A reconciliation between the Shah of Iran and former Queen Soraya, the woman he exiled and divorced because she failed to provide him with an heir, appeared a possibility today.
It is believed the former queen may be taking with her an exciting secret when she sails from New York Wednesday on the Queen Elizabeth.
Unconfirmed reports indicate that American doctors either have performed, or will perform at a later date, an operation that may make it possible for the deposed queen to become a mother.
Soraya and the Shah parted last February because their marriage failed to produce an heir and a divorce was signed early in April.
Spokesmen at the New York hospital, the Iranian Information Bureau and occupants of Soraya's suite at the Waldorf-Astoria Towers refused to give either a flat denial or a confirmation.
At the time of their breakup the Shah was reported deeply distressed at the necessity of parting with his "dear" wife, but the queen was exiled and the divorce obtained.
"Single Divorce"
If Soraya now has good news, a reconciliation is possible.

Two Children Die As Auto Plunges Into Grand Canyon

Cameron, Ariz. — (UPI)—Two children in a runaway auto plunged over the rim of the Grand Canyon to their deaths Monday bringing to three the number killed in the past 24 hours in plunges into the canyon.
The children, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Qualls, Brownsville, Tex., were killed when their parents' car rolled into the canyon from a scenic lookout point 10 miles west of here on Highway 64.
The horrified couple stood helplessly as their car moved forward, gained momentum and then plunged 1,500 feet into the canyon, coming to rest in the Little Colorado river.
Earlier in the day, park rangers brought the body of Donald L. Mark, a clerk at an auto camp near the El Tovar Lodge on the south rim, out of the depths of the canyon.
Witnesses said he tumbled 300 feet into the canyon while playfully jumping among rocks, described by Park Superintendent John McLoughlin as an "awfully dangerous place."
Bodies of the Qualls' children, James Lloyd, 5, and Harold Frank, 15 months, were recovered at mid-afternoon about three hours after the car had plunged over the edge.

Body of Waldport Girl Found in Pond

Waldport, Ore. — (UPI)—State police Monday night recovered the body of Gail Ann Thompson, 10, from a mill pond three miles east of her home at Waldport.

The child, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Willard Thompson, was last seen Monday just before 6 p.m. Her body was not found until after 10 p.m.

Officers said water in the mill pond was 8 to 10 feet deep and that the Thompson girl couldn't swim. Her body was fully clothed, indicating she had fallen into the water accidentally.

Yonkers, N. Y. — (UPI)—Karl J. Fairbanks, 55, inventor and aeronautics authority, died Sunday after an illness of six weeks. He was a vice president and a director of the Fairchild Data Devices Corporation, which manufactures equipment used in missile and airplane research.

Eisenhower Seen Colossal Failure As President

Dallas, Tex. — (UPI)—Oklahoma oilman—Senator Robert Kerr (D) has labeled President Eisenhower "honorable, but uninformed—about as colossal a failure as president as we ever had."

Kerr, in Dallas to address the Advertising Federation of America, said "there are any number of informed people in Dallas who know more about what is going on in the Eisenhower administration than Eisenhower."

He said foreign imports have been a major factor in the current recession, and

charged "ignorance" rather than maliciousness on the part of the administration for allowing "excessive foreign imports" and the recession.

Kerr said "there is more ignorance on the part of Eisenhower and his advisors than in any other administration since I was born, 1896."

When asked whether there is any possibility of Eisenhower's resigning, Kerr answered, "about as much chance as there is of me having a baby." But, "if you really want to see him (like) tremble in anger just suggest to him that he resign."

Kerr said present government restrictions on foreign oil imports are "about as good as pitching hay with a table fork."

He said the State department has some good men but they are "hypnotized by a determination to bring on certain results" through current trade agreements. Kerr said the Reciprocal Trade Acts have been grossly distorted by the State department.

Kerr charged that the business recession was made by administration leaders who have done "little, if anything, to bring us out of it."

Western Air Lines To Resume Schedule

Los Angeles — (UPI)—Western Air Lines first flight in 108 days were scheduled today for 26 cities serviced by the airline in the western states, Canada and Mexico.

Return of WAL planes to the air ended the nation's longest complete shutdown in commercial aviation history, begun last Feb. 21 when members of the Air Lines Pilots association walked out.

Within 11 days the company hopes to restore service to 21 other cities served by the airline which ordinarily

has a full schedule of 88 flights.

The long dispute between ALPA and Western ended May 24 when the negotiators agreed to submit unsettled issues to arbitration.

The pilots returned to work June 1 to take refresher courses and check out aircraft. More than 2,000 other employees furloughed after the strike were called back as needed.

Wyatt May Get Tax Court Post

Portland — (UPI)—Wendell Wyatt, Astoria attorney and former state Republican Central Committee chairman, was reported today to be under consideration for a vacancy on the U.S. Tax Court.

The vacancy occurred with the death of Judge Stephen E. Rice of Florida. Wyatt was in Washington, D. C. on business for the Columbia River Packers Association and had no comment on the report. The Oregonian quoted informed sources as saying Wyatt was under consideration for the \$22,500 post.

The late Judge Rice's term would have run until June 1, 1968.

Reformatory Escapees Back in Institution

Monroe, Wash. — (UPI)—Four inmates who escaped from the maximum security ward at the Washington State Reformatory here Monday were rounded up late Monday night.

Multnomah County Roadmaster says an investigation will be conducted to see if girders supporting east side approaches "sag" under the weight of tons of concrete roadbed.

An engineer said the roller coaster effect was a common fault of bridges and that he didn't believe the problem would become much worse.

Labor Urged To Fight Race Barriers

Portland — (UPI)—Organized labor was urged Monday night to take a more active part in efforts to battle racial discrimination.

Edward J. Hawes of the Multnomah County Central Labor Council's civil rights committee said, he was "chagrined" Saturday at the lack of representatives from labor at a governor's inter-group conference. He said members should get locals to back fights for civil rights laws and practices.

Housing was described as the main area of discrimination in Oregon by A. T. Williams Sr. of the Carpenters Union, who also attended the conference.

Portland — (UPI)—The 50th anniversary Portland Rose Festival today featured inauguration of a Festival Center in downtown park blocks.
