Editor's note: The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, a newspaper editor, a women's editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual report. The Family Council does not give advice; it merely reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Arthur K. Jim says I should see a psychiatrist. James L. He is a very mixed up fellow.

Arthur K.—I am 20, a college student in great need of help on a serious problem.

For the past several years I have had very strong attachments to young fellows I admired. I guess I kind of hero-worshipped them because they all had characteristics I wished I had—that is, they were handsome, good at sports, socially successful and very intelligent. I am afraid that I'm a little or a lot under average in all those respects.

I made very good friends with a guy at school and I told him about my attitude toward a certain school leader. Jim said that I was going much too far in my worship and that my feelings bordered on abnormality. He told me I ought to see a psychiatrist, but since I have never done anything abnormal I don't see why this should be necessary.

James L.—I have known Art for more than a year and I have come to realize more than he is really a very mixed up fellow, even though he doesn't like to admit it.

It is true that Arthur socializes with girls quite a bit—more even than I do—but he is very shy and unaggressive with them. He has admitted to me that he only kissed a girl a few times in his life and that it didn't go farther than that. For a guy his age that's something to worry about.

I am just a few months older than Art but I have had quite a bit of experience, so I know what I'm talking about. Art really has a serious problem and he had better do something about it before it's too late.

The Council, Arthur may have some problems, but from the evidence given we suspect that Jim's are a lot more serious.

Many persons tend to project on others feelings and attitudes that they don't want to acknowledge in themselves. They become terribly alarmed and wrought up, as Jim is, over the slightest evidence in somebody else of these undesired impulses. Jim is much too quick and positive in seeing abnormality in his friend.

Jim ought to know that aggressiveness with girls is not necessarily a sign of great masculinity. For some men it is a cover up for real fear. Lack of aggressiveness at Art's age is not necessarily a sign of maladjustment, particularly if his social relations with girls are enjoyable.

Jim ought to be more honest with himself. It may be that he feels he is very much in need of psychiatric help. He should acknowledge it and do something about it while he is young enough to get the most benefit from such treatment.

Arthur's hero worship does indicate a lack of confidence in himself as a human being.

and a man. It is normal for much younger boys to develop these feelings. Arthur is rather old for them. If he feels disturbed about it, consultation with a psychiatrist would be a good idea, but he should not go purely on his friend's say-so.

Graham Warns On Ignoring Hell

San Francisco (UPI)—Evangelist Billy Graham says it's a mistake to ignore the reality of Hell.

"Just because the topic of Hell is unpopular and controversial doesn't mean we should ignore it," Graham told a Cow Palace audience of 16,325 Sunday.

"I warn you of future retribution. I warn you the day of reckoning is coming. Be careful. Watch out. Stop before it is too late."

"We are too interested in our own lives, our own pleasures, our own amusements. We don't want to be warned of the dangers that lie ahead." After the sermon, 459 persons made decisions for Christ.
