Aswan—As we flew over the famed Aswan dam on a flight that enabled me to see some gazelles, I couldn't help reflecting how the builders of the dam beat the silting problem.

It is said that silt may eventually fill up some of the great dams of our Far West, but the tremendous load of silt the Nile carries will not fill up the Aswan dam. The reason is the builders provided 140 undersluices, each with a 150 square foot opening. Then they added another row of 40 smaller ones. All the sluices are left open during the annual summer flood.

to make a narrow, 200-mile lake whose water can later be released as needed.

The pilot turned east from the river and flew into some low, barren mountains. We went up a wadi, a dry water course at the end of which were some clusters of palms and a few huts. Then we climbed over the high ridge at the wadi's end and droned lazily down over a wide, desolate basin.

But it wasn't devoid of life. The noise of the motor frightened some gazelles from where they were resting in the shade of an outcropping of rock. They skinned away across the ground as we circled above them.

Sandy-Colored Coat

Probably they were Dorcas gazelles, a type of antelope that is closely related to the goat. They have a brownish, sandy-colored coat with darker stripes on the flanks and a white belly. There are also stripes on the face. Both sexes have horns that are ringed and lyre-shaped with an over-all length of 10 to 14 inches.

They are small, not much over two feet high at the shoulder. But though they are of delicate build, they can undoubtedly jump as well as any of our larger deer. Difficult though it was to judge from the air, one of those I watched through the glasses seemed to soar over a bush that was easily four times his height.

The terrain indicated it would have been no trick to go round it, but the gazelle obviously felt it wasn't worth the bother. And he cleared the bushes and fire engines under his care.

But there's one job for which he has to summon help. Walters needs someone to tell him if the lights work. He's totally blind.

Walters, 35, sightless since he was 7, when a dynamite cap exploded in his face, is responsible for keeping on the road the borough's 19 pieces of equipment.

He does his job by touch and sound.

He strids down a motor, systematically laying out each part at his side, and welds a broken block with the sound of the flame as his guide. He then rebuilds the motor by remembering exactly where each part lies.

He goes to the tool room and distinguishes by touch between a 9/16th and 1/2-inch bolt to replace a worn out part.

He dresses his own drills on an emery wheel, gauging the bevel with his fingertips.

Recently, Walters rebuilt a TD-9 International bulldozer—tearing out, rebuilding and adjusting five sets of timing gear.

Wants No Pitt

Before that, he put a new engine block, new pistons and valves in a LaFrance fire truck.

In four hours, he was able to replace a burned out clutch in a Ferguson light. He put new red blinker lights on all the borough's trucks. It was that job which required the help.

Walters, a bachelor living with his sister and brother-in-law, asks no special privileges to compensate for his blindness.

"Pity ruins a blind man," he said. "In time, he'll begin to pity himself. Then he's lost."

His boss, L. A. Douds, extends no special privileges.

"One thing he doesn't get around here is sympathy. He gets hell whenever he deserves it—which is mighty seldom believe me," Douds said.

"Don't ever get the idea this is some kind of welfare job," the boss added. "George holds down this job because he's the best motor mechanic I know of."

Adept Mechanic Calls for Help to Look at Lights

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Reply Made To Labor Bill Attacks

Washington—(UPI)—Administration attacks on the new labor reform bill drew a hotly replied Tuesday from a republican senator normally considered an administration stalwart.

The angry senator was Irving M. Ives (R-N. Y.) co-chairman with Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) of the bill now before the Senate.

Labor Secretary James P. Mitchell and President Eisenhower called for Republican efforts to toughen the bill with amendments from the floor. Mitchell had called the Ives-Kennedy measure "generally described as moderate," "completely ineffective."

Ives retorted that the administration "is trying to make a Republican thing out of the reform bill. He and Kennedy said it represents 'the best chance' to avoid a 'bitterly repressive anti-labor bill' on the one hand or 'no bill at all' on the other."

Ives called Mitchell's statement "uncalled for." Noting that he had not been consulted said:

"That's the way we play ball in the Republican party."

Plane Ramming Parachute Denied

Moffett Naval Air Station, Cal.—(UPI)—A Navy spokesman Tuesday denied published reports that Comdr. George W. Staehli was rammed by his own plane after parachuting near Drain, Ore.

Staehli jumped last Friday after an engine failure, but was found dead on the ground and separated from the canopy of his chute.

The spokesman said there was "no evidence whatsoever" to indicate that the F4U jet bomber struck Staehli or his chute after his ejection seat threw him 300 feet clear of the craft.
